ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF THE LABOUR DEPARTMENT ON THE WORK DONE FOR THE AMELIORATION OF THE ELIGIBLE COMMUNITIES FOR THE YEAR 1945-46.

PERSONNEL.

Mr. C. K. Vijayaraghavan, I.C.S., continued to be the Commissioner of Labour throughout the year except during the period from 2nd April to 1st May 1945, when he was on leave. Rao Sahib Sri C. G. Reddy, Deputy Chief Inspector of Factories, Madras, held additional charge of the post of the Commissioner of Labour, when Mr. C. K. Vijayaraghavan, I.C.S., was on leave.

Sri A. Uthandarama Pillai, B.A., B.L., continued to be the Assistant Commissioner of Labour throughout the year except during the period of his leave from 11th September to 29th November 1945, when Sri V. Balasundaram held addi-

tional charge of the post of Assistant Commissioner of Labour.

Sri V. Balasundaram, B.A., held the post of the Personal Assistant to the Commissioner of Labour till 2nd February 1946, when he proceeded to the United Kingdom, for training in certain aspects of labour. Sri N. Krishnaswami, B.A., B.L., succeeded him on 1st March 1946. From 3rd February to 1st March 1946 Sri A. Uthandarama Pillai, B.A., B.L., held full additional charge of the post of the Personal Assistant and also from 22nd May to 21st June 1945 when Sri V. Balasundaram was on leave.

Touring.

During the year, the Commissioner toured in the districts of South Kanara, Tanjore, Trichinopoly, North Arcot, the Nilgiris, Vizagapatam, Madura, Salem, Malabar, Kistna, Chingleput and Coimbatore. These tours were undertaken for the purpose of enquiry into labour disputes, inspection of labour schools, hostels, other aided institutions, plantations and factories and hearing of Workmen's Compensation cases. He attended the meeting of the Official Representatives and of the seventh meeting of the Standing Labour Committee at New Delhi on 27th and 28th August 1945. He also attended the meeting of the seventh labour conference held at New Delhi from 26th to 28th November 1945 and on his way to New Delhi he visited Bombay to discuss with the management of the Scindia Steam Navigation Company their proposal for the reorganization of their labour in the Scindia Shipyard at Vizagapatam.

COMMUNITIES ELIGIBLE FOR HELP BY THE LABOUR DEPARTMENT.

The ameliorative work undertaken by the Labour Department was confined as usual to the communities specified in Appendix A and to those who have been converted from these communities to other religions and their descendants.

The Collectors of the districts continued to be responsible in the mufassal for the

ameliorative work with the Commissioner of Labour as the Co-ordinating Officer. A District Labour Officer of the grade of Deputy Tahsildar with a small staff was employed to assist the Collector in each of the districts shown in statement No. 1. In Salem district, the work was, as usual, in charge of the respective taluk Tahsildars.

The work relating to the reclamation of criminal tribes, Yanadis of Chittoor, Kallars of Madura and Ramnad districts and the Koravars of Salem district continued to be under the control of the Deputy Inspector-General of Police (Railways and C.I.D.), Madras.

Provincial Advisory Board and District Advisory Committees.—The Provincial Advisory Board and the District Advisory Committees were reconstituted and continued to function as usual. Of the nine members who were serving on the Board in the previous year, five members (Sri R. Suryanarayana Rao, Mrs. Meenambal Sivaraj, Sri P. Ramamurthi, Swami A. S. Sahajananda, Sri H. M Jaganathan) were renominated. Sri R. Santhappa of Anantapur dist

Rev. J. D. Manasseh of Coimbatore district, Sri S. G. Salenna of South Kanara district and Sri A. Iyanar of Madura district were nominated for the remaining four vacancies.

Sri Diwan Bahadur R. Srinivasan who was an active member of the Provincial

Advisory Board since its inception passed away during the year.

In response to the resolution passed by the Provincial Advisory Board at its meeting held on 20th October 1945 that the members of the Provincial Advisory Board might be nominated as members of their respective District Advisory Committees, the Government in their Order Ms. No. 3061, Public Works, dated 28th November 1945, nominated as a special case, Sri S. G. Salenna and Sri A. Iyanar as members of their respective District Advisory Committees.

The Provincial Advisory Board met thrice during the year. Various ways and means for improving the conditions of the eligible communities were suggested

and discussed. Action was taken wherever necessary.

The number of meetings held by District Committees during the year was as

shown below:

Anantapur 4, Bellary 4, North Arcot 4, South Arcot 3, Chingleput 4, Chittoor Nil, Coimbatore 3, Cuddapah 4, East Godavari 4, West Godavari 4, Guntur 3, South Kanara 3, Kistna 4, Kurnool 3, Madura 1, Malabar 4, Nellore 3, The Nilgiris 1, Ramnad 1, Salem 1, Tanjore 4, Tinnevelly 4, Trichinopoly 5 and Vizagapatam 1.

The Collectors report that the members evinced keen interest in the welfare of the eligible communities and that proposals and suggestions received from

them are promptly dealt with.

The ameliorative work proceeded on the usual lines and consisted of-

(i) provision of house-sites,

(ii) maintenance of schools, grant of scholarships, stipends, boarding grants, grants for the purchase of books, etc., and grants to private educational institutions for the benefit of the communities mentioned in Appendix A,

(iii) provision of wells, tanks, etc., for the supply of drinking water,

(iv) provision of sanitary amenities, pathways and burning or burial grounds, (v) grants to private bodies engaged in social and economic uplift of the eligible communities and

(vi) assignment or lease of land for cultivation.

The work of collection of statistics about the requirements of the eligible communities was completed in all the districts.

Details of the work done under the heads mentioned above are given in the

succeeding paragraphs.

House-sites.

House-sites are provided by assignment of land at the disposal of Government

or by acquisition of private lands.

Details of house-sites provided by assignment of Government lands are given in statement No. II. During the year, 226 house-sites covering an extent of 7.67 acres of land, as against 154 house-sites covering an extent of 11.05 acres in the previous year, were provided in the various districts. The total number of house-sites provided since the commencement of the operations of the Labour Department up to the end of the year was 47,483.

There was no change in the policy of Government regarding the acquisition of private land for the provision of house-sites. The Government continued to bear half the cost of acquisition of land covered by house-sites subject to the maximum of Rs. 350 per acre for wet land, Rs. 150 per acre for dry land and Rs. 250 for garden land. The entire cost of communal portions in the area acquired was,

as usual, borne by the Government.

Particulars of house-sites provided by acquisition of private lands are given in statement No. III. An extent of 15.89 acres of land was acquired at a total cost of Rs. 14,944 as against 41.87 acres of land at a total cost of Rs. 29,313-5-10 acquired in the previous year, and 218 house-sites were provided. The cost borne by Government as contribution towards half the cost of house-sites and the cost

of land set apart for communal purposes was Rs. 9,616-7-7 and the cost borne by the applicants was Rs. 5,327-8-5. The total number of house-sites acquired up to the end of the year was 43,447.

LOANS TO INDIVIDUALS FOR THE ACQUISITION OF HOUSE-SITES.

The arrears at the commencement of the year under 'Principal' amounted to Rs. 53,886 and under 'Interest' Rs. 38,232. A sum of Rs. 8,918 fell due during the year under 'Principal' and Rs. 3,826 under 'Interest' bringing the total demand during the year to Rs. 62,804 under 'Principal' and Rs. 42,058 under 'Interest.'

The collection during the year against the arrear demand was Rs. 7,997 under 'Principal' and Rs. 1,944 under 'Interest.' A sum of Rs. 2,730 was collected under the current demand against 'Principal' and Rs. 408 under 'Interest'. The total collection was Rs. 13,079 (Rs. 10,727 'Principal' plus Rs. 2,352 'Interest') against the total demand of Rs. 1,04,862 which works out to 12.4 per cent as against 32.8 per cent during the year 1944-45. The total amount outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 91,783.

EDUCATION.

In the field of education the facilities provided consisted as usual, of-

(i) the maintenance of elementary schools,

(ii) the provision of scholarships, boarding grants and grants for the purchase of books and clothing and for payment of fees,

(iii) the grant of stipends for the training of teachers,

(iv) the maintenance of free hostels at important centres and

(v) the grant of financial assistance to private bodies engaged in the maintenance of hostels, schools, etc., for the benefit of the eligible communities.

Schools.

There was no change in the policy of the department in regard to the starting and maintenance of elementary schools. Efforts were, however, made to make the existing schools more efficient and to utilise the finances of the Government to greater advantage by closing inefficient schools and starting new ones in places

where they were needed.

Particulars relating to the labour schools in the several districts are given in statement No. IV. At the beginning of the year there were 1,082 schools. Thirty-eight schools were newly started and eight schools were closed. There were thus 1,112 schools working at the end of the year. Of these, 1,111 were day schools and one night school. 68,845 children consisting of 43,447 boys and 25,398 girls received instruction as against 55,310 children consisting of 36,578 boys and 18,732 girls in the previous year. The number of teachers employed was 2,027 of whom 2,025 were trained and 2 untrained. A sum of Rs. 85,620–15–0 was spent on the construction and repair of school buildings.

The Government have recently ordered that 50 per cent of the teachers' posts in the various grades be made permanent and necessary action is being taken to confirm

suitable teachers in those posts.

MIDDAY MEALS.

Supply of midday meals was extended to all the labour schools in the Presidency during the year. Midday meals were supplied in 1,110 out of 1,111 day schools. In 760 schools midday meals were supplied by contractors and in 350 schools by the Headmasters. In the labour school at Nagoor Vannadu, a village on the border of Kolli hills, Trichinopoly district, midday meals were not supplied to the pupils as rice and other foodgrains were not available. However, arrangements are being made for the supply of midday meals this year to the pupils of this school.

The number of pupils of the eligible communities fed in these 1,110 schools was 64,000. An expenditure of about Rs. 8,03,892 was incurred on the supply of midday meals up to the end of March 1946, and proper accounts were maintained.

The scheme is working satisfactorily. It is reported that as a result of the supply of midday meals the health of the pupils and the attendance in the schools have improved considerably.

GOVERNMENT HIGHER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL, MASULIPATAN.

Sri V. Ramjee Rao Pantulu continued to be the Honorary Correspondent of the school during the year on an allowance of Rs. 100 per month. The strength of the school was 286 as against 292 during the previous year. The average number on rolls was 282 as against 281 in the previous year. A sum of Rs. 440-1-5 was realized by the sale of the finished products of vocational sections, and credited to Government. The total expenditure on the maintenance of the school was Rs. 17,953-10-8 as against Rs. 14,632-6-1 in the previous year.

HOOKER LABOUR SCHOOL, NADUVATTAM, THE NILGIRIS.

The school continued to work satisfactorily under the control of the Superintendent, Government Cinchona Plantations, Naduvattam. The strength of the school increased from 51 to 73.

Coimbatore district.—Three labour schools were started during the year and they are working well under the supervision of the Superintendent, Government Cinchona Plantations.

Servants of India Society Agricultural and Industrial School, Mayanoor, Trichinopoly district.—A lump-sum grant of Rs. 2,300 was paid to the Servants of India Society towards the cost of maintenance of the school during the year. The institution gives training in mat-weaving, rope-making, dairy farming and poultry farming, etc. Twenty boys completed the three years course in agriculture and allied industries and also appeared for the Elementary School-Leaving Certificate examination.

Grants to private institutions.—The following recurring grants were made during the year to private institutions for the maintenance of the schools conducted by them for the benefit of the communities eligible for help by the Labour Department:—

SCHOLARSHIPS.

The grant of scholarships to pupils of the communities eligible for help by the Labour Department proceeded on the usual lines. Separate allotments were provided in the budget for 1945–46 for granting scholarships for converts and non-converts as in the previous year. Six thousand and ninety-two non-residential scholarships for ordinary general education involving an expenditure of Rs. 97,235–8–0 were sanctioned during the year as detailed below, as against 6,580 scholarships involving an expenditure of Rs. 1,01,064–14–0 sanctioned in the previous year.

Eighty-three non-residential scholarships for students in the college classes (76 non-converts and 7 converts) involving an expenditure of Rs. 3,269-8-0 (non-converts Rs. 2,980 and converts Rs. 289-8-0) were sanctioned as against 62 (43 non-converts and 19 converts) scholarships involving an expenditure of Rs. 2,318 (non-converts Rs. 1,506-8-0 and converts Rs. 811-8-0) in the previous year.

One hundred and ninety-eight residential scholarships as detailed below involving an expenditure of Rs. 32,540 (non-converts Rs. 27,287 and converts Rs. 5,253) were granted during the year as against 187 residential scholarships involving an expenditure of Rs. 26,880–3–0 (non-converts Rs. 21,321 and converts Rs. 5,559–3–0) in the previous year:—

The number of scholarships granted for commercial courses of study in Shorthand, Typewriting and Book-keeping was 4 (non-converts 3 and convert 1) involving an expenditure of Rs. 180 (non-converts Rs. 144 and converts Rs. 36) as against eight scholarships (Non-converts 7 and convert 1) involving an expenditure of Rs. 225 (non-converts Rs. 189 and converts Rs. 36), in the previous year.

One pupil (non-convert) was granted a scholarship for Physical Education involving an expenditure of Rs. 490. In the previous year one pupil (non-convert) was granted a scholarship of Rs. 430. Nine pupils (non-converts) of the Madras Seva Sadan were granted scholarships involving an expenditure of Rs. 1,187-12-0 as against 8 scholarships (non-converts 7 and convert 1) involving an expenditure of Rs. 1,175-9-0 (non-converts Rs. 1,025-9-0 and converts Rs. 150) in the previous year.

No stipends were granted to Koya boys for undergoing training in practical

Agriculture at the Agricultural Research Station at Anakapalle.

No grant was sanctioned during the year to the Devadhar Malabar Reconstruction Trust, Calicut, nor were capitation grants sanctioned during the year to Konga Pariah boys in the M.M. Industrial School, Karur, in Trichinopoly district. No

stipends were granted during the year for teachers' training.

One hundred and thirty-five industrial scholarships involving an expenditure of Rs. 4,438-6-0 were sanctioned as detailed below for courses of study in carpentry, cabinet-making, spinning and weaving, engraving, enamelling, black-smithy, fitting, drawing, painting, knitting, electric wiring, metal work, paper making, etc., as against 121 scholarships involving an expenditure of Rs. 3,928-12-0 in the previous year :-

No scholarships were awarded for training as apprentice fitters in the Engineering Department of the Deccan Sugar and Abkari Company, Limited, Samalkot, or for apprenticeship in motor car mechanism.

Similarly no scholarships were granted to pupil-apprentices in the Public Works Department Workshops at Bezwada and Dowlaishwaram as there were no appli-

cants during the year.

The Commissioner of Labour has been authorized to sanction the following additional concessions to the pupils of the communities eligible for help by the Labour Department.

- (i) In G.O. No. 3977, Development, dated 12th October 1945, the Commissioner has been authorized to sanction two scholarships to Scheduled Caste pupils taking up the B.Sc. (Agriculture) course of study in the Agricultural College at Bapatla.
- (ii) In G.O. No 2780, Public Works, dated 27th October 1945, the Commissioner has been authorized to grant non-residential and residential scholarships not exceeding three per year for B.T. or B.Ed. courses.
- (iii) In G.O. Ms. No. 394, Public Works, dated 6th February 1946, the Government approved the proposal that pupils in receipt of scholarships from the Labour Department for professional course of training in Midwifery who fail to pass their examination in their first attempt be remanded a further period of three months with scholarships.
- (iv) In G.O. Ms. No. 788, Public Works, dated 21st March 1946, the Commissioner of Labour has been empowered to sanction eight scholarships to Scheduled Caste students for Co-operative training and education, at the rate of two scholarships for each of the Co-operative Training Institutes at Coimbatore, Rajahmundry, Tanjore and Anantapur.

GRANTS TO SCHEDULED CASTES CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETIES.

A grant of Rs. 2,995 was sanctioned to 417 Scheduled Castes co-operative societies selected by the Registrar of Co-operative Societies, Madras, to enable them to pay remuneration to persons employed in writing up their accounts, as against Rs. 2,993 sanctioned to 409 co-operative societies in the previous year.

CHARITABLE ENDOWMENTS.

Critchley Salmonson Prize Fund.—A sum of Rs. 41-9-0 was realized as interest from the fund during the year and it was utilised for awarding a prize to a boarder of the Government Depressed Classes Hostel, Masulipatam.

Gray Memorial Prizes Endowment Fund.—A sum of Rs. 15–13–0 was realized as interest from the fund and it was utilised for awarding prizes to four boarders of

the Government Nandanar Hostels for Boys and Girls, Chidambaram.

Hostels conducted by the Government.—One college student who was transferred from the Paddison Hostel, Madras, to the hostel of Madras Christian College, Tambaram, was given a special boarding grant at Rs. 40 per mensem for ten months in a year towards his boarding and lodging charges.

Slater Hostel.—This hostel is maintained by the Government for the students of

the eligible communities taking up industrial courses in the City of Madras.

Thirty free boarders (twenty-five Hindus and five converts to Christianity) and twenty-three paying boarders were admitted into the hostel during the year. In deserving cases, the age limit fixed for admission of candidates into the hostel was relaxed. A sum of Rs. 9,244-13-4 was spent for its maintenance during the year.

The Sundaracharlu Hostel, Salem.—This hostel was under the supervision of the Stationary Sub-Magistrate, Salem Town. The sanctioned strength of the hostel was thirty and the selection of boarders for the school year was made by the District Advisory Committee. The expenditure incurred on the hostel during the

year was Rs. 4,400. The expenditure was Rs. 4,400 in 1944-45 also.

The Government Nanadanar Hostels for Boys and Girls and the Government Higher Elementary Schools for Boys and Girls, Chidambaram.—These institutions continued to be supervised by Swami A. S. Sahajananda, M.L.A., and controlled by the Collector of South Arcot. The strength of the boys' hostel was increased from 185 to 190 and that of the girls' hostel from 73 to 82 during the year. The selection of boarders for admission was made by the District Advisory Committee. The total expenditure on the maintenance of the two hostels was Rs. 30,808–13–4 as against Rs. 27,346–10–7 in 1944–45.

The two Government Higher Elementary schools for boys and girls continued to be run on the usual lines for the benefit of the pupils of the communities eligible for

help by the Labour Department.

The Government Scheduled Classes Hostel, Calicut, Malabar district.—The hostel continued to be maintained satisfactorily under the supervision of the Collector assisted by the District Advisory Committee. There were twenty free boarders and five paying boarders. The reduction in the consumption of rice due to food rationing

was made good by the supply of pulses as in the previous year. The total expenditure on the maintenance of the hostel was Rs. 4,356–13–4 as against Rs. 4,035–6–7 in the previous year.

The Government Scheduled Classes Hostel, Masulipatam.—The hostel continued to be under the supervision of Sri V. Ramjee Rao Pantulu and was under the control of the Collector of Kistna assisted by the District Advisory Committee. The strength of the hostel was seventy-five. There was one Burma evacuee. The expenditure incurred in the year was Rs. 12,459–12–0 as against Rs. 10,778–2–5 in the previous year.

Five special boarding grants were sanctioned to five college students of the Government Depressed Classes Hostel, Masulipatam, towards their boarding and lodging charges in the college hostel attached to the P.R. College, Cocanada, during the year 1945–46.

The Labour Hostel, Ootacamund, and the Labour Hostel at Ubathalai, The Nilgiris district.—The Labour Hostel at Ootacamund was under the management of the Ootacamund Municipality assisted by an Advisory Committee with the Collector of the Nilgiris as ex-officio President. The strength of the hostel was seventeen during the year. Three paying boarders were also admitted during the year. The expenditure on its maintenance was Rs. 3,372–5–0 as against Rs. 3,282–12–0 in the previous year.

The Labour Hostel at Ubathalai continued to be managed by the President, District Board, the Nilgiris, assisted by an Advisory Committee with the Revenue Divisional Officer, Coonoor, as the ex-officio President. The strength of the hostel was 37 and four paying boarders were also admitted during the year. An expenditure of Rs. 6,509–8–0 was incurred during the year as against Rs. 7,217–14–0 in the previous year.

Hostels subsidised by the Labour Department.—The policy of granting financial assistance to private associations towards the cost of maintenance of the hostels and boarding homes conducted by them for the benefit of the communities eligible for help by the Labour Department was continued during the year. A list showing the names of such institutions, the amount sanctioned and the number of boarding grants sanctioned during the year 1945–46 is given in Appendix B. Many of these institutions are maintained by the Harijan Sevak Sangh and its branches in Tamil Nad, Andhra Desa and South Kanara.

A sum of Rs. 1,68,227–14–0 was sanctioned for the maintenance of 1,567 pupils in the subsidised hostels as against a grant of Rs. 1,54,122–12–4 in the previous year for 1,464 pupils.

The Adi-Andhra Free Boarding Home, Atmakur, Kurnool district, was also given a sum of Rs. 600 as usual, for the maintenance of the vocational sections of the home.

The rate of boarding grants of this department was raised from Rs. 10 to Rs. 12 per mensem in deserving cases on account of the rise in the cost of living.

Individual boarding grants.—Individual boarding grants at the rate of Rs. 10 each per mensem for ten months in the year were sanctioned to three hundred Hindu pupils of the eligible communities and eighty-six Christian converts towards their boarding and lodging charges in the various boarding homes and hostels maintained by private bodies throughout the Presidency. In some deserving cases, the rate of the boarding grants was raised from Rs. 10 to Rs. 12 per month temporarily.

Special boarding grants for providing boarding and lodging facilities to deserving pupils of the eligible communities studying in high schools and whose parents or guardians are residents of Madras City, were granted to eight converts and twelve Hindu pupils at the rate of Rs. 10 each per mensem for ten months in the year in the various boarding homes and hostels maintained by private bodies in the City. The rate of the boarding grants was increased to Rs. 12 per mensem in many deserving cases.

Boarding grants to Toda pupils in the Nilgiris district.—Boarding grants at the rate of Rs. 10 each per mensem for ten months in the year were sanctioned during the year to fifteen pupils (five boys and ten girls).

MADRAS CITY,

The Personal Assistant to the Commissioner of Labour continued to be in charge of the work connected with provision of civic amenities and sanitary improvements for the members of the eligible communities in the City of Madras. Supervision of labour schools, construction and repairs of school buildings, were also attended to by him. He was assisted by a special overseer.

A sum of Rs. 33,077 was spent during the year on the provision of civic amenities and sanitary improvements in the labour colonies in the City as shown below and a sum of Rs. 2,751 was spent on repairs to labour school buildings:—

The rental scheme of the Brislee Nagar settlement continued to work satisfactorily. A sum of Rs. 1,228-8-0 was collected as rent against the demand of Rs. 1,315 for the year. A proposal to replace the existing thatched roofing with tiled roofing or in the alternative to build pucca houses in the place of the existing huts is under the consideration of the Government. The communal portions in the settlement including the streets, latrines, bath rooms, etc., have been handed over to the Corporation of Madras for future maintenance.

The Government have sanctioned the construction of 37 houses in R.S. No. 1847-2 of Tondiarpet near Korukkupet Railway Station at a cost of Rs. 62,000 to be let out to the members of the eligible communities at a rental of Rs. 3 per mensem per house. The construction of the houses has been taken up and the

work is in progress.

THE PERUNDURAI COLONIES, COIMBATORE DISTRICT.

No loans were sanctioned to the colonists during the year. No other expenditure also was sanctioned.

THE NAYADI COLONY, OLAVAKKOT, MALABAR DISTRICT.

The Nayadi Colony and the labour school attached to it functioned satis-

factorily during the year.

The dilapidated wall in the colony was reconstructed at a cost of Rs. 694. The thatched roofs of two of the huts in the colony and of the labour school shed were renewed at a cost of Rs. 394.

The waste lands in the colony and the poramboke lands measuring about 6:35 acres leased to the settlers free of rent were cultivated by them with paddy, tapioca, etc. The settlers supplemented their income from the lands by doing cooly work outside the colony. Sixteen children of the colony received education in the labour school attached to the colony. The Nayadi pupils were also given practical training in agriculture by the headmaster of the school who is a trained agricultural instructor. The Nayadi pupils were in receipt of boarding grants at the rate of Rs. 4 each per mensem. A sum of Rs. 1,824 was spent in all on the colony during the year. The total expenditure incurred since the formation of the colony came to Rs. 28,318–5–1.

ASSIGNMENT OF LANDS.

The ban imposed by the Government on the permanent assignment of lands reserved for the communities eligible for help by the Labour Department for the duration of the war continued during the year.

The percentage of inspections to the number of assignment was 80 and over

in eight districts.

The following are the main reasons for the non-cultivation of lands assigned in the several districts during the year:—

Poverty of the assignees;

(2) want of proper irrigation facilities;

(3) poor quality of the soil of the land assigned;(4) absence of the assignees from the villages; and

(5) reservation of land for pasture.

The difference in the extent of lands reserved, assigned, etc., in certain districts between the figures furnished in the last year's report and those shown now is due to revised figures furnished by the Collectors.

From the Commissioner of Labour, dated 3rd July 1946, No. A-2-2068/46.

Order-No. 3469, Development, dated 11th September 1946.

Recorded.

- 2. Proposals for the reconstitution of the District Advisory Committees and the Provincial Advisory Board for 1946-47 are under the consideration of the Government.
- 3. Provision of house-sites.—During the year under review, 226 house-sites covering an extent of 7.67 acres of Government land, as against 154 house-sites covering an extent of 11.05 acres in the previous year, were provided in the various districts. Two hundred and eighteen house-sites were provided by acquisition of private land, as against 401 in the previous year.
- 4. Lease or assignment of land for cultivation.—In spite of the need to bring in more land under cultivation, only 192,137.93 acres were cultivated during the year, out of 387,941.85 acres assigned.
- 5. Education.—(a) At the end of the year, there were 1,112 schools (1 night school and 1,111 day schools) working, as against 1,082 schools at the beginning of the year. There was considerable improvement in the number of children who received instruction in these schools. During the year under review, a sum of Rs. 85,620–15–0 was spent on the construction and repairs of school buildings. The number of teachers employed was 2,027. The Government have recently ordered that 50 per cent of the teachers employed in each district in the various grades should be made permanent.

During the year, 1,110 out of 1,111 day schools supplied free midday meals to children, about 64,000 pupils being benefited by the arrangement. The question of giving midday meals on Saturdays and other half holidays is under consideration.

Non-recurring grants for the purchase of books, clothing, etc., amounting to Rs. 1,709 were granted by the Commissioner of Labour in the City while similar grants amounting to Rs. 4,701–8–0 were made by the Collectors of districts. The Government have authorized the Commissioner of Labour to grant two scholarships for the B.Sc. (Agriculture) course in the Agricultural College, Bapatla, and three scholarships for the B.T. or B.Ed. courses. The question of granting scholarships to a few Scheduled Caste students each year for the Law courses is under consideration.

(c) The Government maintained one hostel (the Slater Hostel) for the students of eligible communities taking up industrial courses in the City of Madras and the following seven hostels in the mufassal:

(1) The Sundaracharlu Hostel, Salem.

(2) & (3) The Government Nandanar Hostels for boys and girls, Chidambaram.

(4) The Government Scheduled Classes Hostel, Calicut.

(5) The Government Scheduled Classes Hostel, Masulipatam.

(6) The Labour Hostel, Ootacamund.

(7) The Labour Hostel, Hubbathalai, Nilgiris district.

The department subsidized 69 hostels, orphanages, etc., maintained by private associations for the benefit of the eligible communities by sanctioning a total sum of Rs. 1,68,227-14-0 for the maintenance of 1,567 pupils in those institutions, as against the grant of Rs. 1,54,122-12-0 in the previous year for 1,464 pupils. Individual boarding grants were also sanctioned to 300 Hindu pupils of the eligible communities and 86 Christian converts towards their boarding and lodging charges in various boarding homes and hostels maintained by private bodies. Special boarding grants were given to 20 pupils in the various boarding homes and hostels maintained by private bodies in the city.

The total expenditure during the year on education amounted to Rs. 25,87,913-13-11 as against Rs. 16,67,684-2-9 during the previous year.

- 6. Wells and tanks.—The total expenditure on the construction and repairs of wells during the year under review was Rs. 2,43,440-7-0 as against Rs. 1.51,132-3-6 in the previous year.
- Provision of pathways and sanitary amenities.—A sum of Rs. 12,891-4-9 was spent in the mufassal on the above items of work and a sum of Rs. 33,077 was spent in the City on similar items during the year under review.
- 8. Colonization scheme.—A scheme for the colonization and general uplift of Harijans is under the consideration of the Government. A sum of Rs. 1 crore has been earmarked for expenditure on this scheme. Under this scheme, it is proposed to build houses for Harijans to enable them to live side by side with Caste Hindus and Muslims and others and maintain the same standard of living. Schools, hospitals and other public amenities will also be provided for the benefit of the colonists. The details of the scheme are being worked out in consultation with the Collectors of the districts, the Commissioner of Labour, the Harijan Members of the Legislature and other leading social workers in the Province.


