



# Report on the Administration of Civil Justice in the Province of Assam during the year 1940.

1. Judicial Officers .- During the year under report, the permanent Civil Judicial staff of the Province consisted of two District Judges, one Additional District Judge, nine Subordinate Judges and twenty-four Munsifs. The two Subordinate Judges and ten Munsifs employed in the district of Sylhet were members of the Bengal Civil Service (Judicial), the remainder were executive officers vested with Judicial powers under section 36 of the Bengal, Agra and Assam Civil Courts Act, 1887. addition to the permanent staff, two temporary additional Munsifs worked in the Assam Valley Districts and the following temporary appointments were sanctioned during the year :-

A temporary Additional District and Sessions Judge for the Assam Valley Districts throughout the year.

A temporary Additional Subordinate Judge, vested with the powers of an Assistant Sessions Judge, for the Assam Valley Districts throughout the year.

A temporary Additional Subordinate Judge for Sylhet and Cachar from the 2nd January till the 31st May.

A temporary Additional Munsif for Sylhet from the 1st June till the 30th September.

#### Original Jurisdiction.

2. Suits instituted.—The number of original suits instituted in the Province was 38,045 showing an increase of 2,213 on the figure of the previous year. There was an increase of 1,248 in the Assam Valley, 741 in Sylhet and 224 in Cachar. Of the 38,045 suits instituted, 17,390 were suits for money or movables, 14,837 were rent suits and 5,818 title and other suits. In respect of suits for money or movables, there was an increase of 153, the Assam Valley and Cachar showing an increase of 324 and 92, respectively, and Sylhet a decrease of 263. In rent suits there was an increase of 1,141, the Assam Valley, Sylhet and Cachar showing an increase of 648, 449 and 44, respectively. There was also an increase of 919 in title suits, with an increase of 276 in the Assam Valley, 555 in Sylhet and 88 in Cachar. Of the total number of suits instituted, 29,445 were valued at sums

not exceeding Rs. 100, and 63 were valued at over Rs. 5,000.

3. Suits disposed of.—In addition to 38,045 suits instituted during the year, there were 9,802 suits pending trial from the previous year, 1,127 were revived and 2,182 were received otherwise, making a total of 51,156 suits for disposal before the subordinate courts in Assam in 1940, against 48,544 in the preceding year. Excluding transfers, 38,147 were disposed of or 1,101 more than in the previous year. The number of suits disposed of in Sylhet, the Assam Valley and Cachar increased by 549, 430 and 122, respectively. The pending file rose from 9,802 to 10,869.

The number of cases pending over one year rose from 226 to 227. Fifteen original suits were disposed of by District and Additional Judges, 497 by Subordinate Judges and 37,635 by Munsifs, against 27,383 and 36,636, respectively, in 1939. The average number of suits disposed of by each Munsif rose from 1,396 in 1939 to 1,429 in 1940. In Sylhet, where the Munsifs were employed upon civil work only, the average disposal per Munsif was 2,394 as compared with 2,362 in the previous year.

4. Methods of disposal.—Of the number of suits disposed of, 6,503 were decided without trial, 19,030 decided ex-parte, 3,363 decided on admission of claim, 4,794 decided on compromise, 4,368 decided after full trial and 89 decided on reference to arbitration. The percentage of cases decided after full trial was 12·2 in Sylhet, 13·8 in Cachar, and 9·3 in the Assam Valley.

Of the total number of disposals, 11,370 or 29.8 per cent. were under the summary procedure of the Small Cause Court and 26,777 or 70.2 per cent. were under the ordinary procedure. Of the 11,103 suits disposed of in the Assam Valley, 2,001 or 18 per cent. were decided under the summary procedure and 9,102 or 82 per cent. under the ordinary procedure. Of the 25,012 suits disposed of in Sylhet, 8,851 or 35:4 per cent. were decided under the summary procedure and 16,161 or 64.6 per cent. under the ordinary procedure, and of 2,032 suits disposed of in Cachar, 518 or 25.5 per cent. were decided under the summary procedure and 1,514 or 74.5

per cent. under the ordinary procedure. Of the cases decided after full trial, 21 per cent. were under the summary and the remainder under ordinary the procedure.

Results of suits decided after full 5. trial .- Of the 4,368 suits decided after full trial, 3,254 or 74.5 per cent. resulted in favour of the plaintiffs and 1,114 or 25.5 per cent. in favour of the defendants.

Miscellaneous cases .- There were 5,967 miscellaneous cases of a judicial nature before the courts for disposal against 5,295 in the previous year. Of these, excluding transfers, 4,702 were disposed of and 1,050 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the number disposed of, 1,214 were decided after full trial.

## Appellate Jurisdiction.

Appeals in the High Court .-The number of appeals from the superior civil courts of Assam instituted, revived and received by transfer in, and decided the High Court in 1940 and number pending at the close of the year will be found in Statement A (Part II) appended to the report.

Further details of the Civil Appellate business disposed of in the High Court during the year under report will be found in Statement A (Part II) appended to the report.

#### Appellate Courts subordinate to the High Court.

10. There were 2,519 appeals for disposal before the Civil Appellate Courts of Assam in 1940 against 2,399 in the previous year. Of these, excluding transfers, 1,278 were disposed of which is 83 more than in 1939. The number pending at the close of the year was 302. Of the latter, 2 were pending over a year against the same number in preferred 1939. Of 1,272 appeals during the year, 215 were from decisions in suits for money or movables, 323 from decisions in suits under the rent law and 734 from those in title and other suits.

The number of appeals preferred from the decisions of Subordinate Judges and Munsifs, respectively, and their ratio to the number of cases in which an appeal lay, were as follows:

Disposal and result of appeals Of the appeals disposed of, 86 were prosecuted and 1,199 dismissed or not

were decided after hearing. Of the latter, the decisions of the lower courts were affirmed in 777 cases or 65·2 per cent., modified in 149 or 125 per cent., reversed in 231 or 19·4 per cent. and the remainder were remanded to the lower courts. The results were on the whole more favourable to the lower courts than in the previous year. Excluding transfers, 310 miscellaneous appeals were disposed of during the year, as against 256 in 1939 and 66 were pending at its close against 59 in 1939.

The number of regular appeals disposed of by the Judge and Additional Judge of the Assam Valley was 80 and that by the District and Additional District Judges of Sylhet-Cachar was 732 against 78 and 696, respectively, in 1939.

- 12. Receipts and charges.—The receipts from the Civil Courts in Assam fell from Rs. 8,01,465 in 1939 to Rs. 6,73,639 in 1940, while the expenditure fell from Rs. 4,63,364 to Rs. 4,62,801. The surplus of receipts over expenditure fell from Rs. 3,38,101 to Rs. 2,10,838. The decrease in receipts was under all the heads except "Process fees" and "Other receipts credited to Government."
- 13. Inspection.—During the year under report the courts of two Subordinate Judges and nine Munsifs in the district of Sylhet were inspected by the District Judge. In Cachar, the civil offices and courts both at Silchar and Hailakandi were inspected by the Commissioner of Divisions and the District Judge, respectively. In the Assam Valley, the Subordinate Judge's court at Gauhati and the civil offices at Goalpara, Barpeta and Gauhati were inspected by the Judge. The civil offices at Jorhat and Golaghat were inspected by the Commissioner of Divisions and the Deputy Commissioner, respectively, and those at Mangaldai and Tezpur by both the Judge and the Commissioner. The civil office at North Lakhimpur was inspected by the Judge and the Deputy Commissioner and that at Sibsagar by the Commissioner and the Deputy Commissioner.
- 14. General.—(a) High Court.—The number of first appeals instituted in the High Court during the year was 13 against 31 in 1939 and the number of

- against 269. The number of first appeals disposed of was 22 against 10 and that of second appeals was 161 against 127. The pending file of first appeals fell from 74 to 65 and that of second appeals rose from 363 to 394. The average duration of first appeals was nearly  $2\frac{2}{3}$  years and that of second appeals  $1\frac{2}{3}$  years. Compared with 1939 the duration of both the first and second appeals showed an increase.
- (b) Lower Courts.—(i) There was an increase of 2,213 suits in the number instituted during the year as compared with the figure for 1939, while the figure for 1939 showed a decrease of 85 suits over that for 1938. There was therefore a total increase of 2,128 suits instituted during the last two years.
- (ii) One thousand one hundred one more suits were disposed of in 1940 than in 1939. The increase in disposals may be attributed to the fact that comparatively more additional help given in the court of the Munsifs and that less contested suits were disposed of by them than in the preceding year. Moreover, the court of the permanent special Subordinate Judge and Assistant Sessions Judge of the Assam Valley Districts functioned throughout the year whereas in 1939 this court was left without any officer for a considerable part of the year. Despite a better disposal than in 1939, the increase in the pending file from 9,802 to 10,869 is apparently due to an increase of 2,213 suits in the number instituted during the year under report. The number of year-old pending suits remained almost the same, it being 227 in 1940 against 226 in 1939. There was a rise in the average disposal per Munsif. Contested disposals fell. The percentage of such disposals under the ordinary procedure rose as much as that under the Small Cause Court Procedure fell, as compared with the figures of the previous year.
- (iii) The number of regular appeals disposed of in 1940 was 83 more than in 1939, while the figure for 1939 showed a decrease of 394 over that for 1938. There was thus a total of 311 less appeals disposed of during the two years. The pending file rose from 271 in 1939 to 302 in 1940, but the number of year-old appeals remained the same as in the previous year, viz., 2.

- (iv) The receipts decreased by Rs. 1,27,826 and the expenditure by Rs. 563.
- (v) The number of applications for interlocutory injunctions filed during the year in Sylhet was 261 and there were 21 cases pending from the preceding year making a total of 282 for disposal. In 16 of these cases, the prayer for injunction was summarily refused; in 142, injunctions were issued ex parte and in 121, after giving notice to opposite party. Of the number in

which injunctions were issued ex parte 66 were made absolute after hearing 35 were dissolved and 30 continued for absence of opposite party. As in the previous year, compared with Sylhet the number of injunctions applied for in the Assam Valley Districts and Cachar was negligible.
