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


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Report on the Administration of Criminal Justice in the Province of Assam during the year 1940.

- Judicial staff.—The Judicial staff employed on criminal work in Assam during the year consisted of two Sessions Judges, one Additional Sessions Judge, one Assistant Sessions Judge, eight District Magistrates, ninety-seven Subordinate Stipendiary Magistrates and twenty-six Honorary Magistrates. Besides these, one temporary Additional Sessions Judge worked in the Assam Valley throughout the year. Subordinate Judges vested with the powers of an Assistant Sessions Judge were also employed, viz., one in Assam Valley throughout the year and two at Sylhet for 39 days. There was an increase of one Subordinate Stipendiary Magistrate over the number employed in the previous year; Kamrup, Lakhimpur, Goalpara and Sibsagar showing an increase and Sylhet and Nowgong a decrease in the staff. There was an increase in the number of Honorary Magistrates in Goalpara, Lakhimpur, Nowgong and Sylhet.
- 2. Offences reported.—The number of offences reported during the year combined with the number pending from the previous year was 60,993 against 57,122 in 1939. Of this number, 41,398 were under the Penal Code and 19,595 under Special and Local Laws. There was an increase in offences under the Penal Code in Lakhimpur, Goalpara, Darrang, Sibsagar, Sylhet, Cachar and Kamrup, the largest increase being in Lakhimpur, viz., 437.
- 3. Cases found to be true.—Including cases which were under enquiry at the close of 1939, 43,536 cases were accepted as true during 1940, and of these, 30,856 were brought to trial. Compared with the previous year, the figures represent an increase of 323 under the former and of 506 under the latter head.

Original Jurisdiction.

MAGISTRATES' COURTS.

4. Cases disposed of.—Including cases committed to the sessions, 30,100

cases were disposed of in the courts of Magistrates during the year. Of the cases disposed of, 59 were decided by District Magistrates, 27,364 by Subordi-Stipendiary Magistrates, 2,517 by Honorary Magistrates and Benches and 160 by a Special Magistrate. The number of cases decided during the year was 28 more than in 1939. This increase is due to an increase in the disposals of Subordinate Stipendiary Magistrates and Special Magistrate who decided, respectively, 535 and 105 cases more than in 1939. There was, on the other hand, a decrease of 471 and 141 in the number of cases decided by the Honorary Magistrates and Benches and District Magistrates.

5. Results of trials.—The number of persons whose cases were decided by Magistrates was 56,011 or 2,279 more than in the previous year. Of these, 16,313 or 29.1 per cent. were convicted. The number of persons convicted in cases under the Indian Penal Code was 7,540 or 19.2 per cent. of those tried. In 1939 the percentage of such convictions was 20.7.

Of the persons acquitted or discharged, the cases of 13,632 were compounded, withdrawn, or dismissed for default. The percentage of convictions of persons actually tried was 38.5 against 40.1 in 1939.

Of the persons tried for offences under the Indian Penal Code, the cases of 11,539 were disposed of otherwise than on a trial on the merits of the case. The percentage of convictions of persons actually tried under the Penal Code was 26.9 against 28.4 in 1939.

6. Persons awaiting trial.—Exclusive of persons mentally incapable of standing their trial, 7,958 persons were awaiting trial at the close of the year. Of these, the cases of 1,213 persons were pending for over three, and of 238 for over six months. The number of persons in custody for over three months at the close of the year was 13 as against 39 in the previous year.

- 7. Witnesses.—The number of witnesses examined was 77,435 or 3,728 less than in the previous year. Of the total number of witnesses who attended, 69.9 per cent. were discharged on the first day of the trial. The total number detained for more than three days was 885 against 1,083 in the previous year. The district in which the largest percentage of witnesses was detained for more than three days was in Kamrup (4.7). All explanations of long detention of witnesses have been dealt with by the High Court.
- 8. **Punishment.**—Before Magistrates 3,321 persons were sentenced to imprisonment, 11,807 to fine or forfeiture, 105 to whipping and 1,176 ordered to give security.

Fine.—The aggregate of the fines imposed was Rs. 2,07,433. The amount realised, including the arrears of previous years, was Rs. 1,38,949, of which Rs. 16,205 was paid as compensation to complainants. The total amount of fines imposed and realised during the year, increased by Rs. 23,248 and Rs. 3,603, respectively. The short collection of fines was apparently due to the prevailing economic distress.

9. Frivolous or vexatious accusations.—The provisions of section 250 of the Code of Criminal Procedure were utilised in 40 cases. The total amount of compensation ordered to be paid by complainants to accused persons against whom they were found to have brought frivolous or vexatious accusations was Rs. 865-8. Of this amount, Rs. 765-8 was realised and paid as compensation.

COURTS OF SESSION.

10. Cases disposed of.—The number of cases disposed of in the courts of session was 371 against 318 in the previous year.

- 11. Results of trials.—One thousand and thirty-three persons including those whose cases were pending from the previous year, were under trial before the courts of session. Of these, 935 were tried, 2 died or escaped and 96 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried, 488 were convicted and sentenced in the sessions court, 30 were referred for orders of the High Court and 417 were discharged or acquitted; the figures for 1939 were 450, 37 and 321, respectively.
- 12. Punishment.—Sentence of death was passed on three persons in three cases, which were referred to the High Court for confirmation. The result of these references is stated in paragraph 19 below. Twenty-four persons were sentenced in the sessions court to transportation or penal servitude. Four hundred and twenty-four persons were sentenced to various terms of imprisonment, 14 to fine or forfeiture, 5 to whipping and 58 were ordered to give security.
- 13. Witnesses.—The number of witnesses in attendance before the courts of session was 5,451. Of these, 3,325 were examined and 2,126 discharged without examination, against 3,079 and 1,724, respectively, in 1939.

Of the total number in attendance, 12 were detained for more than three days in the Assam Valley Districts and none in the Surma Valley Districts. The proportion of witnesses discharged after the third day to the total number examined was 0.3 against .03 in the previous year in the Assam Valley and nil against .05 in the Surma Valley. The amount paid to witnesses on account of the expenses incurred by them in attending sessions trials was Rs. 15,868 as compared with Rs. 13,343 in 1939. Rs. 256-4-6 and Rs. 274-8, respectively, were paid to jurors and witnesses discharged during the year before trial opened and on adjournment after opening.

14. No case from Assam was committed to the Original Jurisdiction of the High Court.

Appellate Jurisdiction.

15. Appeals to the High Court.— Twenty appeals were pending before the High Court from the previous year, 107 were preferred, and 114 were disposed of during the year, leaving 13 pending at its close. Of the appeals preferred, 105 were from convictions by Sessions Judges and 2 by the Provincial Government. The number of persons concerned in the appeals was 217. The results of criminal appeals decided in the High Court during the year under review are shown in the following statement:—

16. Criminal work of the High Court.—The following statement shows in detail the criminal business which came before the High Court in its Appellate Jurisdiction during each of the past three years:—

reversal in 376 instances or 16.5 per cent. The cases of 7 persons were otherwise disposed of.

18. Appeals to Magistrates.—In the courts of District Magistrates 117 appeals of 251 persons were disposed of during the year. Of the persons concerned, 142 or 56.5 per cent. were altogether unsuccessful, 87 or 34.7 per cent. obtained a reversal and 12 or 4.8 per cent. a modification of their original sentences. The cases of 10 persons were otherwise disposed of.

The proportion of appellants completely or partially successful to the number whose appeals were heard by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates was 33.7 and 43.4 per cent., respectively, against 31.3 and 40.6 in the previous year.

17. Appeals to Courts of Session.—
The number of appeals disposed of in the courts of session was 1,333 against 1,068 in the previous year. There were 2,276 persons concerned in these appeals. The appeals resulted in confirmation of the original sentence in 1,508 instances or 66.3 per cent.; in modification in 385 instances or 16.9 per cent.; and in

made to the High Court during 1940 and one was pending at the opening of the year. Three cases in which three persons were concerned were decided during the year. One of the accused persons was sentenced to death and two to transportation or penal servitude. Twenty-five cases of revision were pending from the previous year and 177 cases were filed

during the year. Of these, 180 were disposed of, leaving 22 cases undecided at the end of the year.

II—COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

- 20. Sessions Courts.—The number of applications for revision disposed of in the courts of session was 402 against 423 in the previous year. In these cases, 1,570 persons were implicated. The orders of the lower courts were affirmed in the cases of 1,366 persons, and reversed in the cases of 3 persons. The cases of 201 persons were otherwise disposed of.
- 21. Magistrates' Courts.—In the courts of the District Magistrates 220 applications were decided during the year. The number of persons concerned in these cases was 676. The orders of the lower courts were affirmed in the cases of 498 persons and reversed in those of 9 persons. The cases of 169 persons were otherwise disposed of.
- 22. Receipts and charges.—The charges in the criminal courts amounted to Rs. 6,21,156 and the receipts to Rs. 2,89,243. Compared with the figures of 1939, the charges show an increase of Rs. 1,251 and the receipts a decrease of Rs. 14,287.

The increase in expenditure was principally under the head "Other contingencies and refunds". The decrease in receipts occurred chiefly under the head "Other receipts credited to Government".

- General.—(a) The number of offences reported during 1940 stood at 60,993 which is 3,871 more than in 1939 and 5,615 more than in 1938. The number of cases disposed of in the courts of Magistrates rose from 29,684 in 1938 and 30,072 in 1939 to 30,100 in 1940. There has been a gradual fall in the percentage of convictions of persons actually tried during the last three years; the figures being 42.5 in 1938. 40·1 in 1939 and 38·5 in 1940. cases of 13,632 persons were compounded, withdrawn or dismissed for default in 1940; the figures for 1938 and 1939 were 13,896 and 12,593, respectively.
- (b) The total amount of fines realised rose by about Rs. 3,600 as compared with the figure for 1939 which was less than that of 1938 by about Rs. 900.

- (c) The number of cases disposed of in the courts of session during 1940 was 371 which is 53 more than in 1939 and 14 more than in 1938. The percentage of convictions which had risen from 49.9 in 1938 to 58.4 in 1939, fell to 53.9 in 1940.
- (d) The number of appeals disposed of in the courts of session rose from 1,128 in 1938 and 1,068 in 1939 to 1,333 in 1940. About 66 per cent. as against 69 in 1939 of the appeals resulted in confirmation of the original sentences and the sentences of the rest were either modified, reversed or otherwise disposed of. Compared with the figures for 1939, appeals to Magistrates show a lower percentage of sentences being upheld and a higher percentage of sentences reversed.
- (e) The number of applications for revision disposed of in the courts of session fell from 466 in 1938 and 423 in 1939 to 402 in 1940, while those heard by Magistrates rose from 166 in 1938 and 147 in 1939 to 220 in 1940.
- (f) The total number of witnesses examined in the Magistrates' and sessions courts during the year under report fell by 3,482 as compared with the figure for 1939, which was more than that of 1938 by 2,920. There was a gradual fall in the number of witnesses detained over three days during the last three years, the figures being 1,142 in 1938, 1,085 in 1939 and 897 in 1940.
- (g) Charges rose by about Rs. 1,250 as compared with those for 1939 and fell by over Rs. 9,000 as compared with those for 1938. Receipts decreased by nearly Rs. 14,300 as compared with the figure for 1939 and by about Rs. 24,150 when compared with that for 1938.

Shillong Division.

24. The number of offences reported during the year, combined with the number pending from the previous year, was 709 as against 721 in 1939. Of this number, 408 were under the Indian Penal Code and 301 under Special and Local Laws. Of the total number of cases under enquiry, 611 were found to be true, and of these 487 were brought to trial. During the year, 447 cases were decided in the Magistrates' courts

and 40 remained pending at its close. One case was decided in the sessions court. The number of witnesses examined was 503 and none was detained for more than three days.

There were 550 persons under trial in the Magistrates' courts. The cases of 508 persons were decided, 10 died or escaped and 32 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried, 173 were acquitted or discharged and 335 were convicted. The case of one person in the sessions court ended in acquittal. All the appeals and motions filed during the year have been disposed of.

The total amount of fines imposed was Rs. 4,147. Rs. 1,635-8 was realised, of which Rs. 136-8 was paid as compensation to complainants.

The charges in the criminal courts amounted to Rs. 533 and the receipts to Rs. 4,732-2.
