

# Report on the $\mathcal{G}(\mathfrak{g})$ Administration of Criminal Justice in the Province of Assam

### During the year 1941

Issued by the Authority of the High Court of Judicature at Fort William in Bengal


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#### Report on the Administration of Criminal Justice in the Province of Assam during the year 1941.

1. Judicial staff.—The Judicial staff employed on criminal work in Assam during the year consisted of two Sessions Judges, one Additional Sessions Judge, one Assist-ant Sessions Judge, eight District Magis-trates, seventy-five Subordinate Stipen-diary Magistrates and thirty-four Honorary Magistrates. Besides these, one temporary Additional Sessions Judge worked in the Assam Valley throughout the year. Three Subordinate Judges vested with the powers of an Assistant Sessions Judge were also Assam Valley employed, viz., one in throughout the year and two at Sylhet and Cachar for  $65\frac{1}{2}$  days. There was a decrease of 22 Subordinate Stipendiary Magistrates over the number employed in the previous year; Lakhimpur, Nowgong and Goalpara showing a decrease and Sylhet and Cachar an increase in the staff. There was an increase in the number of Honorary Magistrates in Sylhet, Sibsagar and Darrang.

2. Offences reported.—The number of offences reported during the year combined with the number pending from the previous year was 60,114 against 60,993 in 1940. Of this number, 39,497 were under the Penal Code and 20,617 under Special and Local Laws. There was a decrease in offences under the Penal Code in Lakhimpur, Darrang, Sylhet, Nowgong and Cachar, the largest decrease being in Lakhimpur, viz., 892.

3. Cases found to be true.—Including cases which were under enquiry at the close of 1940, 41,995 cases were accepted as true during 1941, and of these, 31,410 were brought to trial. Compared with the previous year, the figures represent a decrease of 1,541 under the former and an increase of 554 under the latter head.

#### Original Jurisdiction.

#### MAGISTRATES' COURTS.

4. Cases disposed of .- Including cases committed to the Sessions, 30,724 cases were disposed of in the courts of Magistrates during the year. Of the cases disposed of, 124 were decided by District Magistrates, 27,030 by Subordinate Stipendiary Magistrates, 3,276 by Honorary Magistrates and Benches and 294 by the Special Magistrates. The number of cases decided during the year was 624 more than in 1940. This increase is due to an increase in the disposals of the Honorary Magistrates and Benches, the District Magistrates and the Special Magistrates who decided, respectively, 759, 134 and 65 cases more than in 1940. There 134 and 65 cases more than in 1940. was, on the other hand, a decrease of 334 in the number of cases decided by the Sub-ordinate Stipendiary Magistrates. 5. **Results of trials.**—The number of persons whose cases were decided by Magistrates was 57,238 or 1,227 more than in the previous year. Of these, 17,268 or 30.2 per cent. were convicted. The number of persons convicted in cases under the Indian Penal Code was 7,851 or 20.2 per cent. of those tried. In 1940 the percentage of such convictions was 19.2.

Of the persons acquitted or discharged, the cases of 13,422 were compounded, withdrawn, or dismissed for default. The percentage of convictions of persons actually tried was 39.4 against 38.5 in 1940.

Of the persons tried for offences under the Indian Penal Code, the cases of 10,998 were disposed of otherwise than on a trial on the merits of the case. The percentage of convictions of persons actually tried under the Penal Code was 27.7 against 26.9 in 1940.

6. **Persons awaiting trial.**—Exclusive of persons mentally incapable of standing their trial, 9,348 persons were awaiting trial at the close of the year. Of these, the cases of 1,368 persons were pending for over three, and of 269 for over six months. The number of persons in custody for over three months at the close of the year was 38 as against 13 in the previous year.

7. Witnesses.—The number of witnesses examined was 71,652 or 5,783 less than in the previous year. Of the total number of witnesses who attended,  $68\cdot1$  per cent. were discharged on the first day of the trial. The total number detained for more than three days was 765 against 885 in the previous year. The district in which the largest percentage of witnesses was detained for more than three days was in Nowgong (3.7). All explanations of long detention of witnesses have been dealt with by the High Court.

8. **Punishment.** — Before Magistrates 3,602 persons were sentenced to imprisonment, 12,461 to fine or forfeiture, 107 to whipping and 642 ordered to give security.

Fine.—The aggregate of the fines imposed was Rs. 2,10,730 The amount realised, including the arrears of previous years, was Rs. 1,37,650, of which Rs. 13,733 was paid as compensation to complainants. The total amount of fines imposed during the year, increased by Rs. 3,297, while that realised decreased by Rs. 1,299 respectively. The short collection of fines was apparently due to the prevailing economic distress.

9. Frivolous or vexatious accusations.— The provisions of section 250 of the Code of Criminal Procedure were utilised in 41 cases. The total amount of compensation ordered to be paid by complainants to accused persons against whom they were found to have brought frivolous or vexatious accusations was Rs. 884. Of this amount, Rs. 830 was realised and Rs. 775 paid as compensation.

#### COURTS OF SESSION.

10. **Cases disposed of.**—The number of cases disposed of in the courts of session was 331 against 371 in the previous year.

11. **Results of trials.**—One thousand and twenty-five persons including those whose cases were pending from the previous year, were under trial before the courts of session. Of these, 846 were tried, 5 died or escaped and 174 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried, 397 were convicted and sentenced in the sessions court, 15 were referred for orders of the High Court and 434 were discharged or acquitted; the figures for 1940 were 488, 30 and 417, respectively.

12. **Punishment.**—Sentence of death was passed on three persons in three cases, which were referred to the High Court for confirmation. The result of these references is stated in paragraph 19 below. Twentyseven persons were sentenced in the sessions court to transportation or penal servitude. Three hundred and thirty-five persons were sentenced to various terms of imprisonment, 42 to fine or forfeiture, 4 to whipping and 7 were ordered to give security.

13. Witnesses.—The number of witnesses in attendance before the courts of session was 5,295. Of these 3,251 were examined and 2,044 discharged without examination, against 3,325 and 2,126, respectively, in 1940. Of the total number in attendance, only one was detained for more than three days in the Surma Valley Districts and none in the Assam Valley Districts. The proportion of witnesses discharged after the third day to the total number examined was .05 against nil in the previous year in the Surma Valley and nil against 0.3 in the Assam Valley. The amount paid to witnesses on account of the expenses incurred by them in attending sessions trials was Rs. 15,114 as compared with Rs. 15,868 in 1940. Rs. 484-0-3 and Rs. 329-1-6, respectively, were paid to jurors and witnesses discharged during the year before trial opened and on adjournment after opening.

14. No case from Assam was committed to the Original Jurisdiction of the High Court.

#### Appellate Jurisdiction.

15. Appeals to the High Court.— —Thirteen appeals were pending before the High Court from the previous year, 93 were preferred, and 90 were disposed of during the year, leaving 16 pending at its close. Of the appeals preferred, all were from convictions by Sessions Judges. The number of persons concerned in the appeals was 163. The results of criminal appeals decided in the High Court during the year under review are shown in the following statement :—

17. Appeals to Courts of Session.—The number of appeals disposed of in the courts of session was 1,147 against 1,333 in the previous year. There were 1,973 persons concerned in these appeals. The appeals resulted in confirmation of the original sentence in 1,290 instances or 65.4 per cent.; in modification in 243 instances or 12.3 per cent.; and in reversal in 417 instances or 21.1 per cent. The cases of 23 persons were otherwise disposed of.

18. Appeals to Magistrates.—In the courts of District Magistrates 195 appeals of 437 persons were disposed of during the year. Of the persons concerned, 250 or 57.2 per cent. were altogether unsuccessful, 128 or 29.3 per cent. obtained a reversal and 40 or 9.2 per cent. a modification of their original sentences. The cases of 19 persons were otherwise disposed of.

The proportion of appellants completely or partially successful to the number whose appeals were heard by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates was 34.6 and 42.8 per cent., respectively, against 33.7 and 43.4 in the previous year.

#### **Reference and Revision.**

#### I-HIGH COURT.

19. Three references under section 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for confirmation of death sentences were made to the High Court during 1941 and one was pending at the opening of the year. All the four cases in which four persons were concerned were decided during the year. Three of the accused persons were sentenced to death and one to transportation or penal servitude. Twenty-two cases of revision were pending from the previous year and 188 cases were filed during the year. Of these, 169 were disposed of, leaving 41 cases undecided at the end of the year.

### II-COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

20. Sessions Courts.—The number of applications for revision disposed of in the courts of session was 457 against 402 in the previous year. In these cases, 1,563 persons were implicated. The orders of the lower courts were affirmed in the cases of 1,152 persons, altered in those of 3 and reversed in those of 4 persons. The cases of 404 persons were otherwise disposed of.

21. Magistrates' Courts.—In the courts of the District Magistrates, 163 applications were decided during the year. The number of persons concerned in these cases was 496. The orders of the lower courts were affirmed in the cases of 358 persons, altered in those of 2 and reversed in those of 9 persons. The cases of 127 persons were otherwise disposed of. 22. Receipts and charges.—The charges in the criminal courts amounted to Rs. 6,53,980 and the receipts to Rs. 2,81,941. Compared with the figures of 1940, the charges show an increase of Rs. 32,824 and the receipts a decrease of Rs. 7,302.

The increase in expenditure was principally under the head "Other contingencies and refunds". The decrease in receipts occurred chiefly under the head "Other fees".

23. General.—(a) The number of offences reported during 1941 stood at 60,114 which is 879 less than in 1940 and 2,992 more than in 1939. The number of cases disposed of in the courts of Magistrates rose from 30,072 in 1939 and 30,100 in 1940 to 30,724 in 1941. The percentage of convictions of persons actually tried, which fell from 40.1 in 1939 to 38.5 in 1940, rose to 39.4 in 1941. The cases of 13,422 persons were compounded, withdrawn or dismissed for default in 1941; the figures for 1939 and 1940 were 12,593 and 13,632, respectively.

(b) The total amount of fines realised fell by about Rs. 1,300 as compared with the figure for 1940 and was more by about Rs. 2,300, when compared with that for 1939.

(c) The number of cases disposed of in the courts of session during 1941 was 331 which is 40 less than in 1940 and 13 more than in 1939. There was a gradual fall in the percentage of convictions during the last three years, the figures being 58.4 in 1939, 53.9 in 1940 and 47.8 in 1941.

(d) The number of appeals disposed of in the courts of session which rose from 1,068 in 1939 to 1,333 in 1940, fell to 1,147 in 1941. About 65 per cent., as against 66 in 1940, of the appeals resulted in confirmation of the original sentences and the sentences of the rest were either modified, reversed or otherwise disposed of. Compared with the figures for 1940, appeals to Magistrates show a higher percentage of sentences being upheld and a lower percentage of sentences reversed.

(e) The number of applications for revision disposed of in the courts of session rose from 423 in 1939 and 402 in 1940 to 457 in 1941, while those heard by Magistrates rose from 147 in 1939 to 220 in 1940, but fell to 163 in 1941.

(f) The total number of witnesses examined in the Magistrates' and sessions courts during the year under report fell by 9,339 and 5,857 as compared with the figures for 1939 and 1940, respectively. There was a gradual fall in the number of witnesses detained over three days during the last three years, the figures being 1,085 in 1939, 897 in 1940 and 766 in 1941.

(g) Charges rose by about Rs. 33,000 as compared with the charges for 1940 and by about Rs. 34,000 as compared with those for 1939. Receipts decreased by about Rs. 7,300 as compared with the figure for 1940 and by nearly Rs. 21,600 when compared with that for 1939.

#### Shillong Division,

24. The number of offences reported during the year, combined with the number pending from the previous year, was 697 as against 709 in 1940. Of this number, 421 were under the Indian Penal Code and 276 under Special and Local Laws. Of the total number of cases under enquiry, 610 were found to be true, and of these 474 were brought to trial. During the year 437 cases were decided in the Magistrates' courts and 30 remained pending at its close. Six cases were decided in the sessions court and one remained undecided at the end of the year. The number of witnesses examined was 1,027 and none was detained for more than three days.

There were 601 persons under trial in the Magistrates' courts. The cases of 589 persons were decided and 12 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried, 181 were acquitted or dis-charged and 408 were convicted. The cases of 10 persons in the sessions court ended in their conviction, while that of one remained pending at the close of the year. All the appeals and motions filed during the year have been disposed of.

The total amount of fines imposed was Rs. 8,310. Rs. 2,301-3 was realised, of which Rs. 25 was paid as compensation to complainants. The charges in the criminal courts amounted to Rs. 535-4 and the receipts to Rs. 2,924-2.




