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Annual Report on the Jails of the North West Frontier Province for the year 1930.

REVIEW BY THE CHIEF COMMISSIONER.

In the jail administration of this Province overcrowding has been the most serious problem to be faced, the difficulty of which has been greatly increased during the year under review by a rise in the total number of prisoners admitted from 16,939 in the previous year to 19,750. The total number of convicts admitted also rose from 5.367 to 5,819, and of under-trials from 10,965 to 13,365. The result was that all the jails in the Province were overcrowded throughout the year. This large influx of prisoners is, to a great extent, accounted for by the civil disobedience movement, which in itself contributed a total number of 1,177 prisoners. The daily average of all classes of prisoners during 1930 was 5,305 as against 5,003 in the previous year. As in previous years, surplus prisoners had to be accommodated in barracks, factory sheds and tents. The only solution to the problem of overcrowding lies in the construction of the Haripur Central Jail, which is now nearing completion and is expected to be ready for occupation by December 1931.

It is not surprising that with this excessive overcrowding there should be a corresponding increase in sickness. daily average number of sick of all classes of prisoners was 155 as compared with 103 during the previous year. Among convicts this daily average was 146 against ninety-nine. Admissions for malaria increased from 801 to 1,085, of pneumonia from fifty-two to 122 and of tuberculosis from fifty-nine to 105. The large increase in the tuberculosis cases is due to the fact that no cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were transferred to the Shahpur Jail during the year under review. Twenty-three died of tuberculosis against sixteen in the previous year. The increase in sickness, despite the fact that there was no serious epidemic in any of the jails, leaves no room for doubt that overcrowding acted as a contributory cause to the spread of disease. Judged from another standard also, namely increase or decrease in weight, the health of prisoners was less satisfactory than

during the previous years. Of the 4,354 convicts who were discharged in 1930, 2,255 had gained weight in jail and 620 had lost weight. Although confronted with the difficulties of restricted accommodation, the jail staff has succeeded in maintaining an excellent standard of discipline. There was no instance of an escape from jail, and the decrease in the number of corporal punishments which fell from 1,126 in the previous year to 688 is very satisfactory.

One thousand, seven hundred and twenty-six prisoners were released under the remission system. The Chief Commissioner agrees with the Chief Medical Officer that the system of remissions possesses advantages preferable to the grant of gratuities, so long as it is properly explained to and understood by the convicts.

The number of short term prisoners has formed the subject of recurring comment in the reviews of previous years. The percentage of persons sentenced to short terms of imprisonment not exceeding one month has increased slightly this year and now stands at 7:31 against 7:29 in 1929. This indicates a set back, if only a slight one, and the Chief Commissioner looks to district magistrates to impress upon the subordinate magistracy the inefficacy of short terms of imprisonment.

The percentage of literate offenders has risen from 3.9 in 1928 and 3.1 in 1929 to 9.5 during the year under report. This abrupt rise is largely attributable to the civil disobedience movement.

During the year 9,985 male and 236 female prisoners were admitted into the nine judicial lock-ups in this Province. The daily average numbers were 4:0 males and eleven females against the mean daily average of 324 males and nine females of the preceding five years. The cost per head for maintenance has increased from Rs. 167-1-3 in 1929 to Rs. 174-2-10, owing perhaps to a large influx of civil disobedience prisoners, a number of whom were placed in special classes. Only twenty-three per cent. of the prisoners were convicted as against twenty per cent. convicted during 1929. The percentage of convictions still stands at a low figure. The low percentage of final convictions compared with the high figure for the daily average of under-trial prisoners has formed the subject of adverse criticism in previous reviews. Under-trial prisoners are a great expense to Government, as well as a source of trouble to the jail administration, and the Chief Commissioner cannot but feel that, when so few of

The word "corporal" occurring before the word "punishments" in the seventh line on page 2 of the Chief Commissioner's review on the Annual Report on the Jails of the North West Frontier Province for the year 1930 may please be deleted.

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There has been an unfortunate decrease in total cash profits from jail manufacture from Rs. 49,716 in 1929 to Rs. 37,197, and in the earning per head of those employed in the factories from Rs. 35-7-0 in 1929 to Rs. 24-10-0. The Chief Commissioner agrees that the causes of this decrease lie to a very great extent in the disturbances following upon political agitation, but he considers that this fall in profits is also due, to some extent, to the comparatively small purchase of jail-manufactured articles by Government departments. The Chief Commissioner hopes that heads of departments will encourage the purchase of jail-manufactured articles as far as is compatible with the principles of economy, and thus help to restore jail profits to their normal level.

The total expenditure on the guarding and maintenance of prisoners increased from Rs. 6,44,232 in 1929 to Rs. 6,49,696 during the year under review, but the average cost per prisoner dropped from Rs. 139-3-9 to Rs. 133-4-9. The increase in expenditure was therefore mainly due to the increase in population and was most marked under establishment charges, charges for moving prisoners, charges for other miscellaneous services and supplies, and extraordinary charges.

The Chief Commissioner's acknowledgments are due to Lieutenant-Colonel C. I. Brierley, C.I.E., who held charge of the jail administration throughout the year, to Captain A. E. D. Harvey, I. M. D., Superintendent of the Peshawar Central Jail, and to Rai Sahib Pandit Parma Nand, Superintendent, Central Jail, Dera Ismail Khan.

SIR,

1. Introductory-

I have the honour to submit the Annual Administration Report of the North West Frontier Province Jail Department for the year 1930. I hold the Office of Inspector-General throughout the year.

JUDICIAL.

2. Number of jails and lock-ups-

The number of jails and lock-ups remained the same as in the previous year. They numbered five and nine respectively. If the police lock-ups and the lock-ups in agencies are also included their number will exceed ninety.

3. General summary of all classes of prisoners-

The total number of all classes of prisoners admitted during the year was 19,750 as compared with 15,193 the — average number for the preceding five years — there being

an increase of 4,557 during the year under report. This is shown in the following table:—

The above table shows that there was an increase among all classes of prisoners except civil prisoners as compared with the previous year resulting in serious overcrowding in all jails and lock-ups during the year.

4. Numbers and disposal of convicted prisoners -

Statement No. I.—The number of convicts admitted into the jails (excluding lock-ups) was 3,743 that is to say there were 355 less new admissions of convicts than the preceding year, but the daily average number was 4,392 as compared with 4,196 in the year 1929, that is, 196 more than in the previous year. The number of executions was thirty-one as compared with twenty in 1929. Deaths among convicts numbered eighty as compared with fifty-one in 1929. Releases were made on the following grounds:—

5. Religion of convicts admitted-

Statement No. II.—Of the total number of convicts admitted 4,837 were Muhammadans, 256 Hindus and Sikhs, two Christians and nine all other classes. The percentage of Muhammadans was 94.8 and of Hindus 5.0 against 96.6 and 3.1 respectively in the year 1929.

6. Admissions according to age-

At the beginning of the year there were two juveniles under sixteen years of age and seventeen juviniles were admitted during the year as compared with twenty-eight, the annual average for the preceding five years. Of these twelve were released, one was transferred to the Borstal Institute, Lahore, five were transferred to the Reformatory School, Delhi, and the remaining one was detained in this Province.

7. Education and previous occupation-

The percentage of literate convicts admitted during the year was 9.5 against 3.1 in 1929. The percentage of male and female prisoners to the free population was 0.44 males 0.008 females.

8. Nature and length of the sentences-

The number of prisoners sentenced to periods not exceeding one month was 373, being 7.31 of the total number of convicts admitted. It will be noted that the number of such sentences still reaches a high figure. Four convicts under sentence of death remained in the jails on 31 December 1929 and sixty-one convicts were sentenced to

death during 1930 as compared with twenty-three in 1929. Of the total number sentenced to death thirty-one were executed during the year.

9. Previously convicted prisoners-

Statement No. IV.—Three hundred and sixty-six convicts were received in default of finding security during the year. Of these 175 had no previous conviction. Only ten youthful offenders under fifteen years of age were admitted, none of them had been previously convicted.

10. Particulars regarding habitual prisoners-

In the following statement particulars are given regarding habitual prisoners admitted in the five jails in the Province. This constituted only seven per cent. of the total admission:—

11. Prisoners in jails awaiting trial-

Statement No. XVIII.—At the beginning of the year 346 prisoners awaited trial in all the jails, 6,334 were received during the year and 574 remained at the last day of December 1930. The daily average number was 470 as compared with 417—the annual average for the five years ending 1929. Of the total number of 6,680, prisoners

twenty-three percent. were convicted, sixty-eight per cent. were acquitted or released, 0.07 per cent. died and the remainder were still awaiting trial.

12. Prisoners confined in lock-ups apart from jails -

Appendix to statement No. XVIII.—During the year under report 9,985 male and 236 female prisoners were admitted into the nine judicial lock-ups. The number remaining at the beginning of the year was 300 male and eight female prisoners. The daily average numbers were 420 males and eleven females, whilst the mean daily average numbers for the preceding five years were 324 males and 9 females. The figures recorded are greater than in the previous year owing to the disturbance on account of civil disobediences. The cost per head for maintenance was Rs. 174-2-10 as compared with Rs. 188-3-11 annual average cost for past five years. Four deaths occurred among the under-trials confined in these lock-ups. There has been no case of escape from lock-ups during the year.

13. Escapes and recapture of convicts-

Statement No. V.-No prisoner escaped during the year under report.

14. Imposition of fetters-

During the year 2,256 convicts were fettered as compared with 2,571 in the previous year. In 2,f13 cases fetters were imposed for safe custody and in 143 cases as a punishment.

15. Offences committed by convicts-

Statement No. VI.—This statement shows the number of offences committed by convicts and the punishments

unflicted on them. The number of major and mino punishments awarded by the superintendents was 385 and 303 respectively, amounting in total to 688 against 1,136 in 1929. The ratio of punishments in the daily average was sixteen as compared with thirty-one—the mean average ratio for the preceding five years. The punishments awarded were on account of breaches of jail discipline. There has been a considerable decrease in this respect which means that the discipline in the jails has been remarkably good.

16. Corporal punishments-

The total number of corporal punishments was twentyone against seven—the mean average for the five years
ending 1929. These were inflicted in the Peshawar and
Dera Ismail Khan Central Jails. These floggings were
administered for the following offences:—

Two were flogged for assulting convict officials.

Two for refusing to work.

Six for assualting officials.

Eleven political agitators for shouting revolutionary slogans

Eleven political agitators for shouting revolutionary elogans and attempting to subvert discipline in spite of warnings.

17. Comparison between punishments inflicted on habitual and casual prisoners—

The daily average number of habituals was 570 and in all 81 punishments were inflicted on them. These comprised 1 corporal, 54 major and 26 minor punishments. The ratio of punishments was fourteen in the case of habituals while in the case of casuals it was sixteen.

18. Remission system-

Statement C.—During the year under report 1,726 prisoners were released under the remission system. The maximum remission earned was 2,485 days, the original sentence being twenty years. As pointed out in the last year's report the remission system is explained to the convicts at certain parades and is well understood by them.

Prisoners prefer remission to a gratuity for extraoutturn of work or exceptionally good work and therefore no gratuities are given to them. The award of special remission has a great effect in improving the quality and quantity of work.

19. Convict officers-

Prisoners were employed as convict officers during the year at daily average of 428. The percentage of those thus employed to the daily average population was ten against eleven in the last year. This class of official, as heretofore, behaved well and rendered valuable service during the year.

20. Scale of diet-

The scale of diet of prisoners as laid down in the Punjab Jail Manual was adhered to throughout the year, except that the wheat flour was issued to prisoners throughout the year in the interest of the health of the prisoners. This has been found very satisfactory.

FINANCIAL.

21. Expenditure on guarding and maintenance-

Statement No. IX.—The expenditure on guarding and maintenance of prisoners, including the cost of supervision, but excluding that of buildings and repairs, was Rs. 6,49,696 as compared with Rs. 6,44,232 in the previous year. The average cost per head was Rs. 133-4-9 as compared with Rs. 139-3-9. The increase in the population is responsible for the increase in the expenditure during the year. The detailed causes of this increase of expenditure are explained in the following paragraphs under the proper heads of expenditure.

22. Establishment charges-

Establishment charges amounted to Rs. 2,14,210 as compared with Rs. 2,02,512. This shows an increase of Rs. 11,698. The cause of increase is mainly due to the grant of—

(1) periodical increments to the whole-time superintendents of Dera Ismail Khan and Bannu Jails;

(2) periodical increments to the jailors and warders staff in the Province; and

(3) to the entertainment of fifty additional warders for the Peshawar Central Jail.

23. Dietary charges-

The total expenditure under this head was Rs. 2,36,964 as compared with Rs. 2,48,368 in the previous year. The decrease under this head is mainly due to the cheapness of food-stuffs. The cost of dieting per head was Rs. 49-4-11 against Rs. 54-8-0 in 1929. Vegetables grown in the jail gardens by convict labour were supplied to the prisoners free of cost. This contributed towards reducing the dietary charges by Rs. 42,848. A sum of Rs. 1,587 was realized on account of garden produce issued to political and civil prisoners and was paid into the treasury. The sale of vegetables to public has been discontinued as mentioned in the last year's report.

24. Hospital charges-

The total expenditure under this head was Rs. 26,828 as compared with Rs. 26,610.

25. Clothing and bedding-

The total expenditure under this head was Rs. 75,149 as compared with Rs. 90,435 in 1929. The decrease is due to the purchase of less clothing during the year owing to there being sufficient stock to meet requirements.

26. Sanitation charges-

The total expenditure under this head was Rs. 7,224 as compared with Rs. 7,784.

27. Charges for moving prisoners-

Under this head a sum Rs. 10,409 was expended during the year against Rs. 6,666. The cause of increase is due to transfer of a large number of prisoners to other jails including fifty prisoners who had volunteered to proceed to the Andamans as colonists.

28. Charges for other miscellaneous services and supplies—

During the year the total expenditure under this head was Rs. 44,365 against Rs. 40,563 in the last year. The increase is mainly due to the increase in expenditure on electric lights provided in jails and also to the provision of uniform to warders in the Peshawar Central Jail.

29. Travelling allowance-

The expenditure incurred under this head amounted to Rs. 5,283 as compared with Rs. 5,665. The decrease is due to the fact that less transfers were made among the staff during the year.

30. Contingencies-

The total expenditure for contingencies stood at Rs. 9,971 against Rs. 8,875 in 1929.

31. Extraordinary charges-

Under this head the expenditure amounted to Rs. 19,298 during the year under report as compared with Rs. 6,754 in 1929. The cause of increase is mainly due to the purchase of forty-two tents and to the purchase of a disinfector and three Alladin gas lamps for the use of jails in the North West Frontier Province.

32. Employment of prisoners-

Statement No. X1.—The average number of prisoners sentenced to labour was 4,257 and the daily average number of sick among them was 154. The prisoners were employed as follows:—

33. Result of manufactory operation-

Statement No. XII-A.—The total cash profit during the year amounted to Rs. 37,197 as compared with Rs. 49,716 and the earning, per head, of those employed on jail manufacture was Rs. 24-10-0 as compared with Rs. 35-7-0 during the previous year. The decrease in the profits earned was mainly due to very little business being transacted during the year owing to disturbances following upon the political agitation engineered by the local population. The sale of khaddar cloth, the principal purchasers of which are the Afridis, dropped practically to nothing, while the sale of durries, carpets, articles of leather and fancy cotton articles, the principal purchasers of which are the Europeans, was considerably reduced.

There was a deficit of Rs. 1,720 in the factory of woollen articles in the Dera Ismail Khan Jail, which is due to outstanding bills.

34. Indirect profit-

Indirect profits, excluding the manufactory profits, amounted to Rs. 3,40,120 during the year under report as compared with Rs. 3,52,877. This profit represents the value of labour employed gratis either on repairing articles for the use of prisoners, or on guarding and repairing the buildings, etc. The cause of decrease is mainly due to the fact that the cost of vegetables and condiments has been calculated at market rates, viz. Rs. 2-8-0 and Rs. 8 per maund respectively, whilst in last year it was calculated at the rate of Rs. 5 and Rs. 13-5-0 respectively.

35. Total cost of maintenance-

Statement No. XIII.—The total cost of maintaining the prisoners was Rs. 6,49,696. After deducting the cash profits, namely Rs. 37,197, the net cost of the maintenance was Rs. 6,12,499 against Rs. 5,94,516, and the cost per head worked at Rs. 124-9-0 as compared with Rs. 128-8-0 during the previous year.

VITAL STATISTICS.

36. Accommodation-

Statement A.—The total jail accommodation available at the end of the year made provision for 3,861 prisoners as compared with 3,888 prisoners in the last year, the daily average of all classes of prisoners during the year was

4,874. The prisoners for whom there was no accommodation were kept in barracks, factory shed and tents. All the jails were overcrowded throughout the year.

37. Sickness and mortality-

Statement No. XIV.—The daily average number of sick of all classes of prisoners was 155, giving a ratio of thirty-two per thousand of average strength. There were eighty-six deaths among them during the year under report. In the case of convicts alone the daily average number of sick was 146 while the number of deaths was 80.

38. Admissions and deaths from chief diseases-

Statement No. XV.—The general health of the prisoners confined in the jails during the year under report was fairly good in spite of serious overcrowding and increase in average population. The total admissions during the year was 3,022 as compared with 2,041 in the previous year. The following table shows the chief diseases causing admissions and deaths as compared with the previous year:—

No cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were transferred to the Shahpur Jail during the year. Out of the ten cases remaining from last year in the Shahpur jail nine were discharged and one is still detained in that jail.

39. Mortality amongst convicts according to length of time in prison—

Statement No. XVII.—Out of a total of eighty convicts who died during the year, thirty-two had been in prison for less than one year, twenty-eight for more than one year and less than three years, fifteen for more than three years and less than seven years, and the remaining five for more than seven years.

40. Increase or decrease in weight of convicts discharged—

Statement B.—4,354 convicts were released during the year. Of these 2,255 prisoners had gained weight in jail, while 620 had lost weight during their confinement.

BUILDINGS.

41. Expenditure on jail works-

The annual expenditure on jail buildings during the year amounted to Rs. 97,732, out of which a sum of Rs. 10,782 was spent on repairs and Rs. 80,969 on original works by Public Works Department, the balance Rs. 5,981 was spent on petty construction and repairs by the Jail Department.

The following are the most important works completed

by the Public Works Department :-

Peshawar Central Jail.

(1) Building barracks for under-trial prisoners.

(2) Strengthening the iron railing in various departments of the Central Jail, Peshawar.

(3) Providing barbed wire fencing along weak portions of the jail wall.

Dera Ismail Khan Central Jail.

(1) Constructing two barracks for four head warders and forty-six warders.

(2) Replacing the old prisoners cooking shed by a

new one,

Bannu Jail.

Purchase of land for Superintendent of Jail's quarters at Bannu.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

43. General-

The Haripur Central Jail will be completed and occupied on or about 1st November 1931. All the prisoners now confined in our jails over the sanctioned accommodation will be sent to the new Central Jail at Haripur, and the existing overcrowding will thus be relieved. The North West Frontier Province prisoners now in Punjab and in other provinces will also be taken back and accommodated in the Haripur Central Jail.

During the year under report 1,177 political prisoners were convicted and confined in the jails in this Province.

Of these 468 were released under general amnesty.

A considerable disturbance occurred in the Peshawar Central Jail in April 1930. This was engineered by the political prisoners on the night of 24th April. A few political prisoners were sent to this jail and on their entry into the jail they began to shout revolutionary slogans and incited the other prisoners to mutiny. The disturbance was, however, quickly quelled. Since then the casual prisoners have been unusually well behaved.

On the other hand the conduct of the political prisoners has not been at all satisfactory. The subversive elements among them have done their best to create trouble by seizing every opportunity of exaggerating grievances, and thus harrassing the executive staff of the jail and doing their best to make the task of the authorities as difficult as possible. In spite of the innumerable difficulties encountered, it has been possible to maintain strict discipline.

There has been no serious epidemic disease in the

jails in spite of the acute overcrowding.

I am glad to record the very good services which Captain Harvey, I. M. D., has rendered to Government throughout the year as Superintendent of the Peshawar Central Jail. The difficulties he and all superintendents throughout India had to contend with in keeping order and discipline in jails, in spite of ceaseless political agitation and non-cooperation, have probably had no parallel during the whole history of British rule in India.

As reported last year, the work of my office has been considerably increased and it will be further increased to a great extent by the addition of a new Central Jail at Haripur.

In spite of the heavy work, my office staff did its best to keep pace with it. My thanks are due to all those who helped me in keeping the work up to date and accurate.

My Jail Accountant, Lala Devi Chand, carried on his

duties most satisfactorily inspite of constant overwork.

Similarly, Rai Sahib Pt. Parma Nand, Superintendent, Central Jail, Dera Ismail Khan, did excellent work during the year. He is one of my best superintendents among the Indian staff.

Head Jailor Lala Hukam Chand of Peshawar Central Jail has also done exceptionally good work under constant strain throughout the year and he and his staff are to be much congratulated on their devoted services for Government.
