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AND CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PROVINCE OF SIND FOR THE YEAR 1940.

- I. Preliminary remarks.—The area of the territories to which the statements relate is 46,506 square miles, and the population 38,84,277 according to the census of 1931.
- 2. Judicial staff.—(a) The Chief Court of Sind was presided over by the Honourable Sir Godfrey Davis, Knight, Barristerat-Law, I.C.S., from 1st January to 31st December 1940.

The following were the Honourable Judges of the Chief Court of Sind:—

- (1) The Honourable Mr. Justice Charles M. Lobo, LL.B., from 1st February to 23rd December 1940.
- (2) The Honourable Mr. Justice E. Weston, I.C.S., from 1st January to 31st December 1940.

- 9 District Magistrates, including the City Magistrate, Karachi, who is also Additional District Magistrate, Karachi.

177 Stipendiary Magistrates, including one President, Juvenile Court, Karachi, and one Principal Officer, Mercantile and Marine Department and First Class Magistrate, Keamari.

- 4 Lady Magistrates (First Class Honorary Magistrates attached to the Juvenile Court, Karachi).
- 3. Inspection.—The annual cold weather tour for the inspection of the Courts in Sind was made in February and March 1941 by the Honourable the Chief Judge and by the Honourable Mr. Justice E. Weston.

The following Courts were inspected by the Honourable the Chief Judge:—

The District and Sessions Court, Hyderabad, the First Class Subordinate Court, Hyderabad, and the Courts of the City Magistrate, the Additional City Magistrate, the Extra Joint Subordinate Judge and First Class Magistrate and the Mukhtiarkar and First Class Magistrate, Hyderabad. In addition, the Honourable the Chief Judge visited the Civil and Criminal Courts at Nawabshah.

The following Courts were inspected by the Honourable Mr. Justice E. Weston:—

The District and Sessions Court, Larkana, the First Class Subordinate Court, Larkana, the Court of the Resident Magistrate, Larkana, and the Subordinate Court, Sehwan. In addition, the Honourable Mr. Justice E. Weston visited Dadu.

The District Judge, Hyderabad, inspected all the Second Class Subordinate Courts in the Hyderabad District; the District Judge, Sukkur, inspected the Subordinate Courts of Sukkur and Shikarpur while the Assistant Judge, Sukkur, inspected the Subordinate Court of Jacobabad and the District Judge, Larkana, inspected the Subordinate Court of Sehwan, while the Subordinate Court of Mehar was inspected by the Assistant Judge, Larkana.

4. Vacation.—The Chief Court of Sind was closed for the annual vacation from 29th May to 28th June 1940.

Criminal Justice.

5. Offences reported.—The number of offences reported in Sind, during the year under review, was 50,856 and shows a decrease of 5,149 compared with the figures of the preceding year.

There was an increase in the number of offences reported in the Hyderabad, Nawabshah, Thar Parkar, Sukkur, Larkana and Dadu Districts while there was a decrease in the City of Karachi, and in the Karachi and Upper Sind Frontier Districts. Of the total number of offences reported in Sind, 16,724 were under the Indian Penal Code and 34,132 under Special and Local Laws.

There was an increase in the number of offences reported under the following heads:—

- 6. Complaints dismissed and complainants fined.—The number of complaints dismissed in Sind, under section 203, Criminal Procedure Code, was 992 and the number of complainants fined under section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code, was 110.
- 7. Cases found to be true.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry in Sind, 49,754 were found to be true. The number of cases brought to trial in Sind excluding those withdrawn and including those pending from the previous year was 51,534. The number of cases found to be true and the number of cases brought to trial show a decrease of 5,044 and 4,900, respectively, on the figures of 1939.

Cases tried in the Courts of Magistrates, Stipendiary and Honorary, in the City of Karachi.

8. Cases tried.—The number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of Magistrates in the City of Karachi was 19,244. This number shows a decrease of 8,557 on the figures of the previous year. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 17,077 or 9,004 less than in 1939, and the number of cases under the Indian Penal Code was 2,167 or 447 more than in 1939.

- 9. Dismissals.—During the year 17,030 regular and 84 miscellaneous cases were disposed of and 2,214 regular cases were pending at the close of the year.
- 10. Results of trials.—The number of persons under trial before the Courts of Magistrates in the City of Karachi and the results of trials are shown in Appendix A.

Of the persons tried for offences under the Indian Penal Code, 989 were convicted and 1,839 were acquitted or discharged.

II. Punishments.—Of the persons convicted, 299 were punished with imprisonment, 14,638 with fine and 73 with whipping. 35 convicted persons were released after admonition, 6 persons were sent to a Certified School, 28 were released on probation of good conduct under section 562, Criminal Procedure Code, and I was sent to the Borstal Institution at Dharwar.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 55,468-2-6. The total amount realized was Rs. 39,988-9-7 of which Rs. 1,493-4-0 was paid as compensation to complainants.

Cases tried in the Courts of Magistrates in the Karachi, Hyderabad, Nawabshah, Thar Parkar, Sukkur, Upper Sind Frontier, Larkana and Dadu Districts.

The fines imposed by Magistrates in the Karachi, Hyderabad, Nawabshah, Thar Parkar, Sukkur, Upper Sind Frontier, Larkana and Dadu Districts aggregated to Rs. 2,18,254-3-10. The total amount realized was Rs. 1,41,918-7-4 of which Rs. 5,519-4-9 were paid as compensation to complainants.

Fines to the amount of Rs. 29,537-0-0 were imposed by the Courts of Session during the year. The total realization during the year amounted to Rs. 17,082-3-10 which sum includes fines due in previous years and no amount of fine was paid as compensation.

18. The number of offences affecting life and attempts at such offences fell from 642 to 604 in the year under report. A large part of this crime specially in Hyderabad, Thar Parkar, Sukkur, Upper Sind Frontier and Larkana Districts arose from intrigues or supposed intrigues with women. The following statement shows the cases of murder and their motives during the year under report:

In the Upper Sind Frontier District 42 cases of murder and culpable homicide not amounting to murder were tried under the Sind Frontier Regulation, 1892. Out of these in 29 cases the motive was connected with women.

Appeals decided by the Courts of Magistrates.

19. Appeals decided and results of appeals.—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 289. Of these, the appeals of 64 were summarily dismissed and sentences of 97 were confirmed after admission, making a total of 161 wholly unsuccessful appellants or 55.7 per cent. Of the remainder, 31 (or 10.7 per cent.) obtained a modification of sentences of 8 appellants were otherwise disposed of. As compared with 1939 the results were more favourable to the appellants.

Appeals decided by Courts of Session including the Chief Court of Sind (Sessions Jurisdiction).

20. Appeals decided and results of appeals.—The number of appeals decided during the year was 1,683 as against 1,533 in the preceding year showing an increase of 150.

During the year the number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Session was 2,184. The appeals of 964 persons (or 34.8 per cent.) were summarily dismissed; 489 appellants whose appeals were admitted were wholly unsuccessful, 181 obtained an alteration of sentence, 508 were acquitted and the cases of 42 appellants were otherwise disposed of. If admitted appeals only are considered, the results were on the whole less favourable to the appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants during the year being 56.5 as against 58.1 in 1939.

Appeals decided by the Chief Court of Sind (Appellate Criminal Jurisdiction).

21. Appeals decided.—49 appeals were pending before the Chief Court of Sind (Appellate Criminal Jurisdiction) at the beginning of the year from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts. During the year 340 appeals were preferred and 324 decided, leaving 65 pending at its close. Out of these 3 were acquittal appeals filed by the Provincial Government. The number of appeals preferred by the Provincial Government is more by 97 and 75, respectively, and decided during the year is more by 97 and 75, respectively, than those of the preceding year and the number of appeals pending at the close of the year is more by 16 than that of the preceding year. All these appeals were preferred against the sentences year. All these appeals were preferred against the sentences year. All these appeals (including the Chief Court of Sind, Sessions Jurisdiction).

Results of appeals.—323 appeals against the sentences passed by Courts of Session (including the Chief Court of Sind, Sessions Jurisdiction), were decided. The sentences were upheld in 257 cases, reversed in 43 and modified in 19 cases. In 2 cases sentences were enhanced, in 1 case the conviction was confirmed but the sentences were ordered to be consecutive instead of being but the sentences were ordered in the remaining 1 case. One concurrent and retrial was ordered in the remaining 1 case. One concurrent and retrial Government against the order of acquittal appeal by the Provincial Government against the year. The Chief Court did not interfere and dismissed the same.

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Reference and Revision.

- 23. Magistrates' Courts.—The cases of 99 accused persons, who applied for revision or against whom applications were made by complainants came before the District Magistrates for revision. The number was less by I than in 1939. The applications of 80 applicants were rejected and those of 19 were otherwise disposed of.
- 24. Sessions Courts.—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them by the Courts of Magistrates, and those against whom applications were made by complainants, the cases of 651 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Session (including the Chief Court of Sind, Sessions Jurisdiction) during the year. The number was more by 13 than in 1939. Applications of 373 persons were rejected and those of 278 were otherwise disposed of.
- 25. Chief Court of Sind (Appellate Criminal Jurisdiction.) Reference.—During the year 1940, 66 cases under section 438, and I case under section 215, Criminal Procedure Code were reported for the orders of the Chief Court of Sind (Appellate Criminal Jurisdiction), by the Sessions Judges and District Magistrates and 15 cases under section 438 were pending at the commencement of the year. Of these, 69 cases under section 438 were decided during the year and 12 remained pending at its close. The number reported was more by 13 and 1, respectively, in cases reported under sections 438 and 215, Criminal Procedure Code, than those reported in 1939. Out of the 66 cases reported under section 438, Criminal Procedure Code and the 15 cases pending from the previous year, sentences were enhanced in 5 cases, reduced or altered in 6 cases and reversed in II cases. In 2 cases proceedings were quashed. In 2 cases the references were accepted and the accused were sent to the Borstal Institution. In II cases retrial was ordered. In 15 cases the Chief Court did not interfere and returned the same. In 2 cases the orders of the lower Courts were set aside and further inquiry was ordered. One case was accepted and it was transferred as desired. 14 cases were otherwise disposed of and 12 cases remained pending at the close of the year. In the I case reported under section 215, Criminal Procedure Code, the commitment order was quashed and a retrial was ordered.

Orders were passed under sections 435 and 439 of the Code of Criminal Procedure in 158 cases, a decrease of 10 cases on the figures of the previous year. Out of these 144 cases came before the Chief Court of Sind (Appellate Criminal Jurisdiction), 3 were reported by the Provincial Government and 11 cases were taken up by the Court suo motu. Of the 144 cases for issue of rule, 101

were rejected and 2 were allowed to be withdrawn. Of the 41 cases in which the rules were issued, 21 were made absolute in their entirety and in I the order complained of was modified and in I the proceedings were quashed. In 8 the orders were reversed. 2 were returned to the lower Courts to proceed with the same according to law and in 4 retrial was ordered. The remaining 4 cases were otherwise disposed of. As regards the 3 cases reported by the Provincial Government, the Chief Court did not interfere with I case and dismissed the same and discharged the accused. In I case the Chief Court set aside the order of the lower Court and the remaining I case was otherwise disposed of. In the II cases taken up by the Court suo motu, sentences were enhanced in 3 cases, and sentence was passed against the accused in I case. In I case the Chief Court set aside the order of the lower Court. in 2 cases sentences were reversed and the accused were discharged. In 2 cases retrial was ordered and the remaining 2 cases were otherwise disposed of.

- 26. Chief Court of Sind (Appellate Criminal Jurisdiction)—
 References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.—60 references under this section were submitted to the Chief Court of Sind (Appellate Criminal Jurisdiction) during the year for confirmation of death sentences and 6 were pending at the commencement. 53 cases involving 67 accused were decided during the year. The sentence of death was confirmed in the case of 40 persons and commuted to that of transportation for life in the case of 20 and the remaining 7 accused were acquitted. 13 cases consisting of 21 persons were pending at the close of the year.
- 27. Chief Court of Sind (Appellate Criminal Jurisdiction). Applications for transfer.—133 applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases from one Court or District to another were received during the year and 9 were pending at the commencement of the year. Of these 138 were decided during the year and 4 remained pending at its close. 79 were summarily rejected. In the remaining 59 applications in which rules were issued, transfers were granted in 19 and refused in 40.
- 28. Chief Court of Sind (Appellate Criminal Jurisdiction). Miscellaneous applications.—17 applications for bail were disposed of by the Chief Court of Sind (Appellate Criminal Jurisdiction) during the year.

The Criminal work disposed of by the Chief Court of Sind (Appellate Criminal Jurisdiction) in the year under report as compared with that of 1939 and the arrears at the end of the year are shown in Appendix E.

CIVIL JUSTICE.

I.—Courts of Subordinate Judges (who are invested with the Jurisdiction of a Court of Small Causes).

29. Original suits instituted.—The number of suits instituted in 1940 was 14,709 a decrease of 917 compared with the figures of the previous year. There was a decrease in money suits to the extent of 7.2 per cent. while there was an increase in title and other suits to the extent of 4.3 per cent. The number of money suits was 12,756 as against 13,753 in 1939, and that of title and other suits, 1,953 as against 1,873 in 1939.

The total value of suits instituted in 1940 amounted to Rs. 72,87,923-5-5 there being an increase of Rs. 19,58,130-3-12 over the total of 1939.

- 30. Local distribution.—The number of suits instituted in 1940 showed a decrease in all the Judicial Districts of Hyderabad, Sukkur and Larkana.
- 31. Number of suits disposed of.—In addition to 14,709 suits instituted during the year and 5,233 suits pending from the previous year, 396 were revived or received on remand or by transfer and 65 were otherwise received making a total of 20,403 for disposal. The number of suits disposed of during the year was 15,697, a decrease of 1,790 over the figure of the previous year. The number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure was 8,362 and under the Small Cause Court procedure was 7,335.
- 32. Results of suits decided.—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, 3,216 (or 20.1 per cent.) were disposed of without trial, 3,128 (or 19.9 per cent.) were disposed of ex parte, 639 (or 4.1 per cent.) on admission of claim, 5,244 (or 33.4 per cent.) by compromise, 2,042 (or 13.0 per cent) after full trial, 1,289 (or 8.2 per cent.) on reference to arbitration, 139 (or 0.9 per cent.) by transfer. Of the suits decided after full trial, 1,743 (or 85.4 per cent.) resulted in favour of plaintiffs and 299 (or 14.6 per cent.) in favour of the defendants
- 33. Pending suits.—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 4,706 as against 5,233 in the previous year.

Of the pending cases, 495 have been pending more than a year, this shows a decrease of 91 compared with the figure of the previous year. Of the suits pending over a year, 117 were in the Courts of Subordinate Judges in the Hyderabad District, 205 in the Courts of Subordinate Judges in the Sukkur District and 173 in the Courts of Subordinate Judges in the Larkana District.

34. The average duration in days of suits decided in the Courts of Subordinate Judges is as shown in the tabular statement given below:—

35. Execution proceedings.—There were 3,958 applications for execution pending from the previous year and 14,187 new applications were filed during the year. Out of the total number of applications before the Courts, 14,557 were disposed of during the year and 3,588 remained pending at its close.

The total amount realized in the Courts of Subordinate Judges was Rs. 6,66,106-4-2.

Debtors were imprisoned in 10 cases, moveable property sold in 95 and immoveable property in 111.

36. Miscellaneous cases.—The number of institutions of miscellaneous cases rose from 538 to 576 while the disposals fell from 608 to 588. The number of miscellaneous cases pending at the

close of the year fell from 272 to 268. Of the 588 miscellaneous cases disposed of, 189 were disposed of without trial, 63 were disposed of ex parte, 177 on admission of claim, 11 by compromise, 142 after full trial, 2 on reference to arbitration and 4 by transfer. Of the 142 cases decided after full trial, 85 or 59.3 per cent. resulted in favour of the plaintiffs.

38. Insolvency petitions.—The number of petitions pending at the end of the year 1939 was 54 and the number instituted during the year 1940 was 76 making a total of 130 for disposal in 1940. Of these 58 were decided and 72 remained pending at the close of the year. There were 29 petitions pending over one year at the close of the year. Of the petitions decided, 31 were decided exparte, the average duration being 138 days, and 23 were decided after full trial, the average duration being 327 days. The number of insolvents discharged was 21 as against 28 in 1939.

II.—Karachi Small Causes Court.

39. The figures of suits instituted, disposed of and pending at the close of the year 1940, in the Karachi Small Causes Court, were 6,847, 7,152 and 1,764, respectively.

The figures of suits instituted, disposed of and of suits pending at the close of the year show a decrease of 422, 321 and 210, respectively when compared with the figures of the previous year.

There was a general decrease in the institution of all suits ranging from a value not exceeding Rs. 10 up to a value not exceeding Rs. 2,000. The total value of litigation was Rs. 10,46,621-3-0 as against Rs. 10,96,335-0-7 in the preceding year.

- 40. Mode of disposal.—Of the 7,152 suits disposed of, 426 were decided without trial, 3,293 were decided ex parte, 1,955 on admission of claim, 513 by compromise, 861 after full trial and 104 on reference to arbitration.
- 41. The average duration in days of suits disposed of without trial was 59, of those decided ex parte 61, of those decided on admission of claim 63, of those decided by compromise 59, of those decided after full trial 131 and of those decided on reference to arbitration 130.
- 42. Execution of decrees.—Of the 6,309 applications for execution of decrees that were before the Courts during the year (including 917 pending from the previous year), 5,127 were disposed of and 1,182 were pending at the close of the year. Of those pending at the close of the year, 686 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of, 1,236 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 3,891 were returned as wholly infructuous.
- 43. Coercive process.—In order to enforce the execution of decrees, imprisonment was ordered in 50 cases and sale of moveables in 168. The number of cases of imprisonment show a decrease of 26 while the number of cases in which moveable property was sold show an increase of 20 over the figures of the previous year.

III.—District Courts and the Chief Court of Sind (Original Jurisdiction).

- 44. Original suits for disposal.—The number of suits pending in the District Courts and in the Chief Court of Sind at the end of the year 1939 was 446 and the number instituted during the year 1940 was 368. The number of suits revived was 3. The number of suits for disposal in 1940 thus was 817 as against 851 in 1939.
- 45. Original suits disposed of.—The number of suits decided was 268 and the number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 549. This number is more by 103 than the corresponding number at the end of the previous year. Of the suits left undisposed of at the end of the year 1940, 339 were ready for trial and in arrears, an increase of 115 suits compared with the figure of the previous year. There were 277 suits whose hearing had been pending for over one year. This is an increase of 59 suits on the figure of the previous year.

47. Insolvency petitions.—The number of petitions pending at the end of the year 1939 was 8 and the number instituted during the year 1940 was 38 making a total of 46 for disposal in 1940. Of these 44 were decided and 2 remained pending at the close of the year 1940. No petitions were pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the petitions decided, 28 were decided ex parte, the average duration being 2 days, and 2 were decided after full trial, the average duration being 282 days. 9 were withdrawn, the average duration being 232 days. 5 were not contested, the average duration 49 days. The number of insolvents discharged was 84 as against were annulled in the Chief Court of Sind. The number of undischarged insolvents in the said Court was 68.

- 48. Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, etc.—During the year 1940, 73 petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, 17 Pauper petitions for leave to sue or to defend in forma pauperis, 11 petitions under the Indian Companies Act, 3 petitions under the Indian Trusts Act, 166 petitions under the Guardians and Wards Act, 11 petitions under the Land Acquisition Act and 11 petitions under the Lunacy Act were filed for disposal.
- 49. Awards under the Indian Arbitration Act, 1899.—The number of awards filed during the year was 218.
- 50. Applications for execution of decrees.—The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was 1,094 and the number of application filed during the year was 1,266 making a total of 2,360 for disposal. Of these in 96 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 261 satisfaction was obtained in part and 1,025 were wholly infructuous making a total of 1,382 disposed of and 978 applications remained pending at the close of the year.

The number of execution applications disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 16. The number of decrees received from other Courts for execution during the year was 141.

- 51. Appeals instituted.—362 appeals were instituted in 1940, showing a decrease of 21 as compared with the previous year.
- 52. Appeals disposed of.—357 appeals were disposed of during the year 1940, showing a decrease of 30 as compared with the previous year. There was an increase of disposals in the Hyderabad District and a decrease in the Sukkur and Larkana Districts.
- 53. Appeals pending.—There were 337 appeals pending at the close of the year 1940, the number being more by 15 than at the end of the year 1939. The number of appeals pending for more than a year rose from 73 to 106
- 54 Results of appeals The results of decisions of appeals during the year was as follows:—

In 89 cases or 24.9 per cent. of the whole the appeals were either summarily dismissed or not prosecuted, in 132 or 37.0 per cent. the judgments of the lower Courts were affirmed, in 31 or 8.7 per cent. they were modified, in 72 or 20.2 per cent. they were reversed and in 33 or 9.2 per cent. a remand was ordered.

The average duration of appeals which were dismissed or not prosecuted was II2 days while that of appeals in which the judgments of the lower Courts were confirmed, modified, reversed or in which remand was ordered was 338 days.

55. Miscellaneous appeals.—138 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 78 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 216, 137 were disposed of during the year and 79 remained pending at its close. The number of pending appeals was more by I than in the previous year.

The average duration of miscellaneous appeals which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 116 days while that in which the judgments of the lower Courts were confirmed, modified, reversed or in which remand was ordered was 194 days.

56. The Civil work disposed of by the Chief Court of Sind (Original Jurisdiction) in the year under report as compared with that in 1939 and the arrears at the end of the year are shown in Appendix F.

The high average duration appearing against the Chief Court of Sind in its Appellate Civil Jurisdiction is due to the special efforts that have been made to dispose of old appeals and clear off arrears. The average duration when compared with the average duration of the previous year was however less by 4, 6 and 14 days, respectively, for First Appeals, Second Appeals and Appeals from Orders in which appeals were dismissed or not prosecuted while the average duration was more by 128 and 6 days, respectively, for First Appeals and Second Appeals and less by 223 for Appeals from Orders in which the orders of lower Courts were confirmed, modified, reversed or remanded than the average duration of the previous year. A reference to Appendix H annexed will show that on the civil appellate side arrears are now greatly diminished.

While there was a decrease of Criminal work in the Magisterial Courts, there was an increase of Criminal work in the Sessions Courts in the Mofussil This increase did not affect the disposal of civil work in the District Courts to any appreciable extent as Extra Assistant Judges were appointed to the District and Sessions Courts whenever relief was necessary
- 65.
