

NOTICE TO SECOND EDITION.

The first edition of the B Volumes of the District Gazetteer issued in September 1906 was in many respects an experimental publication. Experience has suggested considerable condensation in many directions and a more systematic arrangement of the information given. Furthermore, the Town and Village Census Tables issued as Parts III and IV of the Burma Census Report of 1901 were inconveniently bulky for frequent reference. The decision to publish them in district volumes naturally suggested their amalgamation with the B Volume of the District Gazetteer, a suggestion which has been carried into effect.

The resultant modifications are briefly :—

- (i) Reduction from folio to octavo size.
- (ii) Inclusion of a Table of Contents.
- (iii) Condensation of Tables giving general information concerning principal towns and villages.
- (iv) Addition of list of fisheries.
- (v) Omission of Township details in Tables IV and XIII.
- (vi) Omission of Tables VII, XX, XXII and XXV.
- (vii) Addition of Town and Village Census Tables.

2. An important change has been made in the grouping of figures for the Town and Village Census Tables. The majority of District Officers, who were consulted, criticised the grouping by residential units on the grounds—

- (i) that a large proportion of the hamlets entered could not be identified ;
- (ii) that the tables while purporting to give residential units really gave in many instances the artificial groups which had been adopted as census blocks ;
- (iii) that a comparatively large number of entries such as *hlezeik* (landing place), *lèdè* (field hut), *tèzu* (collection of huts), which were not really hamlets, detracted from the value of the Tables ;
- (iv) that statistics by residential units were not required for administrative purposes ;
- (v) that grouping by hamlets rendered the Tables for a Township so long that speedy reference was impossible.

These criticisms suggested that a grouping by village-tracts would meet the requirements of local officers. This course has been adopted though with somewhat disappointing results. It has been impossible in many cases to reconcile the lists of village-tracts as given in the Census Records and as entered in the District Registers. Even when the reconciliation has been effected it has sometimes been impossible to allot the population enumerated to the village-tracts as finally determined. Many obvious errors have been detected but their correction would entail a disproportionate amount of labour. The defects in the Census Village Tables must be regarded as the inevitable result of the defects in the official records of village-tracts, and serve to indicate the necessity for a thorough reform of the records concerned with village administration in most districts.

RUBY MINES DISTRICT.

POSITION, AREA AND POPULATION.

Ruby Mines.—A District in the Mandalay Division of Upper Burma lying in the shape of a capital L of which the upright arm lies along the East bank of the Irrawaddy from $24^{\circ} 1' N$ down to $22^{\circ} 44' N$ with an average width of $16\frac{1}{2}$ miles while the horizontal arm runs eastward from the Irrawaddy from $95^{\circ} 58' E$ as far as $96^{\circ} 46' E$ and lies between North latitude $22^{\circ} 43'$ and $23^{\circ} 2'$. A small strip of land of an average width of two miles on the further or West side of the Irrawaddy between $23^{\circ} 9' N$ and $23^{\circ} 37' N$ is also included within the District. The Ruby Mines District has an area of 5,478 square miles and its population including the Möng Mit State was 34,062 in 1891; 87,694 in 1901, and 100,618 in 1911. Up to 1st April 1906 the District also included Möng Mit State which is now separately administered by a Chief under the general superintendence of the Deputy Commissioner, Ruby Mines District.

ADMINISTRATIVE CHANGES.

Since the Census of 1901, no administrative changes have taken place except that the entire State of Möng Mit which was formerly treated as a subdivision of the Ruby Mines District has now been made a semi-independent State under a Chief of its own.

DISTRICT STAFF.

(a) At Mogök.—One Deputy Commissioner and District Judge, one Treasury Officer and Headquarters Magistrate, one Subdivisional Officer, one *Akunwun* and Township Officer, one District Superintendent of Police, two Circle Inspectors, one Superintendent of Excise, one Military Police Commandant, one Assistant Commandant, one Forest Divisional Officer, one Civil Surgeon and Jail Superintendent, one Assistant Engineer, one Deputy Inspector of Schools.

(b) At Thabeikkyin.—One Subdivisional Officer who is also Township Judge.

(c) At Tagaung.—One Township Officer.

ESTABLISHMENTS.

Post Office.—Five postmasters, six clerks, seven postmen, one peon, two sweepers.

NOTE.—One of the postmasters, i.e., at Tagaung is really the Township Officer's clerk who receives an allowance of Rs. 12 a month to look after the branch post office there.

Telegraphs.—

(a) At Head Office, Mogök { One telegraph masters, two telegraphists, one lineman, one sub-inspector, three delivery peons, one bhisti, one sweeper.

(b) At Thabeikkyin, Kyatpyin, and Shwenyaungbin Post { Three combined post and telegraph masters, one signaller, three messengers, and Telegraph Offices. and two linesmen.

Forests.—Six rangers, thirteen deputy rangers, thirty-three foresters, twenty-four forest guards, ten clerks, five peons, twenty-one durwans, two sweepers, six elephant mahouts.

NOTE.—The Ruby Mines Forest Division belongs to the Southern Forest Circle and includes the Shweli Forest Subdivision taking in the whole of the area of the Momeik State except a small portion consisting of the area in the upper drainage of the Sinkan chaung which falls in the Bhamo Division.

The above staff is employed partly in the Ruby Mines District and partly in Momeik State.

Education.—One deputy inspector of schools, one clerk and one peon.

Excise.—One inspector of excise, two resident excise officers, three sub-inspectors, one clerk, eight peons, one warehouse durwan.

Jails.—One chief jailor, one deputy jailor, sixteen warders.

Public Works.—One assistant engineer, one upper subordinate, three lower subordinates, one clerk, one store clerk, two store durwans, one office peon, nine inspection bungalow durwans.

Veterinary.—Two veterinary assistants.

Rural officials.—One hundred and fifty-nine village headmen, of whom twelve exercise special civil powers and of these six have special criminal powers.

Civil Police.—One inspector, two sub-inspectors, two head constables and twenty constables out of which six are mounted constables at Momeik Headquarters, and three constables are attached to Mogök Police Training Depot, two head constables and seven constables at Nabu outpost.

Military Police.—One subadar, three havildars, fifty-one sepoys, one waterman, one sweeper and two transport drivers at Momeik Headquarters. One jemadar, two havildars, two naiks, thirty sepoys and one waterman at Molo.

Excise.—One inspector, one resident excise officer, two sub-inspectors and four peons.

Forest.—Four rangers, six deputy rangers, fifteen foresters, twelve forest guards, of whom three employed as rangers, one clerk, fifteen durwans and two dâk runners.

Medical.—(1) Military Police Hospital at Momeik,—one Sub-Assistant Surgeon, one compounder, one bhisty and one sweeper.

(2) Military Police Hospital at Molo,—one Sub-Assistant Surgeon and one sweeper.

(3) Civil Hospital, Momeik, opened on 15th April 1910.—The Sub-Assistant Surgeon of the Military Police Hospital is in charge of this hospital with a charge allowance of Rs. 10 per mensem. One compounder attached to this hospital without allowance by special arrangement of the Civil Surgeon, Mogök. The paid servants in the Civil Hospital are one bhisty at Rs. 5 per mensem, one ward servant at Rs. 15 per mensem and one sweeper at Rs. 15 per mensem.

Education.—The State vernacular school was opened on 13th May 1910 with one teacher on Rs. 50 per month. One second teacher is about to be entertained and one servant who also works as durwan, waterman and weeper at Rs. 15 per mensem.

Post Office.—One sub-postmaster, one postman and one mail runner.

Veterinary.—The Veterinary Assistant of Mogök also when necessity arises visits Momeik.

Rural officials.—One hundred and seventeen headmen (excluding Kodaung) of whom six exercise special civil powers while one of them (Kunchaung) has also special criminal powers.
