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

CHAPTERS I-IV.

PHYSICAL ASPECTS, HISTORY, AND POPULATION.

There is nothing important to add to the information contained under these heads in the corresponding chapters of the original Gazetteer.

CHAPTER V.

AGRICULTURE AND FORESTS.

During the last 10 years very considerable changes have been made in the forestation of the district. Details of the existing arrangements are given below. It will be seen that among other changes the Dulong reserve of more than 13,000 acres has recently been made, while the Bharalowa reserve was abolished in 1910. The result is an increase of about 4,000 acres in the total area of reserved forest.

Introduction of new crops. The only point worthy of note under this head is the commencement of sugarcane cultivation on a large scale near Tinsukia. Lack of adequate capital has been an obstacle to progress, but it is expected that a refinery will be established in due course.

CHAPTER VI.

INDUSTRIES.

Rice and mustard mills.

In the last decade new industries have been started in connection with machine-driven rice and mustard mills, the working of which is in the hands of private companies owned by Indian gentlemen. Detailed figures regarding their progress are not at present available.

Collieries.

The collieries near Margherita, under the control of the Assam Railways and Trading Company, have increased their outturn and the number of their employees. In 1913 the number of coolies employed was 2,431 with 21 European Supervisors, as against 1,200 and 9 respectively in 1903, while the yearly output has increased from 239,000 to 281,000 tons.

Oil Company.

The Assam Oil Company has also made very considerable advances in its operations at Digboi. There are at present 20 oil wells at work, while the total number sunk exceeds 50, as against 22 recorded 10 years ago. Employment is now given to 683 persons in the working of the wells, while 717 more are engaged in the refinery. The management is still in the hands of the Hon'ble Mr. A. B. Hawkins.

CHAPTER VII.

ECONOMIC CONDITION OF THE PEOPLE.

Wages and prices.

It is still difficult to procure a sufficient amount of Assamese labour in the district; the people are naturally of an apathetic disposition and the fertility of

the soil makes it possible to obtain a livelihood without the expenditure of great exertion, and renders unpopular the more strenuous forms of labour. As a rule, it is only *ex-tea-garden* coolies and up-country men who are available as hired labourers, but it is not uncommon to find Nagas doing contract work, as for instance the clearing of jungle on tea-gardens. They do not however usually work as day labourers.

The rate of wages for day labour now ranges from eight to twelve annas a day throughout the district, while the wages of wholetime servants vary from five to eight rupees a month, food and clothes being provided in addition. The wages of carpenters, masons and blacksmiths range from Re. 1 to Rs. 2 per day.

The prices of the staple food stuffs of the district will be found in Table X at the end of this volume. The average price of common rice for the period 1903—1912 works out at 10 seers for the rupee, of salt at 11 seers 15 chattaks, and of *matikalai* at 10 seers 13 chattaks.

During the last decade the difficulty of communications has been largely overcome. Railway travel has been improved by the completion of the section between Dhubri and Gauhati, thus giving two alternative routes to Calcutta without the necessity of a long steamer journey. Within the district, the Dibru-Sadiya Railway was extended in 1908 to Saikhowaghat on the bank of the Brahmaputra. The question of effecting direct railway communication with Burma has been reopened and various alignments have been suggested and are under consideration.

Roads have also received a great deal of attention and much progress has been made in recent years. The cost of metalling in Lakhimpur is high but not prohibitive. There are now under the Public Works Department in the district 25 miles of metalled roads and 322 miles of unmetalled roads, while under the Local Boards are 18 miles of the former and 525 miles

of the latter. In addition, tea estates have done much to open up the district by the construction and maintenance of garden roads, which in many cases are kept in excellent condition. The problem of maintaining the roads in a satisfactory state is, however, still a difficult one.

It is now proposed by the Political Officer of Sadiya that a bridle road following the course of one of the proposed railway alignments should be constructed up the Namchik valley to the Patkoi range. The extension of communications beyond Sadiya does not come within the scope of this volume, now that Sadiya has been dissociated from the district of Lakhimpur.

Steamer service.

Steamers ply regularly on a daily service between Dibrugarh and Calcutta and are of immense utility in transporting persons and property, especially in the conveyance of tea preparatory to transhipment at Calcutta. Feeder steamers also run regularly between Dibrugarh and Sadiya.

North Lakhimpur.

The communications of the North Lakhimpur subdivision require special mention, for it is in this matter that the district has been specially handicapped. At the present time feeder steamers ply regularly thrice a week throughout the year from Borduti to Dhansirimukh and *vice versa*, while during the rains there is also a service between Borduti and Phuta Bhil, a spot on the Rangnadi situated 7 miles from North Lakhimpur itself.

The roads have also been much improved and extended. Consequently communication between the subdivision and the outside world has been considerably facilitated, though it still leaves much to be desired.

Post and Telegraph.

The number of post and telegraph offices now open in the district is 40. The total number of letters and post cards delivered in the year 1913-14 was 1,922,492. In the same year 4,322 Savings Bank accounts were open, with a total balance of Rs. 5,79,926 entered to the credit of depositors.

CHAPTER VIII.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

The district was resettled in 1911-12. The method of assessment was the now well-known soil-unit system introduced by Sir Bampfylde Fuller in 1902 in Kamrup and Sibsagar. The application of the old and new rates to the area settled at attestation resulted in an increase of 11·43 per cent. in the revenue of the district. In North Lakhimpur the enhancement, mainly due to survey, was under 3 per cent. while in the Sadr subdivision after the exclusion of the two mauzas which are economically part of North Lakhimpur there was an enhancement of 14·8 per cent. That the new assessment was moderate is shown by the fact that it represents only 14 per cent. of the value of the gross produce of the area cropped. Sudden increase in revenue was prevented by the application of the rules for progressive enhancement.

Resettle-
ment.

Nisf-khiraj estates were assessed on cultivation, and their assessment shows an increase of 15·2 per cent. *Lakhiraj* lands were classed and revenue calculated on the cultivated area for the purpose of calculating local rates.

The period of settlement was for twenty years from April 1911 in North Lakhimpur subdivision and in the Dibrugarh assessment group, and from April 1912 in the rest of the Dibrugarh subdivision.

During the last ten years an excise staff has been evolved from very small beginnings. In 1903-04, an Excise Inspector was appointed for the two districts of Sibsagar and Lakhimpur, with headquarters at Dibrugarh. Next year the number of Inspectors was raised from 3 for the whole of Assam to 8, one being appointed for each plains district. In January 1908 three Sub-Inspectors of Excise were appointed for the Lakhimpur district, and about the same time two Supervisors were also appointed and placed in charge of the

excise warehouses opened at Tinsukia and Dibrugarh. Since then there has been no change in the establishment.

Public Works Department. Various important improvements have recently been carried out in the district by this department. Combined dâk and inspection bungalows have been constructed at Saikhowa ghat and Margherita. A hostel has been built for the convenience of the Muhammadan students of the Dibrugarh High School. A police office, Local Board and Municipal offices, and an office for the Deputy Inspector of Schools have been erected. These buildings are all in the near vicinity of the Dibrugarh cutcherry.

In the North Lakhimpur subdivision the construction of a bund on the Dikrong river is perhaps the most noticeable improvement.

Military Police. The headquarters of the Lakhimpur Battalion have been transferred from Dibrugarh to Sadiya and a new battalion is now being raised at Dibrugarh which will be ultimately posted in Darrang.

Education. During the last decade the cause of education has made very great advance in the district. Apart from the statistics contained in the appendix a few points are noteworthy. Among these may be mentioned the scheme for opening schools on tea gardens. These schools are of three classes, according as they are wholly, partially or not at all aided by Government, and now number two, five and nine of each class respectively. Besides the long established Government High School, another High School on an aided footing is now flourishing in Dibrugarh under the name of the George Institution. Female education has been advanced by the conversion of two middle vernacular schools at headquarters into middle English schools. Proposals for the establishment of a High School for girls are also being entertained, and it is expected that High School classes for girls will commence in January 1915. It is satisfactory to note that education is making some progress among the aboriginal tribes, viz., Miris, Duanias, Fakials and Nagas.

There are now six printing presses in the district, and three newspapers are being published, namely, "The Times of Assam" in English, and the "Alochani," and "Assam Bandhab" in the vernacular. Printing

At the following places in the district new dispensaries have been opened: Moran, Dum Duma, Dhemaji, Bordoloni and Bihpuria. They are in charge of Sub-Assistant Surgeons under the medical control of the Civil Surgeon who is stationed at Dibrugarh. Opening of

A veterinary establishment for the district was sanctioned in January 1907, and the staff now consists of three veterinary assistants. Two are attached to the Sadr subdivision and have their headquarters at Dibrugarh and Tinsukia, respectively; they work under the control of the Chairman of the Dibrugarh Local Board. The third is posted to North Lakhimpur, and is under the control of the North Lakhimpur Local Board. Veterinary

About the middle of March 1911, Mr. Noel Williamson, Assistant Political Officer at Sadiya, accompanied by Dr. J. D. Gregorson and a considerable number of servants and coolies started on a tour in the Abor country. The party left Passighat on the 18th March and arrived at Rotung on the 20th. A few days later it was split up into two, Mr. Williamson going on a little ahead, while Dr. Gregorson stayed behind with some sick coolies. On the 30th March Dr. Gregorson's party was treacherously attacked at Pangi by the Abors, and Dr. Gregorson and practically all those with him were murdered. The same fate overtook Mr. Williamson and his men on the following day at Komsing. Of all those present only five coolies escaped with their lives. Murder of

The season was now too far advanced to despatch immediately a punitive expedition into this little known and difficult country. Enquiries were however at once instituted to discover what villages were responsible, and in the following October a strong force under General Bower started to avenge the massacre, and Abor expedi-
tion of
1911-12.

finally to convince these turbulent tribesmen that the British Government could not thus be insulted with impunity. The expedition returned at the end of March 1912 after these objects had been fully accomplished. Some of the actual murderers were captured, and were subsequently tried. Five in all were executed, and others were sentenced to long terms of imprisonment.

Formation of the North-East Abor Expedition was the formation of the North-East East Frontier District. Formerly portion of this district was known as the Dibrugarh Frontier Tract, and was administered by an Assistant Political Officer with headquarters at Sadiya, subordinate to the Deputy Commissioner, Lakhimpur. After the expedition of 1911-12, this system of administration was changed. The Dibrugarh Frontier Tract ceased to exist, and the district of Sadiya now considerably enlarged became a separate entity controlled by a Political Officer, working directly under the Chief Commissioner, with three Assistant Political Officers; of these one is posted at Passighat, and is broadly speaking in charge of the Abor Hills. A detailed description of the boundary of the newly formed district will be found in the Government of India Gazette Notification No. 977E.-B., dated the 25th September 1914. Further modifications of the district boundary will be found described in Notifications Nos. 978 and 979E.-B. of the same date.
