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

READ—

The Report on the Administration of the Jails in the Punjab during the year 1919.

REMARKS.—Jail statistics for the year under review are largely coloured by the disturbances of April 1919 which increased the average population in the already overrowded jails from 14,219 to 15,231. It is proposed to locate the fifth Central Jail, to which allusion was made in last year's review, at Jullundur but before arriving at a final decision the result of a trial water-boring will be awaited.

2. Of the 19,236 prisoners admitted to jail 62 were under the age of 16 as against 47 in 1918. The Lieutenant-Governor trusts that Magistrates will continue to take adequate care when deciding to sentence juvenile offenders to terms of imprisonment rather than send them to the Reformatory School. The Borstal Jail shows marked signs of development and every effort is being made to reform the inmates. The scheme of conditionally releasing Borstal boys and sending them out for employment (generally under the Municipality of Lahore or in the North-Western Railway Workshops) has met with great success and excellent reports have been received about their conduct and discipline. The Lieutenant-Governor has lately had before him various proposals for the improvement of the Borstal system as applied to the Punjab, and has decided *inter alia* to use the terms Institute and Inmates instead of jail and prisoners and to remove the existing ban against employment in Government offices of lads, who have been detained in the institute. The Dhariwal Camp Jail, which had provided a large number of juvenile labourers to the Dhariwal Woollen Mills, was closed on the 20th April 1920, and the inmates were returned to the Borstal Institute. It is satisfactory to note that several lads after release from this jail stayed on at the mills as free labourers.

3. Except in the Lahore Central Jail, where recent disturbances point to a laxity of control, the standard of conduct and discipline in jails was generally well-maintained. There were 13 escapes during the year, only one occurring from inside the walls while five fugitives were recaptured. In spite of an increase in the average jail population the number of jail offences again shows a decrease being only 14,851 as compared with 16,689 in the previous year. As owing to the termination of the war the difficulty in obtaining recruits for the warder staff has been somewhat eased, the relaxation of the rules for the employment of convict officials, which was sanctioned as a temporary measure, is no longer necessary. The conduct of the convict officials was generally satisfactory.

4. The Central Jails at Lahore and Montgomery were greatly overcrowded but to obviate congestion in the wards, the extra prisoners were confined in tents or workshops at night. In view of the abnormal conditions created by the influenza epidemic in 1918 there is little to be gained by comparison of vital statistics for the year under review with those for the previous year. Compared with 1917, the year was healthy, the death rate being 21·45 per *mille* as against 26·66. Malarial fever accounts for a third of the admissions to hospital, but the deaths from this cause were only 18. The Lieutenant-Governor hopes that the Inspector-General will have projects prepared to improve the drainage of the Lahore and Montgomery Central Jails, the unsatisfactory condition of which appears to be mainly responsible for the heavy incidence of malaria in these two jails. More than one-third of the total mortality amongst convicts was due to deaths from pneumonia (66) and tuberculosis (42). In spite of the rise in the number of tubercular cases from 102 to 124 which is attributed to a more careful diagnosis, the decrease in deaths from this cause from 55 to 42 is a matter of satisfaction. The Lieutenant-Governor has approved of the construction of a new tubercular jail at Madhopur and a Committee has been formed to select a suitable site.

5. The expenditure during the year increased from Rs. 14,42,805 to Rs. 17,14,313 and the cost per head from Rs. 102·7·2 to Rs. 113·9·6 owing chiefly to the increase in the number of prisoners and in the cost of all necessities. The daily average cost of feeding a prisoner rose from one anna seven

pies to two annas one pie, involving an increase of Rs. 2,13,696 in dietary charges. An increase in earnings actually credited from Rs. 2,83,006 to Rs. 4,02,017 is due in part to the disposal of large stocks of cotton yarn and to prompt realization of bills due to the jails. It is unfortunate that the department should have allowed the sale of carpets in the Lahore Central Jail below cost price. There was a heavy loss on certain other industries in the same jail. The report of the progress made at the agricultural demonstration farm at the Montgomery Central Jail is encouraging and the Lieutenant-Governor is gratified to note that the prisoners take an intelligent interest in the improved methods of agriculture. It would appear that the transfer to the Agricultural College of all the land attached to the Lyallpur Jail, but not actually required for growing vegetables for the prisoners has not yet taken place. The college can employ as much labour on the farm as the Superintendent of the Jail can supply, and it is hoped that prisoners so employed will learn the improved methods of cultivation which mere proximity does not seem to have been sufficient to inculcate. The figures for farming profits given in paragraph 42 of the report are irreconcilable.

6. The office of Inspector-General was held by Lieutenant-Colonel Ward, C.B.E., till the 20th April 1920, when unfortunately on account of ill-health he was obliged to take long leave. He was succeeded by Major Finlayson, D.S.O., who was after a month relieved by Major Dalziel. The department has been administered with success and efficiency throughout the year and the Lieutenant-Governor expresses his appreciation of the loyal support received from the Superintendents and Jailors whose services have been brought to notice.

The chief jails of the Province have since the close of the year been visited by the Jails Commission and certain reforms in administration, which were in contemplation, are being temporarily postponed pending the receipt of the views of the Commission.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of the report and of the review be forwarded to the Government of India in the Home Department and that a copy of the review be forwarded to the Registrar, High Court of Judicature at Lahore, for the information of the Hon'ble Judges, and to the Inspector-General of Prisons, Punjab, for information and guidance.

Ordered also that the review be published in the *Punjab Gazette* and circulated with the report as usual.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to submit the Administration Report of the Jail Department for the year 1919.

The office of Inspector-General was held by Lieutenant-Colonel E. L. Ward, C.B.E., I.M.S., from the beginning of the year till the 20th April 1919, when he became seriously ill and was obliged subsequently to take long leave and proceed home. Major W. T. Finlayson, D.S.O., I.M.S., officiated as Inspector-General from 20th April 1919 till 19th May 1919, in addition to his own duties and was relieved by me on the 19th May 1919, from which date the charge has been held by me.

2. The number of jails has been the same as in the last year, i.e., 4 Central Jails, 17 District Jails, 9 Sub-Jails, 2 Camp Jails, 1 Special Female Jail and 1 Special Tubercular Jail.

3. On account of cessation of hostilities the recruitment for Labour and Porter Corps at Mesopotamia was stopped, but labour was supplied to the Arsenals at Ferozepore and Rawalpindi and to the Grass Farm at the former station. The supply of blankets and other articles to the Army was stopped early in the year.

4. The Dhariwal Camp Jail has been doing good work for the Mills throughout the year and Government has sanctioned its closing as it is no longer necessary for work for the Army. The prisoners have done excellent work at this jail and the Mill authorities have greatly appreciated their work. However, it is considered that it is better to keep the boys in the Borstal Jail at Lahore where they can continue to be treated under the Borstal system.

The Manager of the Dhariwal Mills has expressed his willingness to accept and give employment to Borstal boys after their conditional release.

Several of the Borstal boys, after release from the Dhariwal Camp Jail, stayed on and worked at the mills as free workers. These boys received good pay and comfortable quarters from the Mill authorities.

The question of releasing Borstal boys conditionally was taken up seriously during the year, and, in addition to three who had already been sent to work, under the Lahore Municipality, 24 boys have been given employment in the workshops of the North-Western Railway, and I hear very good reports regarding their work and conduct.

5. The Khewra Camp Jail has also continued to do good work at the Salt Mines.

As the work at the mines is not temporary the question of building a permanent jail at Khewra must be seriously considered.

6. The jail population during the year was high owing to the disturbances which took place early in the year and to the fact that overcrowding was not relieved by sending prisoners to Mesopotamia for Army work, as after the Armistice prisoners were no longer required for this purpose.

7. A 5th Central Jail is more than ever necessary, and it is hoped that it will be built at Jullundur. It is hoped also to build a specially equipped jail for tubercular prisoners at Madhopur.

8. Of the four Commissioned Officers surrendered to the Military Department, two, i.e., Major W. T. Finlayson, D.S.O., I.M.S., and myself, have been returned to their duties in the Department and more Indian Medical Service officers are urgently required.

CHAPTER I.—JUDICIAL STATISTICS.

9. The table below gives a brief summary of the various classes of prisoners dealt with during the year. For purposes of comparison the figures for the year 1918 are also given :—

The above figures do not require any explanation. The increase in the number of under-trial and convicted prisoners admitted during the year and remaining in the Prisons and Lock-ups of the Province on the last day of the year is chiefly due to the disturbances which happened in April. A minor cause may be found in the presence in our jails of a number of deserters from the Military Department. The increase in the daily average number of prisoners of all classes from 14,219 in 1918 to 15,231 in 1919, or by 1,012, would appear to be small when compared with the number of admissions. The reason is that, as an act of Royal Clemency, a great number of prisoners was released on Peace Day.

10. The year opened with 12,344 convicts against 12,625 convicts in 1918, or with 281 convicts less. As many

above, is mainly due to the disturbances of April and consequent convictions by Martial Law Courts, and is chiefly observed in Lahore, Lyallpur, Rawalpindi, Gujranwala, Hissar, Montgomery, Ludhiana, Ferozepore and Rohtak Districts. The first named district recording the largest increase, i.e., 1,117 with Lyallpur coming next with an increase of 328.

Eight hundred and seventy-seven prisoners were received by transfer from jails outside the Province against 1,390 in 1918, the chief subscriber to the above item being the North-West Frontier Province. The reduction in numbers was due to the fact that sometimes we had to refuse prisoners from the North-West Frontier Province because our own jails were overcrowded.

There were 1,634 convicts in the Jails of the Punjab on the last day of the year who had received their sentences in that Province.

Three hundred and twenty-eight convicts were admitted to jails in default of payment of fine and only 82 of them underwent full-term of imprisonment awarded in lieu of fine, while the remaining 246 were released shortly after their admission to jail on payment of fine.

Four hundred and eighty-five prisoners were sentenced to transportation and 62 were deported to the Andaman Islands, against 207 and 101 in the previous year. Rise in the number of sentences to transportation is due to the disturbances of April when many prisoners were awarded such sentences by the Martial Law Commissions and Courts. At the close of the year there were 760 prisoners in jails who were sentenced to transportation.

For the same reason the number of prisoners sentenced to death increased from 190 to 295.

11. Number of deaths fell from 737 in 1918 to 305 in 1919. The detailed reasons of this variation will be discussed at another place in this report, but the chief reason may be stated to be absence of Influenza from the jails.

12. There was only one criminal lunatic prisoner on the last day of the year.

Criminal lunatics.

13. In the beginning of the year there were two lepers confined in the special leper ward of the Mianwali Jail.

Lepers.

Three were received and the same number was released during the year, leaving a balance of two at the close of the year.

14. Five male prisoners and one female prisoner were ordered to be released by Government on Medical grounds, and 1,774 on other grounds. This large total was due chiefly to the large number of prisoners, who were released on Peace Day and to releases ordered in connection with the Royal Proclamation in December. Clemency was also shown to prisoners convicted in Multan, Dera Ghazi Khan, Muzaffargarh and Jhang Dacoity cases in the year 1915.

15. As already stated, there has been an increase in the number of admissions to jail when compared with the figures of the previous year. The increase is remarkable under the following headings :—

Offences relating to bad livelihood show a marked decrease of 551, and those of murder a decrease of 33. It is, however, regrettable to note that the increase in crime is general and may be ascribed to the unrest in the country and dearness of foodstuffs and all other necessities of life.

16. The various religions contributed to the admissions of jail in the following proportions *per mille* as compared with the year 1918 :—

17. As usual the age of the majority of convicts is between 16 and 40 years, viz., 15,936 against 12,645 in 1918.

Admissions according to age.

Number of children convicted and sent to jail under 16 years of age rose from 47 in 1918 to 62 in 1919. Of this number three were females. Great stress was laid during the year on the necessity of immediately reporting to the District Magistrates cases where a person under the age of 16 years had been convicted and sent to jail. A circular letter on the subject was sent to Superintendents of all Jails and Sub-Jails. I also at my inspections personally reminded the local jail authorities of their duty in this matter. Ten of these boys were sent to the Reformatory School at Delhi. In several other cases the young persons were either released on bail or District Magistrates did not consider them fit subjects for the Reformatory School for various reasons. Twenty-four prisoners were boys of 15 years of age on their admission to jail, an age which renders them unfit for detention in the Reformatory School.

Of the boys who remained in jails, those with sentence of three months and over were transferred to Borstal Central Jail.

18. An excellent note has been written on the Borstal system by

Juvenile adults.

Mr. H. M. Cowan, I.C.S., who had been for some time in charge of the Borstal Central

Jail. He writes :—“ * * * it is evident that the Borstal system as applied in the Borstal Jail has reached a certain standard and is likely to develop further even under present conditions, but it is very seriously hampered by the absence of legislation. This is needed to provide, in the first place, for suitably long periods of sentence as in England, the jail being at present encumbered with large numbers of lads needing a full Borstal sentence but having been awarded short periods in which no proper training can be given. It is also needed to create a suitable system of conditional release which is an essential feature of Borstalism. A very limited system is at present in force which needs great amplification * * * * *

“ In short, the possibilities are very great indeed if real public interest and sympathy can be created. Representative Societies of all the great religions of the Province have come forward to help in the reclamation of the criminal tribes, and this is a hopeful sign for the future of the Borstal system, once Indian interest in it is created.”

Since the return of Major W. T. Finlayson, D.S.O., I.M.S., the permanent Superintendent of the Jail, from Military duty, new life has been infused into the jail. Progress is manifest everywhere. Major Finlayson is the only expert on the Borstal system in this Province. He studied the system while he was last in England on leave and everything is bound to show improvement under him and his able Jailer, Sardar Sahib Bhai Hukam Singh, who is at present touring in the Madras and Bombay Presidencies to gain further knowledge in this direction.

A new Hospital and a School building have been added to the jail during the year.

A Pushtu Teacher has been entertained much to the advantage of the Pathans who form a large portion of the jail population.

Steps for acquiring the land, for what I hope will be a model and educational farm, are progressing and before the end of 1920 I hope the farm will be an accomplished fact with an agricultural expert and assistant and also a Veterinary Assistant to instruct the large number of lads of the zamindar class now detained in the jail in modern methods of agriculture and sufficient veterinary knowledge to enable them to treat their animals for all ordinary ailments and to improve the herds.

Three inmates were conditionally released during the year. The names of other 15 were submitted and their conditional releases have all been sanctioned, they joined the North-Western Railway Workshops, Moghulpura, on 2nd January 1920 and all have done well. Thanks are due to

Mr. J. C. Hunter, Carriage and Wagon Superintendent, North-Western Railway, for his help in this connection, he has taken great interest and shown much sympathy. He writes :—" I am pleased to state that the Borstal labour is highly disciplined and most respectful to their Mistries and Chargemen and Foremen, which will, no doubt, have a very good effect on the other workmen as the employment of the Borstal labour is extended, which I hope will be the case in the near future."

Special attention is given to gymnastics and physical drill. The drill, marching, etc., is excellent and compares favourably with that of a regiment.

A European Band Master has recently been entertained and in time it is hoped that the band will be as good as that of the Borstal Institution in England. More and better instruments are needed but unfortunately they cost money.

Very good work has been done during the year in training Borstal boys in Ambulance and First Aid work and 87 boys have passed an examination in Ambulance and First Aid work and have been given certificates by independent medical officers.

19. Of the 19,236 admissions into the jails, 435 were able to read and write and 73 able to read only, against 251, and 47 in the year 1918. The increase is due to the number of educated persons taking part in the disturbances of April and their ultimate conviction and admission into the jail. The ratio per cent. of literates to illiterates consequently rose from 1·88 to 98·12 in 1918 to 2·64 to 97·36. This increase is regrettable.

20. The major portion of the males admitted to jail is composed of agriculturists who form 68 per cent. of the total admission. The number of persons employed under Government or other local bodies admitted into jails decreased from 1,141 to 829, while there is an increase in admission of persons who follow other occupations. The number of professional persons who were convicted increased from 37 to 118. There is a slight increase in the number of admissions of persons performing personal offices and those employed on mechanical arts, while the increase in the number of miscellaneous persons and persons engaged in commerce and agriculture is proportionate to the increase in the total number of admissions.

The number of females increased from 354 in 1918 to 376 in 1919, widows accounting for 20 out of the total increase of 22.

21. Out of 19,236 convicts admitted during the year 14,258 received a sentence of one year or less against 11,976 in the previous year giving a ratio per cent. to the total admissions of 74·12 against 75·55 in 1918. The fall in the sentences of simple imprisonment from 1,1·6 to 841 or by 285 is satisfactory.

22. Out of the total number of prisoners admitted during the year 1,938 prisoners were classed as " Habituals," against 1,973 in 1918. The decrease is however very small. The number of prisoners convicted for the first time under Section 110 of the Criminal Procedure Code fell from 740 in 1918 to 574 in 1919 and of those once previously convicted from 814 to 777, while the number of those with more than one previous conviction rose from 419 in 1918 to 587 in 1919. The percentage of habitual prisoners to total number of admissions decreased from 12 to 10 which is due to the large increase in the number of admissions to the jail and the number of such prisoners remaining nearly the same as last year.

23. At the commencement of the year there were 1,834 prisoners awaiting trial before the courts against 1,395 in the previous year. The number of admissions of such prisoners rose from 26,954 in 1918 to 27,306 in 1919 and the daily average from 1,742 to 2,049. The increase was chiefly in Lahore, Gujranwala, Lyallpur, Gujerat, Jhang, Hissar, Muzaffargarh and Gurgaon Districts and was mainly due to the disturbances in April. Several Districts show a decrease in the admissions of such prisoners. Of the total admissions of under-trials as many as 17,280 prisoners were released giving a percentage of 63·28 against 68·32 in 1918.

The average period of detention of an under-trial prisoner in jail was 25 days in 1919 against 21 in 1918. There have been no escapes among this class during the year.

Nineteen deaths occurred among them against 119 in 1918 giving a death rate of 9.27 per mille.

CHAPTER II.—GUARDS AND ESCAPES.

24. The number of escapes increased from 12 in 1918 to 13 during the year.

Escapes

Of the 13, only one escaped from inside the jail. This escape took place from the Jullundur District Jail. All the others took place from extra-mural gangs including two from Dharial Camp Jail and four from the Arsenal at Rawalpindi from the custody of Military authorities.

In addition to the above, three attempts were made to escape from jails, all of them at night, putting the night guarding to the test. That there are so few escapes is very creditable to the Jailors and those who work under them.

It will be noted that four of the prisoners escaped from a military guard.

25. The table subjoined shows the extent to which fetters were imposed for security during the year:—

Fetters for safe custody were imposed in 477 cases only against 631 in the year 1918. It may be remarkable to note that in Lahore Central Jail where so many of the long-term bad characters are confined, no imposition was registered during the year.

26. One Jailer was reduced during the year. The conduct of the Staff upper subordinates has been excellent and almost all of them have rendered valuable assistance especially during the days of the disturbances early in the year.

The good services of Lala Shiv Narain at Dhariwal Camp Jail were recognized by Government who conferred upon him the title of Rai Sahib. Assistant Jailors, Raghunath Sahai and Ram Kishen Rana, have had conferred on them the honorary rank of Jamadar in recognition of their services in Mesopotamia.

The retirement, on superannuation pension of Rai Sahib Lala Ram Ditta Mal of the Montgomery Central Jail has caused to the Department the loss of his valuable services. He has always been energetic and has always discharged his duties conscientiously. His superior officers always spoke well of him and his work.

The recruitment for the warder guard has not been satisfactory, and there were many vacancies during the year. Since the close of the year and on account of the cessation of the hostilities more recruits are coming in, and it is hoped that the improvement will continue. The pay of the guard is so meagre that suitable men will not enlist as they cannot live on the pay they are offered and I cannot suggest any remedy except to offer a living wage. The Dhariwal Camp and Shahpur Tubercular Jails did best work in the recruitment of warders and thanks are due to the Superintendents and Jailors of these institutions.

CHAPTER III.—CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE.

27. During the year 14,851 offences were registered against 16,689 in 1918. The decrease is very remarkable when compared with the figures for the past year with the comparative increase in jail population.

Offences and punishments.

Of the 34 cases referred to Judicial Courts 24 related to escapes and the remainder to miscellaneous offences :—

- (a) A convict under sentence of transportation for life attempted to murder the Deputy Jailer of the Lahore Central Jail Press with a piece of wood. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to death.
- (b) Another prisoner in the same jail attempted to murder another prisoner and was sentenced to transportation.
- (c) In Montgomery Central Jail at bathing parade and washing of clothes on a Sunday one Pathan prisoner struck another on the head with an iron bar which he had previously removed from one of the drain openings, from the results of which the assaulted man died. The assailant was sentenced to death.
- (d) A convict official ruptured the spleen of a convict in the Rawalpindi Jail and was punished with four months' rigorous imprisonment.

The offences relating to work diminished from 11,060 in 1918 to 9,181 in 1919 and those relating to prohibited articles increased from 1878 in 1918 to 1915 in 1919.

The number of punishments given decreased from 16,695 to 14,885.

28. The number of these punishments decreased from 27 in 1918 to 11 in 1919—

The Central Jails at Lahore and Multan had to resort to the cane in four cases each and Montgomery Central, Jullundur and Gurdaspur District Jails in one case each. The punishments were justified.

29. As the number of convict officials is fixed for each jail, the ratio per cent. with the increase in jail population fell from 13 in 1918 to 12 this year. The conduct

of this class has been generally satisfactory with a few exceptions, i.e., a convict officer made good his escape from the Lahore Borstal Central Jail, another attempted to escape at Dhariwal and three more were sent up for trial for suffering the escape of prisoners. The number of punishments awarded to them during the year fell from 1,188 to 1,054.

30. The remission system is well understood by convicts and they strive to earn as much remission as is admissible to them by the rules. Extra and special remission

ward of 15 days was awarded to 2,163 convicts for not having been punished for a year.

CHAPTER IV.—EXPENDITURE.

31. The total expenditure on guarding and maintenance of prisoners increased from Rs. 14,42,805 in 1918 to

Rs. 17,14,313 this year or by Rs. 2,71,508. The cost per head consequently rose from Rs. 102-7-2 in 1918 to Rs. 113-9-6 in 1919. These high increases are explained by the increased Jail population and high price of food-grains and other commodities.

32. Expenditure under this head increased from Rs. 3,89,857 in 1918 to Rs. 4,42,001 in 1919. The reasons for the

increase are :—(a) removal of Indian Civil Service Officers from the charge of the Central Jails whose pays were not debited to this Department and appointment of Indian Medical Service or other officers whose pays are debitible; (b) grant of Temporary War and Grain Compensation Allowance to the establishment and (c) increase of pay of Indian Medical Service Officers.

33. These charges rose from Rs. 5,14,166 in the previous year to Rs. 7,27,862 in the year under report. This head alone accounts for an increase of Rs. 2,13,693 out of the increase of Rs. 2,71,508 in the total expenditure of maintenance and

Dietary charges.

guarding of prisoners. The increase in the daily average population, issue of better food to certain classes of prisoners, the high prices of food stuffs and issue of pure wheat in the Jail dietaries on account of scarcity of inferior grains are mainly responsible for this increase.

The average cost of dietary per head consequently increased from Rs. 36-9-1 per head to Rs. 48-1-6.

34. The expenditure under this head increased from Rs. 99,771 in 1918 to Rs. 1,15,844 in 1919 giving a cost per head of average total strength of Rs. 7-1-2 in 1918 against Rs. 7-10-8 in 1919. The increase is due to the high prices of medicines and issue of extra diet to prisoners convalescent, mostly from Influenza.

35. The total charges under this head decreased from Rs. 1,98,601 in 1918 to Rs. 1,67,547 in 1919 and the cost per head from Rs. 14-2-0 in the former to Rs. 11-1-10 in the latter year. The decrease is due to the use of Razaies lasting from the previous year.

36. The charges increased from Rs. 26,939 in 1918 to Rs. 30,881 in 1919 and cost per head from Rs. 1-14-7 to Rs. 2-0-8. Sanitation charges. The increase is due to the increased number of new admissions in the Jails and to extra precautions taken against the introduction of Influenza into Jails.

37. Charges under this head increased from Rs. 38,964 in the previous year to Rs. 45,158 this year and the cost per head from Rs. 2-12-2 to Rs. 2-15-10 which is due to the increased transfers of prisoners from one jail to another on account of overcrowding.

38. The increase under this head from Rs. 1,43,771 in 1918 to Rs. 1,56,056 in 1919 is due to the high prices of Other miscellaneous services and supplies. fodder and all other commodities.

39. Expenditure under this head shows a slight fall from Rs. 6,401 in the previous to Rs. 6,272 in the current year on Travelling allowance. account of fewer transfers of warders. The warders at Sub-Jails were previously transferred after a year which period has this year been extended to two years.

40. The expenditure rose from Rs. 14,586 in 1918 to Rs. 15,370 in 1919 and the rise is due to the increased rates of Contingencies. postage and telegraph charges.

41. These charges decreased from Rs. 9,749 in 1918 to Rs. 7,322 in 1919. The cost per head consequently fell from Re. 0-11-1 to Re. 0-7-9 and is due to the economy Extraordinary charges. exercised under this head.

42. Farms are attached to Montgomery Central, Lyallpur and Mianwali Jails of which the farm at Montgomery is the Farming operations. only one which is being worked on the modern improved principles of agriculture. Major M. Courtney, I. S. O., I.M.D., makes the following remarks in his report :—"The levelling and bringing under cultivation of the land transferred to the jail has been persistently proceeded with in the face of want of short-term prisoners and I have now 83 acres of land under cultivation compared with 58 acres in 1918."

"The Agricultural Assistant, Babu Nazar Muhammad, has spared no pains in his work and deserves praise for what he has accomplished. He also instructs the prisoners in the latest developments in Agriculture and the Deputy Director of Agriculture gives periodical lectures and demonstrations with approved implements to a body of about 100 prisoners who are specially taken out of the jail for the purpose. Unfortunately for want of the latest approved implements which are not yet available the lectures and demonstrations have not had their full effect, but I am of opinion that the prisoners are slowly learning what we are trying to teach. Thirty-four acres were sown with wheat at the end of 1918 and produced in 1919 a harvest of 442 maunds

of wheat. In 1919, 55 acres were sown. The gram crop of 1918 was a failure as from the 13 acres sown only 14 maunds were produced, but I have sown three acres this year and so far the crop is looking well. The defect has been due to nitre in the soil and to remedy this a good deal of green manuring has been done. In one plot in particular after green manuring the gram crop is in splendid condition."

"The cotton crop was not as successful this year as in 1918 owing to red rust having attacked the plants. This has been ascribed by those who know to late rains. When the severe winter set in, a large number of bolls had not fully matured and part of the crop was thus lost. Twenty-seven acres were sown with cotton producing 165 maunds the value of which according to the market rate comes to Rs. 3,300. It is estimated that the crop deteriorated by 33 per cent. otherwise the income would have been about Rs. 5,000."

Total realizations on this account amounted to Rs. 31,931 of which Rs. 14,809 is the net profit to the Department. Mianwali Jail has the largest amount of net profit, i.e., Rs. 6,210 to its credit out of the realization of Rs. 9,401. Montgomery realized Rs. 7,214, with a net profit of Rs. 993, and Lyallpur Rs. 9,520 with a profit of Rs. 3,187.

43. Five of the jails have got a dairy attached to them. The largest is at Lahore Central Jail, which shows a loss of Rs. 638-12-0 due to the death of four cows caused by slipping on the unsatisfactory floor of the shed and the sale by auction of 14 animals at a price about one-third of their book value.

A new dairy has been started at the Multan Central Jail on account of the serious difficulties experienced in obtaining milk for the prisoners from the city, which is about four miles off from the jail.

CHAPTER V.--EMPLOYMENT OF PRISONERS.

44. With the increase in jail population the daily average number of convicts sentenced to labour increased from 12,144 in 1918 to 12,860 in 1919. Excluding the sick, the infirm, prison officers and servants, those employed on gardening and farming, a daily average of 255 not employed for various and good reasons and 624 always employed on jail buildings and repairs, 7,592 were left for employment in the factory and maintenance departments, showing a percentage of 59 against 54 in the previous year.

Out of this number 839 prisoners were employed daily at the Arsenals and Grass Farms at Rawalpindi and Ferozepore, at the Agricultural Farms at Lyallpur and Gurdaspur, at the Woollen Mills at Dhariwal and the Salt Mines at Khewra.

45. Cash profits increased from Rs. 2,83,006 in 1918 to Rs. 4,02,017 in 1919, the biggest total on record under this head.

This high increase is due to several reasons among which the following may be mentioned :—

- (1) Hiring out of large number of prisoners to Military and other Departments. Their wages during the year account for Rs. 95,204 of the profits.
- (2) Issue of strict orders during the year for the realization of the amounts due to the Department for the work done and for the avoidance of large accumulations of stores, etc.
- (3) Disposal of the large stocks of yarn, etc., held with jails since the last year.
- (4) Fall in the value of money
- (5) Increase in jail population.

No jails in this Province show a loss, 14 show an increase and 11 a decrease over last year's figure.

Multan Central Jail has the largest amount of profit to its credit, i.e., Rs. 90,732 against a loss of Rs. 52,551 in 1918. The increase is mainly due to

the disposal during the year of the stocks of yarn, etc., held over from the last year. Credit is due to Mr. J. O'Neil Shaw, P.C.S., the Superintendent.

Montgomery Central Jail comes next with a profit of Rs. 64,735 which is mainly due to the recovery of outstanding amounts due to the jail. In this direction very good work has been done by the Superintendent, Major M. Courtney, I.S.O., I.M.D.

The Lahore Borstal Central Jail has a profit of Rs. 39,424 against a loss of Rs. 2,002 in the last year. It should be understood that this jail is an industrial school rather than a profit-making jail. Great credit is due to Major W. T. Finlayson, D.S.O., I.M.S., and his Jailor, Sardar Sahib Bhai Hukam Singh, for this result.

Among District Jails, Rawalpindi has the largest profit to its credit which is mainly made up of the earnings of the prisoners hired out to the Military Department.

Dhariwal Camp Jail has realized Rs. 29,638 during the year for the convict labour supplied by the jail to the Woollen Mills there. The excellent work done by the prisoners has been much appreciated by the Mill authorities.

Among other jails may be mentioned, Multan District, Ferozepore, Sialkot, Gujranwala, Lahore Female, Jullundur, Ludhiana, Gurdaspur, Hissar and Khewra Jails which have made good profit during the year and credit is due to Superintendents and Jailors of these jails.

Lahore Central Jail has the biggest fall, i.e., from Rs. 1,33,684 to 29,090, especially in miscellaneous industries and carpets. The Deputy Superintendent of the Jail explains this as follows :—

"The year under review has been characterised by ultra-abnormal conditions generally, especially as regards prices of raw material and difficulties of transport. Time after time the inward booking of goods has been entirely suspended and the same remark applies to outward booking of manufactured articles and printed matter. The bad harvest was, of course, responsible for the very heavy increase in the cost of castor seed, toria seed, and munj. In fact, we had great difficulty in procuring the two latter items."

Cash earning per head of those sentenced to labour increased from Rs. 23-4-0 to 31-4-0.

46. Carpets show a loss of Rs. 2,763 against a profit of Rs. 419 in 1918. Lahore Central Jail alone shows a loss of

STATEMENT NO. XII-A. Rs. 3,622 which is explained by too low rates for the carpets sold.

Principal industries.

To meet the demands of the Military Department, all works, other than "essential," were stopped in the year 1918 and one of those industries stopped was cotton-durrie making. The industry has now again been started. Only three jails—Montgomery, Multan Central and Multan District,—did durrie making during 1919 and realized a profit of Rs. 3,181 in all.

Other cotton articles such as Dosuti, Gahra, Newar, Tape, Ropes and Dusters, etc., yielded a profit of Rs. 97,492 against a loss of Rs. 71,175 in 1918, this is mainly due to the large stocks of yarn held over from the last year being used up during the year.

Chisks.—There was a profit of Rs. 18,161 in this industry against Rs. 8,250 in 1918. Results achieved by the Montgomery and Multan Central, Hissar and Lyallpur District Jails are excellent.

Tent industry—Is carried out in the Borstal Central Jail, Lahore, only and has yielded a profit of Rs. 23,978 against a loss of Rs. 16,165 in 1918. The increase is due to large stock of yarn in hand at the beginning of the year, more orders and greater outturn.

Paper-making.—The profits increased from Rs. 20,979 to Rs. 24,191. Government has directed all its Departments to use envelopes of jail made paper. The excellent results, i.e., a profit of Rs. 8,056 obtained in Multan District Jail are creditable to Khan Bahadur Dewan Ali, Superintendent, and

his Jailer, M. Ghulam Rasul. Sialkot, Jullundur and Gurdaspur Jails also show substantial profits.

Small profits in binding, i.e., Rs. 12,056 this year when compared with the previous year, i.e., Rs. 25,355 are due to a falling off in the Lahore Central Jail which has recovered Rs. 2,647 in this year against Rs. 17,021 in the previous year. Binding of books is undertaken by the Lahore Central Jail alone, while all other jails do binding of blank Registers or other rough binding.

Printing which is mainly done in Lahore Central Jail yielded a profit of Rs. 47,020 against Rs. 91,084 in 1918. Out of the above item as much as Rs. 45,601 fall to the lot of the Lahore Central Jail.

The profits on munj mats increased from Rs. 8,791 in 1918 to Rs. 15,823 this year. The Montgomery, Multan Central and Multan District, Ferozepore and Dera Ghazi Khan District Jails are the chief subscribers to this item.

47. Gross profits during the year amount to Rs. 2,61,605 against Rs. 3,69,308 in 1918. The falling off is due to the Lahore Central Jail showing a gross loss of

Gross profits.
Rs. 25,680. The Superintendent of the Jail explains the loss as being due to a mistake to the extent of Rs. 83,301 having been made in 1918 in the valuation of the printed forms in store, which has been rectified during the year.

CHAPTER VI.—VITAL STATISTICS.

48. The accommodation for all classes of prisoners remained the same as in the year 1918, i.e., 14,687. Against this STATEMENT A. accommodation a daily average of 15,109 prisoners has been in the jails. If the figures for Accommodation. the District Jails temporarily reduced to Sub-

Jails and those for the Hospital, Civil, Female and European Wards, which cannot accommodate prisoners other than those for which they are meant, were excluded, the overcrowding in jails becomes more serious. The Central Jails at Lahore, Montgomery and Multan, especially the former two, have been greatly overcrowded. The excess number of prisoners was confined in tents or workshops at night and no congestion was allowed in sleeping wards. The accommodation of the Lahore Central Jail for prisoners is 1,428 but during the year its daily average population was 2,488. The chief evil of overcrowding in our jails is from the point of view of discipline. A large population of Punjabi prisoners cannot be adequately dealt with by an inadequate staff.

49. The admissions to hospital decreased from 18,126 in 1918 to STATEMENT No. XIV. 14,876 in 1919, daily average sick from 698 to 549, and deaths from 857 to 324. This decrease,

Sickness and mortality among all classes of prisoners. all round, is mainly due to the non-appearance of Influenza this year, which prevailed virulently during the previous year. Consequently the ratios *per mille* of admissions, daily average sick and deaths fell from 1285, 49 and 60.75 in 1918, respectively, to 985, 36 and 21.45, respectively, in 1919. If the ratios for this year be compared with those of the year 1917, when they were 998, 58 and 26.66 this year may be considered to be a fairly healthy one.

Shahpur, Hissar, Lahore Female, Mianwali, Multan Central, Montgomery Central, Rawalpindi, Gurdaspur, Gujranwala and Ferozepore Jails show death rates in excess of the Provincial average. Shahpur being a Special Jail for the confinement of prisoners suffering from Tuberculosis has a death rate of 103.56 *per mille*, the lowest figures on record since the year 1916 when it was first used as such.

The high death rate in Hissar Jail, i.e., 39.06 is accounted for by the five deaths occurring from relapsing fever.

Montgomery Central Jail attributes the high rate to the death of 18 prisoners of the age of 60 years or over who never had any hope of getting out of jail alive.

Mortality in other jails has not been due to any special cause or causes. The jails which show a low mortality rate *per mille* are:—

Lyallpur 5.36, Dhariwal Camp 5.43, Campbellpur 6.62, Sialkot 6.91, Lahore Borstal Central 7.84, Khehra Camp 8.89 and Ludhiana 11.17.

50. The statement below shows admissions and deaths from various diseases. Figures for the year 1918 are also given for purposes of comparison :—

Cholera.—Four cases with two deaths occurred in the Montgomery Central Jail. The Medical Officer, Major M. Courtney, I.S.O., I.M.D., says :—

"There was no actual epidemic in the jail during the year but a small outbreak of cholera occurred in August during my absence on leave. To my mind the cases were epidemic diarrhoea as on my return I saw two men who had been admitted two days previously and they had absolutely no symptoms of Cholera. I also admitted two men the day after my return whose symptoms I was told were identical with those admitted as Cholera but beyond severe vomiting and Diarrhoea none of the other symptoms existed. Besides on the minutest investigation there was absolutely no trace of infection from outside nor any source of infection inside the jail, the prisoners did not come from the same barrack, they did not drink the same water (the water of a well used for factory purposes only was said to be the source of infection) nor was there any Cholera prevailing in the District. The Medical Officer and the Superintendent were, however, of the opinion that the cases were of Cholera and I had to accept their decision in the matter."

Dysentery.—There were 129 admissions and three deaths under this head against 160 admissions and five deaths during 1918 giving a ratio *per mille* of 10 and 0·23 against 13 and 0·41. The entire absence of Dysentery from three Central Jails, i.e., Lahore, Multan and Lahore Borstal and only four cases of it in Montgomery are a clear evidence of a healthy year with regard to Dysentery and such excellent results are due presumably to the exertions of the Medical Officers of these institutions.

Most of the other jails show an increase of admissions for Dysentery to hospital but the mortality rates are much better than those of last year. Unfortunately the Lahore Central Jail and the Lahore Borstal Central Jail had admissions of 294 and 90, respectively, for Colitis.

Malarial Fever.—There were 4,585 admissions with 18 deaths from this disease against 3,980 admissions and 19 deaths in 1918 giving a ratio *per mille* of 352 and 1·38 against 323 and 1·54.

There is a remarkable increase in the number of admissions for Malaria in Montgomery and Multan Central Jails over the figures of the last year. The Medical Officer, Montgomery, ascribes the increase to defective drainage in and out of the jail.

The Medical Officer, Lahore Central Jail, where there were also many admissions for Malaria, attributes the increased number of admissions to constant rains during the months of July and August, defective drainage of the jail surroundings and to a certain extent to the grass plots and cultivated areas inside the jail affording shelter to mosquitoes.

Tuberculosis.—The increase in admissions from 102 in 1918 to 124 in 1919 is due to the careful examination of prisoners by the Medical Staff and the decrease in the number of deaths from 55 to 42 is all the more satisfactory and is mainly due to the good work done by Dr. Feroz-ud-Din, Medical Officer of the Shahpur Jail, and his Assistants, Lala Girdhari Lal and Gian Chand, Sub-Assistant Surgeons.

Anæmia and Debility.—These maladies gave 300 admissions and 15 deaths against 413 and 16, respectively, in 1918. The decrease is apparent in Montgomery

Multan and Lahore Borstal Central Jails and is due to the careful diagnosis being made.

Pneumonia.—Caused 249 admissions and 66 deaths against 402 admissions and 97 deaths in the previous year. This is satisfactory. There were no deaths from Pneumonia in the Borstal Central Jail and the death rate from all causes was only 7.94 per mille in that jail, which had the advantage of having an Indian Medical Service Officer as Superintendent.

Other Respiratory Diseases.—Owing to the absence of Influenza during the year admissions and deaths under other Respiratory Diseases fell from 4,026 and 400 to 656 and 14, respectively.

Diarriœa.—This disease accounts for 535 admissions and 19 deaths against 654 admissions and 24 deaths. Of the 19 deaths 13 occurred at Montgomery Central Jail alone.

Other causes are responsible for 125 deaths and 5,525 admissions against 118 deaths and 4,573 admissions in the previous year.

The excessive heat of the summer months caused 292 cases of heat and sunstrokes and 23 deaths, Cerebro-spinal Fever accounted for 3 deaths.

Relapsing Fever appeared in Hissar Jail, 42 convicts and one undertrial prisoner were attacked, resulting in the death of five convicts. The infection was brought from the District where this disease was prevalent.

Influenza.—This disease as a residue of the year 1918 caused 26 admissions and two deaths in Multan Central Jail and one admission in Montgomery Central Jail.

A case of plague occurred at Rawalpindi Jail in the family of a member of the staff. All prisoners and the staff were inoculated and the disease did not spread.

CHAPTER VII.—MISCELLANEOUS REMARKS.

51. The expenditure on buildings increased from Rs. 1,20,225 to Rs. 1,42,237. The chief works undertaken were:—

providing a metalled road from the main gate to workshops, school buildings, a new hospital a pucca watercourse for the garden, a tank and hydrant for fire protection, record racks and a painter's shop in the Lahore Borstal Central Jail; provision of iron grated doors to the solitary cells in the Jullundur Jail; constructing blanket-mulling shed and two grinding mills in Montgomery Central Jail; re-roofing certain barracks in the Multan Central Jail; and constructing a well at Dera Ghazi Khan Jail.

52. All Jails and Sub-Jails were inspected during the year with the exception of the Sub-Jail at Dharamsala.

53. In conclusion, I would, in addition to those already mentioned, draw attention to the excellent work done by the Superintendents and Jailors of the various jails, especially during the strenuous times during the earlier part of the year. Special credit is due to the Superintendents and Jailors of the two Central Jails in Lahore, i.e., Major W. T. Finlayson, D.S.O., I.M.S., and Mr. H. M. Cowan, I.C.S., Sardar Sahib Bhai Hukam Singh and Khan Sahib Mirza Nawab Beg.

Considering the importance of the Borstal system the Department is fortunate in having had Major Finlayson returned from Military duty to give new life to the Borstal Jail with his special knowledge and zeal. It is hoped that soon the other central jails will have the advantage of I.M.S. superintendence, involving, as it does, unity of command and relative permanency of superintendence.

I am sorry to report the death of Mr. G. W. T. Hyde, Superintendent of the Head Office. He was a very capable hardworking officer and managed his office very efficiently. He has been succeeded by Mr. H. V. O. Waters who is also a capable and hardworking officer. I am indebted to both of them for the assistance rendered by them and to Lala Bharat Ram, Head Accountant, of my office and to Pandit Ratan Chand, my Camp Clerk.
