REPORT ON THE OPERATIONS AND PRO-GRESS OF THE PANJAB UNIVERSITY COLLEGE, DURING THE YEAR 1879.

(Submitted to the Annual Meeting of Convocation of the Panjab University College on the 29th May 1880.)

INTRODUCTION.

After the very brilliant Meeting of Convocation on the 12th April 1879, it has not been considered necessary to hold this year a meeting for the general body of subscribers and the public, although it may be mentioned that His Excellency the Secretary of State for India has consented to the Panjab University College receiving the full Status of an University in Arts, with power of conferring also degrees in Law, Medicine and Engineering as soon as the Government is "convinced by sufficient evidence that the proficiency of the Panjab students in those branches of knowledge respectively is equal to that of the students who receive degrees from the University of Calcutta," and that the proposed Act to create the Panjab University College an University, will, in all probability, pass into Law before the end of the present legislative session of the Government of India.

A .- FINANCIAL CONDITION.

The Endowment fund stood at Rs. 3,48,300 on 31st December 1879. To this should be added a donation of Rs. 2,050 by Rai Bahadur Kanhya Lal on behalf of the P. W. D. for the award of a medal for proficiency in Engineering in honor of General Maclagan; the promise by Sirdar Bikrama Singh to found

a medal for the encouragement of proficiency in Natural Sciences will, it is hoped, be fulfilled during the course of 1880.

The subscriptions have increased from Rs. 6,353 in 1877 to Rs. 7,024 in 1878, and to Rs. 11,139 in 1879.*

The fees have increased from Rs. 10,620 in 1878 to

Rs. 10,755 in 1879.

B.—GENERAL.

A Deputation consisting of Mr. Plowden, Mr. Rawlins and Dr. Leitner as Registrar, presented a congratulatory address to His Highness the Nawab of Bahawalpur on the occasion of his accession to full powers and assurances were received from him as to the continuance of his support to the Panjab University College.

* This includes Rs. 2.666 received on account of arrears of subscription from H. H. the Raja of Mandi.

The Oriental Examinations of the Panjab University College, continue to attract candidates from other provinces, where there is nothing of the same kind. The abolition of the Anglo-Sanscrit College at Benares has led to the Pandits of that city, renowned for Sanscrit learning, turning their attention to our Shastri Examination.

C .- EXAMINATIONS.

In the various Branches of Arts, Oriental languages, Engineering, Law and Medicine, Examinations have been held during the year under review. The Arts Examinations were held in June last.

June proved to be an inconvenient month for our Examinations in Arts, which will be held this year at the end of November.

A great change has to be noticed as regards the material for our Examinations. Whereas in previous years, the same students presented themselves at both the Panjab University College and Calcutta Examinations in Arts—in 1879, with the exception of one candidate who failed at both, different sets of men went up last year for these respective Examinations, the best men, as a rule, reserving themselves for the Examination of the Local Institution.

The greatest number of failures at the last Entrance Examination were in

Mathematics, Persian, History & Geog.

The greatest number of failures at the Proficiency Examination were in Philosophy, Geology.

Two out of six failed at the High Proficiency in Arts Examination; the one in Persian and the other in Mathematics, History and Geography and Geology.

In other words, more than double the number, (which is increasing every year) are going up only for the examinations in Arts of the Panjab University College than are going up for the Calcutta University Examinations, in spite of the fact of the latter offering a recognised degree as well as other advantages, thus showing the natural superiority of the educational influence which is exercised by a local Institution.

The following Statement shows that 645 Candidates went up last year from the Panjab, for the various Panjab University College Examinations, against 115 Candidates for the Calcutta University.

In the Examinations for ORIENTAL Certificates the results were satisfactory—2 candidates succeeding in passing the Highest Maulvi, 2 the Highest Sanskrit and 9 the Highest Munshi Examinations. The Maulvis and Pandits of the Canning College, Lucknow, continue to be formidable rivals to the students of our Oriental College. The Oriental College, however, on the whole, took the lead in the competition of last year, as will be seen in the special report of that Institution.

The so-called Sarishtedar's Examination was held for the first time in 1879. It was in Vernacular officework as connected with Civil, Criminal and Revenue matters and was followed by an Examination in the whole of Arithmetic. The object of this Examination is to enable the certificated Munshis of the Panjab University College, after proving their proficiency in Persian Language and Literature, to enter at once on the practical work of a Munshi and thus to justify their right to the title in a theoretical as well as in professional sense.

In the Examinations of Law, 81 out of 104 candidates passed for the First and 9 out of 16 for the Final Law Examinations.

The proposals of the Sub-Committee on legal textbooks and standards which was appointed in December 1878, as stated in the last Report, have now been accepted by the Law Faculty and the Senate, and a revised scheme of studies has recently been prepared in order to carry out the objects of the Sub-Committee.

These Law Classes were started by the Anjuman in 1868, were taken over by the University in 1870, and were organized on their present footing chiefly by Mr. C. R. Lindsay, Judge of the Chief Court, Panjab. Mr. Ryall has most efficiently conducted them, as is evident from the above results. An Assistant Lecturer in Law will, it is hoped, be appointed next year. The special Hindu and Muhammadan Law Classes are under the efficient instruction of Pandits Guru Prasad and Rikhi Kesh and Maulvis Ghulam Qadir and Mir Abdulla. The attention of the Government of India has been drawn to the Classes for Kazis and Pradhvivakas in connexion with the new Bill for appointing persons to the office of Kazi. Altogether, we have a stronger Staff than the Law School at Allahabad, at which, according to their future more stringent rules attendance

for 2 years will entitle a student to admission to the High Court Examination. The number of students which was 85 in November 1876, rose to 177 in 1878 and was 176 in 1879. Admission is now chiefly confined to undergraduates and graduates, and the Law Report drawn up under the orders of the Executive Committee, which has been approved by the Law Faculty and the Senate, is in process of being carried out.

In Engineering, the classes have been taught in that Branch at the Oriental College, Lahore by Ganga Ram, the Mayo Patiala Fellow. These classes are instrumental in eliciting the support of the subscribing Municipalities and the advent of General Pollard may afford an encouragement to these classes, which they have not had since their institution.

The classes are attended, both by undergraduates and by purely professional students.

The full success of our Engineering Class depends on some arrangement being made to give employment to our passed students in the Public Works Department or in the Municipalities of the Panjab. The students of this Class, as of other Classes, employed the last long vacation in reporting on the practical side of their studies.

In MEDICINE the Secretary of the Medical Faculty and Principal of the Medical School, has already had an opportunity of publishing the results in his Department.

The Hakim Class of native physicians in practice which was started by the Anjuman in 1869 and was taken over by the University College in 1870, continues under Dr. Rahim Khan, "Khan Bahadur," but no report of it has been furnished. Native practitioners of distinction are said to have attended these classes for nearly ten years. Classes of Hakims and Béds have also been taught at the Oriental College by Ghulam Mustafa, who has passed the Proficiency in Arts

and Zubdat-ul-Hukema Examinations and by a distinguished Béd, Pandit Janardhan. The students, who belong to the native medical profession by birth, tradition and studies, intend to enter the Medical School after obtaining a certificate in Arts as well as an Oriental Diploma and a thorough training in the Yunani and Baidak systems of Medicines, which is required for the Oriental Medical Diplomas.

The largest percentage of success achieved by any School at the last Entrance Examination was gained by the Lahore Government School and the Vernacular High School, Ludhiana.

The Lahore Government College greatly distinguished itself at the Proficiency, High Proficiency and Honors in Arts Examinations.*

Finally the Lahore Medical School succeeded in passing all the 11 candidates for the Senior and 5 out of 9 for the Junior Examination in Medicine.

D.—RETIREMENT OF OLD AND INDUCTION OF NEW FELLOWS.

The following Fellows have been re-elected for the next 2 years :-

- 1. Pandit Guru Prasad, McLeod Kashmir Sanskrit Fellow, re-elected for 2 years, from 15th March 1879.
- 2. Assistant Surgeon Syad Amir Shah, re-elected to the Kapurthalla Natural Science Fellowship for 2 years, from 15th March 1879.
- 3. Dr. Rahim Khan, "Khan Bahadur," Honorary Surgeon, re-elected to the Jallandhar Medical Fellowship for 2 years, from 15th March 1879.
- 4. Bhai Gurmukh Singh, F. A., re-elected to the Patiala Translatorship for 2 years, from 18th March 1879.
- 5. Ganga Ram, re-elected to the Mayo Patiala Engineering Fellowship for 2 years, from 19th April 1879.
- 6. The Alexandra Fellowship is still vacant and is devoted to scholarships.
- 7. Aya Ram, B.A. was at first elected to the McLeod Panjab Arabic Fellowship for 2 years, but in January 1880 he vacated it. It is now held by Babu Panchanan Mukerji and Pirzada Muhammad Husain.

E -ADDITIONS TO, OR CHANGES IN, THE STAFF.

The Bhai Class has had to deplore the loss of Bhai Santôkh Singh, its distinguished teacher, who died at Amritsar during the long vacation. The Class has now been placed under Bhai Harsa Singh for Panjabi Language and Literature, and for subjects of general knowledge under Jogi Shiv Nath. The existence of this Class has given much satisfaction to the Sikh Chiefs, but they wish for a greater recognition than we have hitherto given to Panjabi and with this view they are subscribing

to a movement called the Singh Sabha.

The Shiah Class has been re-organized this year in accordance with the wishes of the Shiah community. Mir Abdulla, a distinguished Muhammadau Lawyer and Logician from Gabrial assists now in the tuition of Muhammadan Law and gives also instruction in Pashtu to candidates for employment on the Frontier. Hemraj, of the Shastri Class, gives instruction in Hindi.

A teacher for the Lundé and Saráfi characters has been appointed for the MUNSHIS to whom special instruction in their intended vocation is given by Maulyi Abdul Hakim in addition to Persian, Urdu and branches of general knowledge. Practice classes for Persian conversation had also been established in connexion with that Department, Hindi and Urdu copyists have been appointed in connexion with the translating office, but although the Staff has been largely increased, there has been no increase of expenditure, because the plan has been adopted of separating Fellowships and reducing them to their actual value, instead of amalgamating them or increasing their value from the general allotment.

F .- NEW PUBLICATIONS.

The literary activity displayed among teachers, fellows, and even students in 1878 continued in 1879 as is attested by the following list of publications. We have to announce the gratifying fact that the courses in both Urdu and Hindi for the Proficiency and High Proficiency Examinations in all the necessary subjects are completed. Before 1876, the rule that every fellow and scholar was bound to translate, edit or compile books, in addition to his duties as a teacher, had remained a dead letter. Now, in consequence of wiser elections, the stringency with which the rule is carried out and of the time which the three months of the long vacation afford, some very valuable material has been contributed by the labours of our Staff. The following is a list of the contributions during the year :-

ARABIC AND SANSKRIT CRITICAL JOURNALS:

The Arabic and Sanskrit Journals are still under: the Editorship of Maulvi Faiz-ul-Hassan and Pandit Rikhi Kesh respectively. Pandit Rikhi Kesh has contributed articles of antiquarian interest of considerable value, which have been appreciated by Sanscritists in India and Europe.

G.—THANKS TO STAFF.

The thanks of the University are due to all the Members of its Staff, but are especially deserved by Pandit Guru Prasada, by Maulvis Faiz-ul-Hassan, Ghulam Qadir and Abdul Hakim, and by Aya Ram, Gurmukh Singh and Maulvi Muhammad-ud-din, (every one of whose men passed the Munshi Alim Examination).

The Musha'aras or gatherings of poets in the Classical and Vernacular Oriental languages have received a great development during the year under review. As His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, who presided over one of its meetings, justly observed that they are means for keeping alive Oriental lore and a great Literature, and are a great assistance to the special aims of the University. In addition to original poems, translations from English Poetry, are also recited at these gatherings, which although chiefly supported by the Oriental College Professors and Scholars, are attended by local poets and visitors from various parts of India and even beyond the Frontier. Several of our Native Members of Senate, especially Sheikh Feroz-ud-din, the Prime-Minister of Bahawalpur, assists in the movement, which also receives the support of Nawab Ghulam Mahbub Subhani.

THE ORIENTAL COLLEGE, LAHORE, 1879.

A special Report of the Oriental College has been circulated. This Institution is in a flourishing condition. It passed 18 men for the Arts Examinations,* 6 for the Maulvi, 5 for the Pandit, 25 for the Munshi Examinations of various degrees and 3 for the Budhiman Certificate. Candidates are now ready for the various Oriental, Law and Medical Examinations. 41 men are preparing this year for the Proficiency and 11 for the High Proficiency in Arts Examinations.

The men occupied, on the whole, good positions in the list of merit and the Bahawalpur, Harbans, and other Scholarships, as well as the "First place" in the various Examinations falling to their lot.

The conduct of the students has been exemplary in spite of the heterogenous elements of which the College is composed. An academical feeling is growing up, whilst sectarian animosities are absolutely unknown. The Central Asian students are still remaining and it is hoped that Government may give a special grant to attract and keep students from those parts who may serve as pioneers of our civilization on their return to their homes.

We have now in the College several Kábulís and men from Hunza and Nagyr, whilst the Mullahs from Badakhshán, Bokhara, Kolab and Gabrial are distinguished Oriental Scholars.

This Institution was originally an Oriental School, conducted at the expense of the Anjuman-i-Panjab, and made over to the Panjab University College in 1870. The Oriental College embodies, as a teaching institution and an academic body, those principles, which the Panjab University College, in another capacity, enunciates in its Examinations. To this it is only necessary to add that the Musha'aras or gatherings of native poets, instituted as early as 1865 by the Anjuman, have lately been continued and amplified by the formation among the students and teachers of a Literary Society, before which poetical and prose compositions are read or recited in Sanskrit, Arabic, Urdu, Hindi, Persian and other Oriental languages, and at which poets as well as prose-writers from every part of the province and beyond the Frontier are appearing from time to time.

The special instruction given by the Oriental College in Law and Engineering is availed of by the

students of the Panjab Government College.

The Library and Reading Room are used by the students of both the Government and the Oriental Colleges. The Reading Room is amply provided with scientific and other Journals.

There has been a very great increase in the number of qualified students, but many have to be turned back whose accession would be desirable, in consequence of the smallness of funds.

In order to give a more living as well as a critical knowledge of the Classical Languages of India, Arabic, Persian and Sanskrit Journals, in addition to those issued under the auspices of the University College, edited by members of the Oriental College Staff, are provided.

Philological instruction has been introduced on the Sanskrit side, and a similar attempt will be made on that of Arabic, as soon as the necessary arrangements

The Courses are finished in Urdu and Hindi respectively, in the subjects required for the Proficiency and High Proficiency Examinations.

OBJECTS OF THE ORIENTAL COLLEGE.

The objects of the College are twofold: I, to give a high classical Oriental education together with instruction in branches of general knowledge, and 2, to give a practical direction to every study. Men who intend to devote themselves entirely to Literature or Science, have Scholarships and Fellowships to look forward to with their incumbent duties of teaching and translating or they may return to their homes as thoroughly trained Maulvis or Pandits who have also received a liberal education. Those who aspire to the higher dignity and function of Kazi are not only trained in their own Law, but also in the principles of jurisprudence and of the Indian Codes. Persons who wish to take up the practical work of teaching in Army Schools or in the Educational Department will, it has been promised, been admitted to a course in the Normal School. The arrangements are still in progress, and considering the varied and difficult material to deal with, as well as the important aims in view, much time and labor will yet have to be devoted to their successful execution. Still the Oriental College is now aiming to train its students for—

1. The Entrance, Proficiency and High Profi-

ciency Examinations in Arts.

2. The Oriental Certificates of Pandit, Maulvi and Munshi of various degrees.

3. For Oriental Fellowships and Translatorships.

4. The teaching functions of Maulvis and Pandits and the practical work of Munshis.

5. Native Lawyers.6. Sub-Overseers.

7. Teachers (for Indigenous, Army and Educational Department Schools).

8. Hakims and Bêds trained in native, and pre-

pared for, European systems of Medicine.

H.—CONCLUSION OF REPORT.

It is only just to say that for the success in all branches, the University is greatly indebted to the Executive Committee, especially the native members, who have been unremitting in their attendance and in their devotion in the discharge of their honorary duties.

We have again on this occasion to offer our thanks to Government for a liberal grant of pagris and kamarbands in aid of our exhausted prize fund as well as for the contribution of a number of newspapers to our Reading room, which is now by far the one most amply supplied with European and Indian papers of any at Lahore.

The Senate has had to deplore this year the death on the 22nd July 1879, of Dr. A. Neil, one of its oldest Members. The nature of his services will be detailed in the obituary, which will be found in our next Calendar Recognition of gratuitous Services rendered to the Panjab University College, during 1879.

The thanks of the University College are due to Colonel W. G. Davies, C. s. I., Commissioner of Jullundhur and Mr. Udny, Deputy Commissioner of Bunnu, and to the Municipalities of Lahore, Gujrat, Amritsar, Jullundhur and Hushiarpur (the latter Municipality's Prize for an Essay on the practical development of Indian Agriculture, Commerce, &c. has not yet been awarded), for supporting students from their districts at the University College.
