REVIEW OF THE ACCOUNTS AND REPORTS OF DISTRICT BOARDS IN THE PUNJAB FOR THE YEAR 1888-89.

[ No. 1 ]

Proceedings of the Hon'ble the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab, in the Boards and Committees (Boards)

Department,—No. 27, dated 21st February 1890.

READ-

The District Reports on the Accounts and Operations of District Boards for the year 1888-89.

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REMARKS.—The reports from the districts of the Jullundur Division were delayed by the Commissioner and Superintendent, Mr. C. Hawkins (since retired), who eventually submitted them without any remarks by himself. The direction contained in paragraph 5 of the Punjab Government's Circular No. 90, dated the 3rd July 1889, that the three parts into. which the report is divided should be capable of being detached from each other, has not been complied with in the reports from the Amritsar, Ferozepore, Peshawar and Dera Gházi Khan Districts. As failure in this respect will in future necessitate the return of the reports to be re-copied, Commissioners are requested to see that it does not recur, and to themselves comply with the rule in recording their remarks on the district reports. The Lieutenant-Governor will be much obliged to Commissioners if they will also have remedied in the district reports, before submitting them, such defects as the absence or deficiency of information on subjects which under orders of Government have to be specially noticed, e.g., the education of women in medicine and midwifery and the provision of medical relief for women. These are objects to which in the present day most District Boards and not a few Municipal Committees may reasonably be expected to devote money and attention, the practical results of which should invariably be stated in the annual reports. Where no action has been taken the fact should be mentioned and the reason for inaction on the part of the Local Body explained. The proper treatment of subjects of interest and importance such as have been mentioned above need not, however, add to the length of the annual reports, which, hitherto, in many instances, have been far too prolix, and could with advantage have been shortened by the omission of much laboured explanation of petty increases or decreases of income and expenditure and details of unimportant Public Works executed and repaired.

### PART I .- CONSTITUTION.

2. Appointment of District and Local Boards.—In every district in the Province except Simla a District Board has now been constituted under Act XX of 1883. Local or Tahsil Boards have also been constituted under the same Act in all but the following districts:—

Mooltan (one Local Board in the Mooltan Tahsíl).
Jhang.
Montgomery (one Local Board in the Dipálpur Tahsíl).
Shahpur.
Jhelum.
Ráwalpindi.
Pesháwar.
Kohát.
Dera Ismail Khan (Local Boards in two tahsíls).
Dera Gházi Khan.

Local officers are not as a rule in favour of appointing Local Boards where they do not already exist, and, generally, it may be said that the work done by Local Boards has not been fruitful. In one or two districts the District Board has delegated certain of its powers to Local Boards, and where this has been done some interest in their work seems to have been engendered in the members of the Local Board; but in most instances it appears that the Local Board is a body whose work is mainly confined to sending delegates to the District Board. The following facts regarding the number of meetings of Local Boards and the average attendance thereat illustrate this position. In Notification No. 528 of 26th February 1884 it was laid down that Local Boards should ordinarily meet not less than six times in the year. This standard has only been reached in one-third of the districts where Local Boards have been established. None of the Local Boards of the Hazára or Muzaffargarh Districts met at all during the year, nor did the Local Board of Bannu Tahsil. The Local Boards of Pipli, Wazirabad, Bhakkar and Leiah only met once, and there are ten other Local Boards which met only twice during the year. In as many as 35 Local Boards the average attendance of members at meetings was below 50 per cent. The Deputy Commissioner, Hazára, suggests the desirability of abolishing the Local Boards in that district, and the Deputy Commissioner, Bannu, observes that there is no real necessity for Local Boards in his district, as the District Board does all that is required. The most active Local Boards seem to be those of the Delhi Division, and those of the Ferozepore, Jullundur and Siálkot Districts.

3. Meetings of District Boards.—District Boards have been fairly active during the year. Under Rule XV of Notification No. 528½ of the 26th February 1884, a District Board is expected to hold an ordinary meeting not less than once in three months, or four times a year. The only District Boards that have failed to come up to this standard are—

Kángra ... 2 meetings.
Dera Ismail Khan ... Ditto.
Dera Gházi Khan ... Ditto.

The average attendance of members has been below 50 per cent. in the districts of Ludhiána, Jhang, Amritsar, Jhelum, Hazára, Pesháwar, Kohát and Dera Ismail Khan. The size of District Boards varies very greatly—from as many as 107 members on the Umballa District Board to 22 on the Amritsar Board. The main cause of this want of uniformity is that in some districts every member of each Local Board is also a member of the District Board. In other districts Local Boards delegate a certain number of their body as their representatives on the District Board. In districts

like Jhelum, Ráwalpindi and Pesháwar, where Local Boards have not been constituted, the number of members of the District Boards is necessarily large. Ethnological distinctions among the people also sometimes necessitate the appointment of members to represent the interests of special clans or tribes, and where these are numerous in a district the number of members is proportionately swelled.

4. Constitution of Boards.—In the following districts the system of election has not been introduced, viz., Mooltan, Jhang, Montgomery, the Kulu Sub-Division of Kángra, Shahpur, Jhelum, Ráwalpindi, the districts of the Pesháwar Division except Hazára, and the districts of the Deraját Division. The official element on the Boards is naturally stronger also in these districts than elsewhere. As a rule, the Tahsíldár is Chairman of the Local Boards, but in the following districts Local Boards were composed entirely of non-official members:—

Delhi, all three tabsils.

Kaugra, Hamirpur Tabsil.

Hoshiarpur, all four tabsils.

Jullundur, Jullundur Tabsil.

Ferozepore, four tabsils.

Gurdáspur, three tabsils.

Siálkot, five tabsils.

Deputy Commissioners are in all cases Chairmen of District Boards, except in the case of Siálkot, where a Native gentleman has been elected Chairman. The Amritsar District Board used to be presided over by a non-official member, but the scheme was unsuccessful, and great improvement is reported in the working of the Board since the Deputy Commissioner was appointed Chairman. Iu districts where the elective system is in force the number of members elected to the District Boards exceeds the number of nominated members, except in the Ferozepore District, where there are 15 nominated members and 13 elected. The statement appended (I) shows the constitution of District and Local Boards for each district in detail. In filling up sub-columns 1 and 5 of column 6 some slight difference in method has been observed by District Officers. As a rule, it is laid down that Chairmen of Local Boards shall be ex-officio members of District Boards. In some districts such Chairmen have been relegated to subcolumn 3 (elected) as they have been considered to be delegates of a body that is mainly composed of elected members; but as in many cases these Chairmen are Tahsildars they have been included under 'officials,' column 5. This explanation is necessary, because in some districts the number of officials on the Boards is returned as larger than the total of ex-officio plus nominated members, which would give the impression that officials come forward as candidates for election, which is not the case.

at elections that was evinced when the system was first introduced is dying out. In Karnál the following vacancies occurred:—

These figures seem to show a certain amount of interest in the result of elections. In the Umballa District no elections were held, though under the rules in force one-third of the members of the Local Boards should have gone out of office. This omission has not been explained, but the Deputy Commissioner has taken steps to ensure that vacancies occurring shall in future be filled up according to the prescribed rule. In Kángra there were no contests, the outgoing members being re-elected in all cases. Of 22 vacancies occurring in Jullundur, 8 were contested. In half of the contested cases a new candidate was returned. No elections were held in Ludhiána, but here also no explanation has been given. On the whole candidates are not eager to come forward for election, men of good standing shrinking from the chance of what they consider the shame of a defeat.

- 6. Sub-Committees.—In many districts Sub-Committees of Finance, Dispensaries, Education and Public Works were formed, but little information is given as to the amount or nature of the work performed by them. In Gurgaon a Sub-Committee for promoting reduction of expenditure at marriages is said to have done good work, though perhaps it is a subject not directly pertaining to the province of a District Board. It is requested that the subject of the appointment of Sub-Committees and the work done by them may receive special notice in future annual reports.
- 7. Proceedings set aside by Commissioner or Deputy Commissioner.—Proceedings of the District Board, Gujránwála, regarding the appointment of a Secretary were set aside by the Commissioner. Similarly, proceedings of the Jhelum District Board proposing to appoint Hakíms payable from District Funds were quashed as opposed to the general policy of Government. Proceedings of the District Board, Ráwalpindi, concerning the curtailment of expenditure on existing dispensaries in order to provide for new ones were also set aside by the Commissioner, as also two proposals of the District Board, Shahpur, to grant gratuities.
- 8. Rules framed during the year.—Rules regarding the employment of compounders by Local Bodies and the purchase of European medicines, the grant of rewards, and stores and plant were framed by Government during the year.

Rules for the conduct of business under Section 26 of the Act were framed by many District Boards during the year. Rules for the delegation of duties of the District Board to Local Boards have not yet generally been framed.

9. Boundaries.—The area under the Pipli Local Board of the Umballa District has been diminished, and that under the Kaithal Local Board of the Karnál District has been increased by the transfer of the Pehowa Iláka from Pipli to Kaithal. Two small Municipalities in the Dera Tahsíl of the Kángra District and one small Municipality in the Hamírpur Tahsíl of the same district have been abolished during the year, and their area added to that of the Local Board concerned.

#### PART II .- ACCOUNTS.

10. The following statement shows against each major head of the budget the estimated and actual income and expenditure of the several District Funds in 1888-89 as compared with the receipts and charges in 1887-88. The detailed accounts of the year under review are appended (Statement II):—

<sup>11.</sup> The Lieutenant-Governor notes with satisfaction the increase of outlay incurred by the Boards on Public Works and the consequent reduction of the balances at credit of the District Funds from Rs. 13,69,698 at the beginning of 1887-88 to Rs. 12,35,651 at the end of 1888-89. Each District Board is required to maintain permanently a balance equal to 10 per cent. of its income, and in many districts it is desirable and possible to keep a further sum in reserve to meet any extraordinary deficiency of income or increase of expenditure that might become inevitable in times of severe scarcity or famine when the collection of the Local Rate would have to be

suspended and relief operations undertaken. The maintenance of balances in excess of these limits, however, is unnecessary and tends to defeat the object with which the local rate was imposed, and the Lieutenant-Governor will be glad if Commissioners and Deputy Commissioners will consider how the accumulations now standing at credit of the several District Boards can best be utilized. Much remains to be done throughout the Province in the way of improving communications and providing necessary public buildings and sanitary and other works, and it is not satisfactory that where funds are available for these purposes they should be neglected and the money hoarded to no advantage. In the Hissar and Jhang Districts the balances are now nearly five times greater than they were at the beginning of 1884-85; in Karnál, Rohtak, Gurdáspur, Ferozepore and Shahpur they have doubled or nearly doubled during the same period; the amounts at credit of the District Funds of Umballa, Jullundur and Jhelum are also now much larger than they were five years ago. Possibly the failure to fully utilize the current income of the District Funds which these results indicate is due partly to an imperfect understanding of the orders contained in the Punjab Government Resolution No. 484 S., dated the 24th September 1883. The condition that District Boards must obtain special sanction in each case for the works for which they proposed to appropriate the balances made available by these orders referred only to the balances in excess of a certain limit which had already accumulated, and was not intended to apply to future surpluses of income over expenditure. These the Punjab Government desired should be available for appropriation under ordinary rules, the surplus income of one year being spent, if possible, in the next or any following year. The contrary view appears, however, to have been acted on, with the result that the grants for each year have been limited to the income of the year and the surpluses of previous years allowed to remain unappropriated and swell the balance. Recent instructions from the Government of India in the Financial Department have made it necessary to revise the Punjab Government's orders of September 1883, and the opportunity will be taken in doing this to make clear to District Boards the conditions under which the balances at their credit may in future be appropriated. In these conditions the necessity of obtaining the previous sanction of Government to utilize the available balances will be dispensed with except when the amount proposed for appropriation is considerable; and the Lieutenant-Governor trusts that the Boards will then experience no difficulty in having placed at their disposal at the beginning of each year as much money as may be available and can be spent to advantage. The accumulation of balances, however, is due in far greater degree to the general absence of system in the prosecution of Public Works by District Boards; for, as a matter of fact, for many years past the annual outlay has been much below the annual grant. Each District Board will do well to prepare, as soon as possible, a list of proposed Public Works, and after it has been sanctioned by the Commissioner or by the Government, as may be necessary under the rules, proceed to have plans and estimates drawn up and approved by the prescribed authorities. The works should be entered in the list in the order of their relative importance and urgency, and the preparation of the plans and estimates should be expedited in order that there shall be no want of complete projects to be taken in hand in each year while funds for the purpose are available. A programme of local Public Works having thus been got ready for each district, no difficulty need be experienced in fully utilizing the income of the District Fund and the savings of previous years now lying to the credit of the Boards. The charge for the employment of the Provincial Public Works Department in the execution of local works is now a very moderate one, and that agency will in most cases be made available for the purpose where the local establishment cannot be depended on,

- 12. The overdrawal of its account by Rs. 2,115 by the District Board of Dera Gházi Khan has formed the subject of special enquiry, and measures have been taken by the Board to bring its balance up to the prescribed minimum of 10 per cent, of income in the current year. The balance of the Muzaffargarh District Fund on 31st March 1889 was also deficient, and steps should be taken to raise it to the required figure.
- 13. The receipts and charges of the several District Funds amounted respectively to Rs. 25,10,417 and Rs. 26,00,530 as compared with Rs. 24,36,338 and Rs. 24,80,272 in the previous year. The estimated income and expenditure of the year were Rs. 24,43,200 and Rs. 26,98,000. A not inconsiderable amount of new income and expenditure was brought upon the accounts of 1888-89 under the heads XIII and 15—Post Office, by the transfer to the District Boards of Jhang, Dera Ismail Khan and Bannu of the mail-cart services in these districts previously maintained by Government. With this exception no addition of any importance was made to the various classes of receipts and charges controlled by District Boards.
- 14. As in previous years the income of the Funds administered by these Bodies was derived principally from the Local Rate including, where separately imposed, the Road, Education and Post cesses. Of these the share assigned for local purposes under Acts V of 1878 and XX of 1883 was Rs. 20,23,056, or four-fifths of the net collections, and amounted to nearly 81 per cent. of the total receipts of the Funds. Of the expenditure incurred by the Boards, the proportion devoted to Public Works was between 40 and 41 per cent. About 19 and 11 per cent. respectively were spent on education and medical relief.
- 15. The principal receipts and charges are noticed in the following paragraphs:—

I.—Land Revenue.—The increase in 1888-89 is to a great extent nominal, being in fact the result of revised classification, whereby the sale proceeds of trees, grass, &c., have been transferred from XXV—Miscellaneous to this head. The Lieutenant-Governor understands that these receipts are to a great extent really income derived from arboriculture, and His Honor thinks that, if so, they would be more appropriately classed in the accounts under the same head as the expenditure on arboriculture, viz, "Minor Departments." The Accountant-General is requested to consider this suggestion and to carry it out if he sees no objection. Another item which seems to be out of place under the head now in question is the sale proceeds of waste paper in District Board Offices. There is no analogy between this income and the Revenue Record-Room Receipts of the Imperial and Provincial Accounts; and it should apparently be transferred to XXV—Miscellaneous.

Nearly a fourth of the total income by sale of trees, &c., was realized in the Siálkot District alone, where these receipts amounted to Rs. 15,690, or about Rs. 5,000 more than in the previous year. A large number of old trees in this district were destroyed by storms in 1838-89, but the Deputy Commissioner attributes the increase of receipts partly also to supervision of sales by the Presidents of the Local Boards personally.

VI.—Provincial Rates.—Conditions unfavourable to the Land Revenue and consequently to the Local Rate caused a decrease of from Rs. 2,000 to Rs. 3,000 in the District Fund share of the latter in each of the districts of Peshawar, Kohat and Bannu. A deficiency of about Rs. 3,000 in the local share of the revenue in the Rohak District is attributed to a reduction of canal irrigation due to seasonable rains. In all the other districts the receipts were either practically equal to, or in excess of, the collections of the previous year. An increase of about Rs. 14,000

in Umballa is the result of a revision of the Land Revenue assessment and to the same cause is due the additional revenue, amounting to Rs. 6,000 and Rs. 4,000 respectively, realized in Karnál and Ferozepore. From the income of the District Boards under the present head, or, in other words, from the share of the Local Rate assigned to the District Funds under Section 9 of Act XX of 1883, was recovered, as usual, on behalf of the Provincial Revenues, the contribution for Provincial Departments authorized in Section 37 of the Act. This contribution after adding and deducting the amounts payable to and by the Funds on account of Provincial Properties, Public Works and Other Services transferred to the Boards for management amounted to Rs. 3,91,545.

The mail-cart lines in the Jhang, Dera Ismail Khan, Bannu and Kohát Districts are subsidized by the Imperial Postal Department, and the first three also received grants-in-aid from the Provincial Revenues. The Provincial grants, amounting in each case to Rs. 2,400, are not, however, included in the income stated above, as they are adjusted by reduction of the contribution mentioned in the preceding paragraph. The Kohát line was worked at a profit, as was also the line in the Jhang District, the income of which, as explained above, is understated by Rs. 2,400. The expenditure on the lines in Dera Ismail Khan and Bannu exceeded the income, including the Provincial contributions, by Rs. 1,257 and Rs. 405 only respectively, and these lines are also practically self-supporting. These results are satisfactory, but every effort should be made by attention to the income and economical working to dispense with the Provincial contributions, which should not be regarded as permanent. The circumstances under which the Mail-Cart Services in Jhang, Dera Ismail Khan and Bannu were maintained at considerable cost to the Provincial Revenues previous to their transfer to the Boards on 1st April 1888 do not now exist, and the Lieutenant-Governor trusts that it may be possible in the near future to relieve the Provincial Revenues of all charges in connection with them. The ekka dak service in Gurgaon, which was started only in November 1888, receives a subsidy of Rs. 240 per annum from the Imperial Postal Department, and is expected to be self-supporting.

In the review by Government of the District Fund Accounts for 1887-88 (Punjab Government Proceedings No. 476 S.—Boards, dated the 12th September 1889) notice was taken of the apparently excessive strength of the District Board's Office, Karnál, and the extraordinarily large number of peons employed by the Boards of Amritsar and Jullundur. A reduction has since been effected in Amritsar, but no explanation has yet been received from the Jullundur and Karnál Boards, and in the accounts for the year now under review the cost of Establishments and Contingencies in these offices exceeds that of the previous year by Rs. 520 and Rs. 1,966 respectively. The increase in the Jullundur District is stated to be "in Contingencies," and in the case of Karnál it is explained to be the difference between a whole year's and four months' salary of the Board's Secretary, who was appointed in December 1887. In both cases, however, the same scales of establishment appear to have been maintained in 1888-89 as in 1887-88, and the Commissioners of the Divisions are therefore requested to have the explanations asked for by Government expedited.

The District Board of Umballa increased the cost of its establishment by Rs. 2,593 by appointing an English Secretary, a Náib-Názir and a Farásh, but reduced the contingent expenditure by Rs. 728. The Deputy Commissioner has presumably satisfied himself that the appointment designated Náib-Názir is really required: the necessity for it is not apparent without explanation. The Commissioner of the Delhi Division is requested to direct the early submission of the explanation regarding the expenditure of the District Board, Umballa, on postage which was asked for in the review of the accounts of 1887-88.

The office establishments paid from District and Municipal Funds has formed the subject of a recent Resolution of the Punjab Government (No. 2546, dated 10th December 1889), and further examination of the expenditure on this account in 1888-89 is not therefore necessary. The attention of Commissioners and Deputy Commissioners has been drawn to the very considerable increase in the cost of these establishments which has taken place since 1st January 1884, and if reductions are possible, the Lieutenant-Governor trusts they will be carried out. The principle that all work connected with District Boards and Municipal Committees shall be paid for by these Bodies should of course be insisted on, but it is obviously most desirable that there should be no extravagance in this direction.

The necessity for the issue of precise instructions to District Boards as to the kind of charges which should be classed as office contingencies is again apparent, and the Lieutenant-Governor will be much obliged if the Accountant-General will take early steps to revise the present classification. The follow-

ing among other misclassifications occur under the head in question in the accounts of 1888-89:-

Delhi ... Expenses of a law suit connected with a road.

Hoshiárpur ... Printing charges.

Ráwalpindi ... Travelling allowance of Veterinary establishment.

XVII and 20.—Police.—Under this head are exhibited the receipts and charges of cattle-pounds managed by District Boards. In the year under review six cattle-pounds in the Sirsa Tahsil were transferred to the District Board, Hissar; the District Board of Rohtak established three new pounds; and the Municipal pounds in Haripur, Sujánpur and Jowálamukhi were taken over by the District Board of Kángra on the abolition of these Municipalities. Of an increase of Rs. 1,617 in the income of the cattle-pounds under the District Board, Umballa, Rs. 1,000 is reported to be "a nominal increase, since refunded," and the remainder a "real increase due to an economy in the purchase and storage of fodder." These explanations are not understood and no delay should be allowed to occur in reporting the system of cattle-pound accounts in Umballa to the Accountant-General for approval, if this has not already been done.

Although the income from school fees in the Province as a whole was not much below the amount realized in the previous year, the accounts show that in most districts there was a decrease, which was due to the exemption of the children of agriculturists from the payment of the reduced fees formerly paid by them. A considerable increase, however, took place in Amritsar, Shahpur and Jhelum, and the improvement in these and a few other districts helped to raise the Provincial total to the amount collected in 1887-88. The increase in Shahpur is due to the imposition of fees for the first time in the "Davies" School. The contributions to District Funds and the miscellaneous receipts of the Boards in connection with education call for no remark. The expenditure incurred on education by District Boards in 1888-89 has been noticed at some length in the Education Report for the year and need not be further examined. Compared with the outlay in 1886-87 it is much less and with that of 1887-88 not materially greater, but the expenditure in 1886-87 included very considerable grants for the establishment of scholarships in the Aitchison College, and if these are excluded it will be found that a substantial increase has been made in the allotments for education from the District Funds since 1886-87. The money specially made available to the Boards in

that year for the promotion of primary education has since in great part been devoted to the purpose in most districts, and where this is not the case the Boards have been required to take immediate measures to fulfil their obligations in this direction.

The attention of the Director of Public Instruction is invited to the remarks made in the Lieutenant-Governor's review of the District Fund Accounts of 1887-88 regarding the expenditure which is charged against the District Funds under the head "Education, Inspection," and he is requested to submit an explanation of these charges on an early date.

Great diversity of practice is again apparent in the classification of the receipts. In some districts interest on investments belonging to dispensaries managed by Boards is classified under XII—Interest, while in others the same item is shown under XX—Medical "Miscellaneous." Similarly, contributions from Municipalities towards the cost of vaccination establishments and dispensaries and for other medical purposes are classed variously as Hospital Receipts and Miscellaneous. The Lieutenant-Governor will be much obliged if the Accountant-General will take early steps to secure correct classification of the income in greater detail, as suggested in His Honor's review of the accounts of 1887-88. In particular he is requested to arrange for the exhibition of the receipts and charges of Leper Asylums, including contributions from one district to another for the maintenance of lepers, separate from those of hospitals and dispensaries. There are Leper Asylums in several districts, and in view of proposed legislation for the segregation of lepers, it is desirable that the financial position of these institutions and the extent to which District Boards already contribute for the maintenance of lepers should be easily ascertainable from the accounts.

The Lieutenant-Governor observes that the District Board of Siálkot pays for the maintenance of lepers from that district at the Tarn Táran and Serai Dakhni Asylums in Amritsar and Jullundur, but makes no charge for the lepers from other districts supported in its own asylum at Báwa Lakhan. There seems to be no reason why the cost of maintaining lepers from other districts in the Báwa Lakhan Asylum should not be recovered and credited to the Siálkot District Fund, and the District Board should in future apply to the districts concerned for the amounts due by them on this account.

Of the expenditure shown against the head "Medical Establishment" Rs. 1,661 and Rs. 5,458 apparently represent the cost of dispensaries in Kohát and Hazára, and should have been classed under "Hospitals and Dispensaries." Deducting these, the remaining details are (1) Rs. 3,418, the pay of Hakíms employed in the Gujránwála, Lahore, Ferozepore, Kángra, Gurgaon, Rohtak, Bannu and Pesháwar Districts; (2) Rs. 1,203, the cost of quinine purchased in Ferozepore and Hissar for distribution in the villages during the prevalence of fever; (3) Rs. 262 of cholera charges in Ferozepore and Hazára; and Rs. 97 for country medicines and miscellaneous in Pesháwar. Expenditure of the same character in the other districts appears to have been included in the cost of hospitals and dispensaries, and, as was suggested in the review of accounts for 1887-88, precise instructions from the Accountant-General appear to be necessary to secure uniformity of classification here also.

The decrease of expenditure on Hakíms in the Gujránwála District from Rs. 2,247 to Rs. 1,776 is satisfactory. In no other district apparently is the cost of Hakíms so considerable, and the District Board of Gujránwála will do well to consider whether the number of this class of practitioners in its employment cannot be reduced.

The practice of distributing quinine in the villages during the prevalence of fever is now very general, and the system of employing Hospital Assistants to itinerate for the purpose of affording medical relief to the people in their homes in times of sickness is gradually being extended. The question whether medicines so distributed should be given free of charge is suggested by a remark on the report of the District Board by the Commissioner of Delhi, and deserves the careful consideration of all District Boards.

The Lieutenant-Governor views with satisfaction the increased attention which is being given by District Boards generally to the subject of the education of women in obstetrics and the provision of medical relief for women. In some districts stipends have been granted for the support of women sent for instruction to the hospitals and classes at Lahore, Amritsar and elsewhere; in others qualified midwives have been entertained to practise and teach midwifery; and in some liberal contributions have been made for the support and improvement of one or other of the principal female hospitals in the Province.

The sales at the cattle fairs held in the Hissar and Rohtak Districts were much larger than in the previous year, and the income from fees at these fairs increased in proportion. The net result of the contract with the Local Government under which these fairs are managed by the District Boards was a clear gain to the Boards of Rs. 11,613 and Rs. 5,672 respectively. The principal item in the expenditure classed under "Minor Departments" is the cost of arboriculture, which amounted to Rs. 41,478 as compared with Rs. 43,089 in the previous year. The subject of arboriculture has been treated in a separate report, and does not call for further notice here. The Lieutenant-Governor is glad to notice an increase in the sum spent by District Boards under the head Veterinary Charges. Veterinary Assistants were employed by the Boards in most districts, and a number of stipendiary students were in training for local service in the Veterinary College at Lahore. The only districts in which no expenditure at all was incurred on any of these accounts are Pesháwar, Kohát and Bannu.

29—Superannuation.—With one exception, viz., a gratuity of Rs. 540, disbursed by the District Board, Kangra, the superannuation allowances granted from the District Funds in 1888-89 do not appear to have been reported for the previous sanction of the Local Government. The omission is apparently due to a misunderstanding on the part of Boards as to the procedure to be followed in respect of such grants, but the Lieutenant-Governor trusts that it will not recur again after the clear instructions on the subject which were given to Local Bodies in the Lieutenant-Governor's remarks on the accounts of 1887-88.

There has been no actual falling-off in the income formerly adjusted under this head, but, as has already been explained (section I—Land Revenue, above), the bulk of the receipts have undergone a change of classification. The Accountant-General has been asked to examine the details of the

miscellaneous income of the Boards and to issue such instructions as may be necessary for their correct classification in future. He will now be requested to extend the enquiry to the miscellaneous charges also, as there are several items of expenditure included in the amounts adjusted against this head which should apparently have been taken against other heads in the accounts.

Owing to the discontinuance of rewards for the species "Afais" and partly also to the payment of rewards having been entrusted only to officers in charge of police stations, there was a decrease of Rs. 7,522 in the expenditure incarred by the District Board, Delhi, for the destruction of snakes. In Karnál, on the other hand, the charges on this account rose from Rs. 3,457 to Rs. 5,741, the increase being due to extended operations and the raising of the reward for killing cobras to the scale approved by Government.

The charges described as "Petty Establishment" are for the most part connected with the maintenance of dak bungalows and serais.

The ferry income of the District Board, Amritsar, which declined somewhat in 1887-88, more than recovered itself in the year under review in consequence chiefly of the leasing of the tolls on the important ferry at Wazir Bhular which had for many years previously been under direct management. There was a substantial increase in the ferry receipts of the Ferozepore District also. But in Karnál and Ludhiána the collections were considerably less than in the previous year, and in Dera Gházi Khan the retransfer of the Koreshi ferry from the Board to Government reduced the District Fund income by nearly Rs. 16,000. The decrease in Karnál is due to a reaction following on losses to the contractors by overspeculation in previous years, and in Ludhiána it is the result of the Sutlej having become fordable during some months of the year since the opening of the Sirhind Canal. The disadvantage at which the District Board of Gurdáspur believes itself to be in the collection of its ferry income is not quite understood. If there is in reality any deficiency in the powers with which the Board has been invested in this behalf and in the ferry rules it should be separately represented.

Nearly a half of the miscellaneous receipts under this head in 1887-88 is due to a refund of money irregularly withdrawn from the District Fund, Karnál, in 1886 for a project which was eventually abandoned.

#### PART III .- PUBLIC WORKS.

16. The following remarks regarding the outlay by District Boards on Public Works are for the most part extracted from the report on the same by the Examiner, Public Works Accounts, from which are also taken the appended abstracts (A, B and C) of the expenditure on original works.

The Examiner's review shows that whereas the total amount placed at the disposal of the Boards for outlay in 1888-89 was Rs. 12,62,089, the sum actually spent was only Rs. 10,60,135, and that this lapse of budget provision occurred in all the districts except Pesháwar. The Simla District is excluded because no Public Works outlay is incurred in it from District Funds. In twelve districts the average amount which lapsed does not exceed Rs. 1,000, and the expenditure may be said to have been practically equal to the grants. But in the seventeen others the unutilized portions of the grants ranged from Rs. 3,600 to Rs. 37,000. The largest lapses took place in Umballa, Ludhiána, Gujránwála, Gujrát, Dera Gházi Khan and Dera Ismail Khan, where the outlay was as much as from Rs. 12,000 to Rs. 37,000 below the allotments. These results are not satisfactory, and seem amply to establish the conclusion stated in paragraph 11 above that the large accumulations in the District Fund balances are the result not so much of deficient budget allotments, but principally of the failure of the Boards to make full use of the allotments. This failure seems to be due to the absence of a programme of approved Public Works such as has already been described, without which budget provision must inevitably precede the preparation of plans and estimates and lapse if there is any delay in completing the latter and getting them approved. The Lieutenant-Governor trusts that District Boards will, now that their attention has been drawn to the subject, do all in their power to prevent such lapses of budget provision as have been brought to notice by the Examiner, and endeavour to make full use of the District Funds in the active prosecution of approved projects.

"Thirteen Major Original Works and 81 others, costing between Rs. 750 and Rs. 2,500 each, were completed during the year.

"The provision for Original Works in the Revised Estimate was in excess of the outlay by Rs. 97,552, of which the savings under "Communications" alone amounted to Rs. 72,904, and occurred chiefly in the Rohtak, Umballa, Hoshiárpur, Ludhiána, Siálkot and Gujrát Districts. Under "Miscellaneous Public Improvements" the lapse amounted to Rs. 32,695, and of this sum the Dera Ismail Khan District alone is responsible for Rs. 17,100.

17. Contributions.—The net charge of Rs. 3,91,545 against the District Funds under this head has been explained in paragraph 15, VI of these remarks. A complete statement of the sums payable to and recoverable from each District Board on account of Provincial Properties, Public Works and Other Services is under preparation, and will be circulated for the information and guidance of these Bodies in the preparation of their annual budget estimates. A special order of Government for every such adjustment has, however, been communicated to the Boards concerned, and it is not apparent why there should be any such difference as is noticed in the report of the District Board, Ráwalpindi, between its own and the sanctioned estimate of the contribution recoverable from it in 1888-89. The Accountant-General will doubtless afford the Board a full explanation of the budget entry if application is made to him.

18. Provincial Properties.—The statements contained in the reports under review of the working of the financial contracts under which certain Provincial Properties are managed by District Boards are in most cases incomplete or altogether wanting, and it is therefore not possible in every case to determine whether the Board has gained or not by the contract. Instructions for the preparation of the statement will be issued before the reports for 1889-90 become due, and it is hoped that complete information will be forthcoming for that and future years.

ORDER.—Ordered that copies of the foregoing Remarks be forwarded to all Commissioners and Deputy Commissioners, the Accountant-General and the Secretary to Government in the Public Works Department, and be submitted to the Government of India in the Home Department.

Also that the Remarks and a translation of them be published in the Puniab Government Gazette, English and Urdu versions respectively, and that copies of the Urdu translation be supplied to Deputy Commissioners for the information of District and Local Boards.
