PROGRESS OF THE WORK DURING THE YEAR 1900

The following report contains a summary of the work done during the year 1900, and is published for the information of the public.

The work of the Bureau during the year 1900 has been characterized by a steady and successful progress in all the lines of its activity.

The following are the principal results of the work done during the year 1900:

READ—

The district reports on the administration and accounts of the district boards in the Punjab for the year 1905-06.

REMARKS :—

PART I.—CONSTITUTION OF DISTRICT BOARDS.

1. The year has been singularly uneventful, and there is hardly any event of interest to chronicle.

(a).—The only new board created in the year under report was that of Lyallpur; the district board of Jhang was reconstituted. A report on the desirability of abolishing local boards in Ferozepore reached Government during the year, but final orders were not passed within the period of report.

(b) and (c).—There are no alterations in boundaries to record, nor were there any important changes in the system of appointing members. Of a total number of 1,110 district board members, 20 per cent. hold *ex-officio* seats, 46 per cent. are nominated, and 34 per cent. elected. Six per cent. are Europeans and 23 per cent. officials.

(d).—Except in Karnal, Ludhiana and Sialkot the elections for district and local boards awaken little interest. The elective system is practically not existent in the Rawalpindi and Multan divisions, and how little is it appreciated in the other divisions may be gathered from the fact that for 265 seats there were only 44 contests. The percentage of voters who exercised their franchise varies from 24 to 78, but in four districts with 63 vacancies there was no poll at all. From Gujranwala the Deputy Commissioner reports that appointment is preferred to election. The Commissioner of Lahore ascribes this apathy to the fact that members feel that they individually, and the boards as a whole, have no power, and suggests that the boards should be composed mainly of *zaildars*, and that a seat on the board should be combined with a definite local authority.

(e).—In Ambala the failure of candidates to come forward for election has slightly altered the proportion between the numbers of elected and appointed members, but the disproportion is not serious.

(f).—The Sialkot district board held 11 meetings during the year, and the Ludhiana board 9, but in most districts the boards met only 4 or 5 times. The attendance at meetings was generally fair. In some districts, as Gurdaspur, Ambala, Sialkot and Rawalpindi, it was distinctly good. The Lieutenant-Governor observes that in spite of the remarks made upon last year's report the district board of Jullundur only met three times, and the Chairman's explanation will be awaited.

(g).—The general working of the boards is on the whole reported to be satisfactory, and intervention by controlling officials has hardly ever been required. In Ambala, however, it is observed that the members, though they attend meetings, do not realise the responsibility of their duties, and cannot be trusted with any executive powers. The Deputy Commissioner of Rohtak reports that the members regard their position as one to which a certain amount of prestige attaches, and that their advice is often valuable: they are, however, useful more as a means of educating the people in local self-government than as an administrative body.

The Deputy Commissioner of Sialkot writes in much the same strain. The district board facilitates discussion on matters of general interest, and enables the district officer to gauge the requirements of the various portions of his district: but there is little business for the local boards, and much of the

time of the district board is taken up with the purely formal duty of sanctioning expenditure demanded by the various departments of Government. Similarly, the Deputy Commissioner of Gujranwala reports that the non-official agency can be utilized only in a very contracted field. Commenting on this, the Commissioner writes that it is the sense of impotence which neutralises the value of the members; personal interest and initiative cannot combat the encroachments of powerful departments, and though the principle of local self-government is not affected, as such government exists only in name, "an important driving force is sacrificed." The Lieutenant-Governor hopes that the distribution of the yearly grant of 6½ lakhs which will be allotted by Commissioners with due regard to the needs of each board, will go far to remedy the present state of things. The universal complaint that communications and public works are starved, should now disappear, and it is anticipated that with sufficient funds to meet the needs of the locality, the boards will find scope for internal development, suited to their requirements, which will elicit more interest and energy from the members than has hitherto been natural or possible.

(h).—The rules framed during the year call for no comment.

PART II.—ACCOUNTS.

2. *Audit.*—The work of audit really commenced on the 22nd July 1904, but as the audit staff is required to review the accounts of 434 local bodies in the Punjab and the North-West Frontier Province, it was not possible to audit the accounts of all the district boards during the year. The audit has, however, so far as it has been possible to carry it out, achieved useful results. Necessary action has been taken in each case of irregularity reported. The most noticeable cases were at Ambala and Hoshiarpur. In both instances the irregularity was connected with outlay on public works, an item of expenditure which would appear to afford special facilities for fraud. It is essential, therefore, that special attention should be given by district boards to the expenditure on this account. The Examiner has reported that the whole system of accounts requires to be placed on a proper basis, and has proposed to lay before Government, as soon as possible, a simple code of accounts which will be drawn up on lines somewhat similar to those which have been adopted for municipalities.

3. *Balances.*—The closing balances on 31st March 1906 amounted to Rs. 13,00,000 against Rs. 12,74,000 in the previous year. None of the district boards overdrew its balance, but the district boards of Kangra and Sialkot were unable to maintain the prescribed minimum balance of 10 per cent. of the receipts during the year. This was due to the remission and suspension of land revenue in the case of the former and to arrear adjustments in the latter.

4. *Income and expenditure.*—Excluding debt head transactions, the total income for the year amounted to Rs. 31,84,000 against Rs. 33,59,000 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 1,75,000. The expenditure rose from Rs. 31,81,000 to Rs. 32,32,000, an increase of Rs. 51,000 in the year. The chief causes of this increase are noted below:—

(a). *VI Provincial Rates.*—The income fell from Rs. 25,42,000 to Rs. 22,97,000. The decrease of Rs. 2,45,000 is spread over several districts, but occurred mainly in the districts of the Delhi division owing to the recovery in the year 1904-05 of a large amount of arrears of land revenue suspended in the preceding years, and to the suspension of land revenue in the year under report on account of scarcity of rainfall. As regards other districts the decrease was due in Kangra to the remission of land revenue in the tahsils affected by the earthquake of April 1905, and in Montgomery, Lahore, Gurdaspur, Sialkot and Jhelum and in the districts of the Multan division to the suspension of land revenue on account of the failure of cotton crops.

(b). *XVII Police*.—The receipts under this head rose from Rs. 67,000 to Rs. 77,000. The increase of Rs. 10,000 occurred mainly in the Lyallpur district and is nominal—the Lyallpur district having been constituted from 1st December 1904, the comparison is virtually with four months of the previous year.

(c). *XIX and 22 Education*.—The income and expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 1,23,000 and Rs. 8,12,000 against Rs. 1,19,000 and Rs. 7,12,000 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 4,000 and Rs. 1,00,000, respectively, which is due mainly to the opening of new primary schools in the province, towards which an annual assignment of 3 lakhs is made by the Government of India.

(d). *XX and 24 Medical*.—The income under this head has fallen from Rs. 36,000 to Rs. 35,000, a decrease of Rs. 1,000 only, which is due mainly to smaller receipts from sale of plague stores.

The expenditure (excluding plague charges) amounted to Rs. 3,60,000 against Rs. 3,52,000. The increase of Rs. 8,000 is due chiefly to the fact that in the preceding year only four months' charges were shown against Lyallpur, and partly (1) to the opening of a new dispensary at Bhulwal in the Shahpur district and (2) to the grant of Rs. 1,500 by the district board, Hissar, to the Sirsa municipality for the maintenance of a dispensary in that town. The total expenditure on plague measures in local areas amounted to Rs. 44,000 against Rs. 23,000 in the previous year; but in view of the decision of Government to bear part of the charges where the financial condition of the boards necessitated this step, only Rs. 42,000 were adjusted in the year under review against Rs. 21,000 in the previous year, the difference having been finally classed as provincial expenditure.

(e). *XXI and 26 Scientific and other Minor Departments*.—The receipts under this head amounted to Rs. 1,37,000 against Rs. 1,06,000 in the previous year. The increase of Rs. 31,000 has occurred mainly under the head "Public exhibitions and fairs," due to successful sales at the cattle fairs in the districts of Hissar, Rohtak, Gurgaon and Sialkot. The larger sales at Rohtak were due to the drought, while those at Gurgaon are nominal, the attendance at the fairs held in the previous year having been affected by the prevalence of plague. The expenditure amounted to Rs. 1,98,000 against Rs. 1,55,000 in the preceding year, showing an increase of Rs. 43,000, due chiefly to a growing interest in cattle breeding and to larger outlay in Gujranwala, Attock and Mianwali in the maintenance of gardens.

(f). *29 Superannuation Allowances and Pensions*.—The payments made during the year amounted to Rs. 6,000 against Rs. 3,000 in the preceding year. This is a fluctuating item, depending on the number of officials retiring during a year and the gratuities awarded.

(g). *XXIII and 30 Stationery and Printing*.—The income and expenditure under this head fell from Rs. 4,000 and Rs. 23,000 to Rs. 2,000 and Rs. 21,000 respectively. The decrease of Rs. 2,000 on both sides of the account is nominal, and is due to the revision of the method previously followed by the Gurdaspur district board in accounting for its receipts and expenditure.

(h). *XXV and 32 Miscellaneous*.—The receipts were nearly the same as in the preceding year. The expenditure, however, rose from Rs. 29,000 to Rs. 45,000 during the year under review, owing to charges incurred by the district board, Hissar, in the improvement and renovation of certain *mandis* established by that body in the years 1902-03 and 1904-05.

(i). *XXX and 43 Irrigation, Minor Works and Navigation*.—There was a falling-off of Rs. 5,000 in the income due to the shrinkage of irrigated areas owing to deficient rain.]

The expenditure amounted to Rs. 34,000 against Rs. 26,000 in the previous year. The increase occurred mainly in the Karnal district, and is due to (1) the excavation of a channel from the Markanda to Sansa jhil and a big earth-work embankment on the bank of the jhil to prevent the Markanda water running into the Sarsuti nadi, (2) altering the head reach of Ghuna rajbaha, and (3) the construction of Kaithal minor.

(j). *XXXII and 45 Civil Works.*—The receipts under this head amounted to Rs. 3,51,000 as compared with Rs. 4,04,000 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 53,000, which is due mainly to abnormal receipts from the sale-proceeds of shop-sites, *mandis* and markets in the previous year.

The total outlay on Civil Works amounted to Rs. 10,96,000 against Rs. 10,29,000 in the preceding year, and was spread over the heads "Public Works" (Rs. 9,34,000) and "Miscellaneous" (Rs. 1,62,000). Of the outlay on works, Rs. 8,54,000 were spent by civil agency and audited by the Accountant-General, and the remainder (Rs. 80,000) was incurred by the Provincial Public Works Department and adjusted on the books of the Examiner of Public Works Accounts. Of the total outlay, Buildings absorbed Rs. 2,29,000 (Original works Rs. 1,28,000 and Repairs Rs. 1,01,000); Communications Rs. 5,41,000 (Original works Rs. 1,65,000 and Repairs Rs. 3,76,000); 'Other works of improvement' Rs. 69,000; Establishment and Contingencies Rs. 92,000, and Tools and Plant Rs. 2,000.

Under the head "Miscellaneous" is adjusted the establishment and contingent expenditure on staging bungalows and serais (Rs. 23,000), ferries (Rs. 11,000), refunds (Rs. 5,000), and expenses on roadside trees (Rs. 1,24,000).

(k). *Contribution.*—This is the head through which the financial relations between the Provincial Government and district boards are adjusted. Compared with the previous year there is an increase of Rs. 86,000 on the receipt side, which is due to special grants made by Government for the development of primary education. On the expenditure side there is a decrease of Rs. 2,18,000 which is due chiefly to the special grants for primary education made from provincial revenues and partly to a decrease in local rate owing to suspensions of land revenue.

The transactions under this head would have been greater but for the delay in making over the special contribution of 6½ lakhs assigned annually by the Government of India for the use of district boards. The grant has, however, been made in the current year, and will, with the relief arising from the stoppage from the 1st April 1906 of the dak charges hitherto paid to provincial

revenues, materially benefit the finances of these bodies. The arrear contributions which were due to Government on the 31st March 1906 amounted to Rs. 45,000 against Rs. 92,000 on the 31st March 1905.

ORDER.— Ordered, that copies of the foregoing remarks be forwarded to all Commissioners of divisions and Deputy Commissioners of districts in the Punjab, the Accountant-General, Punjab, and the Secretary to Government, Punjab, Public Works Department, Buildings and Roads Branch, and be submitted to the Government of India in the Home Department.

Also that the remarks and a translation of them be published in the *Punjab Government Gazette*, English and Urdu versions respectively, and that copies of the Urdu translation be supplied to Deputy Commissioners for the information of district and local boards.

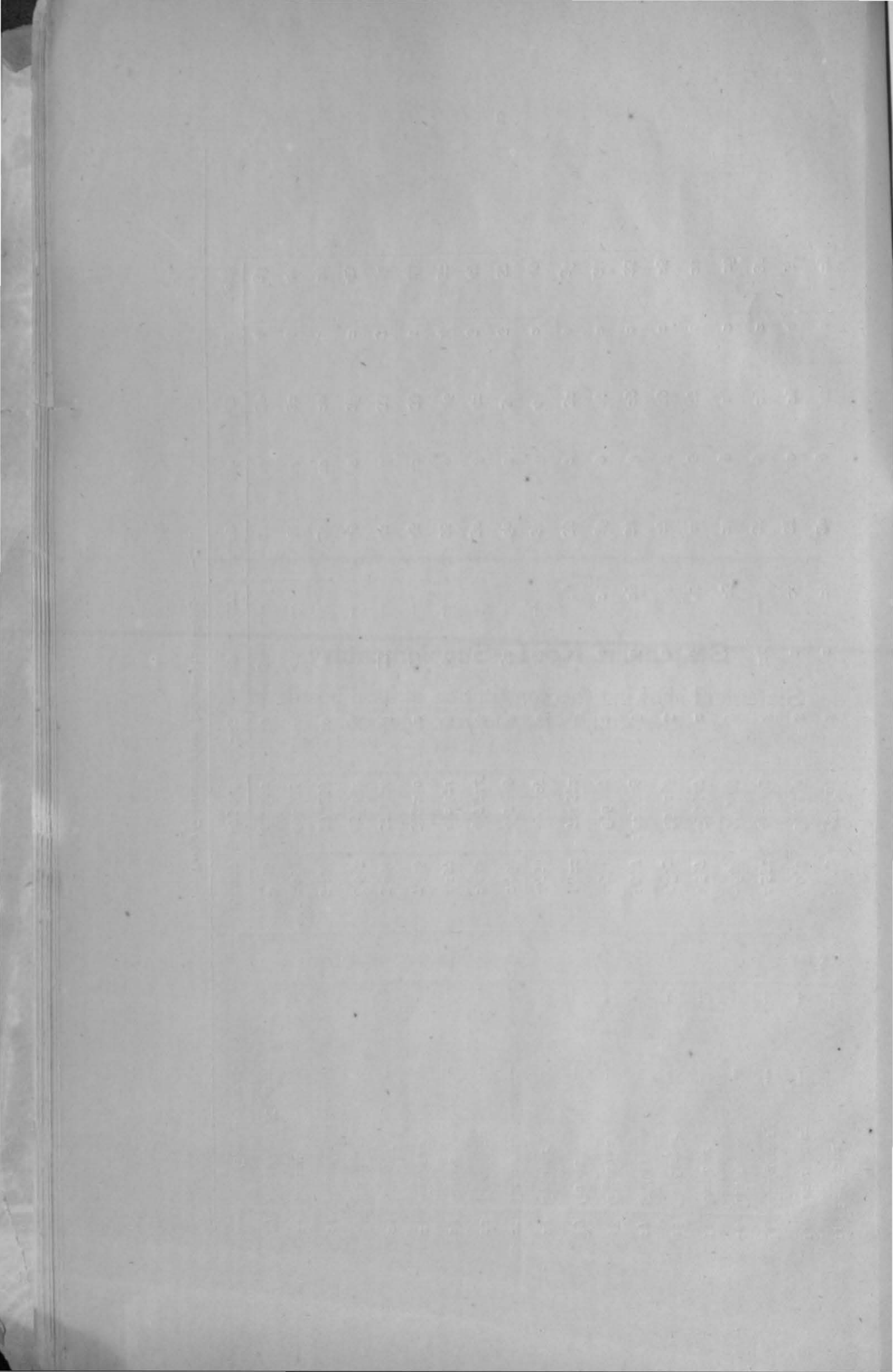
