

Proceedings of the Hon'ble the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab in the Revenue and Agricultural (General)

Department, No. 508 S. dated 25th July 1893.

READ-

The Report on the Lahore Central Museum for the year 1892-93 submitted with letter from Mr. J. L. Kipling, c. i. E., No. 71, dated the 3rd May 1893.

REMARKS.—It is not necessary to summarize the contents of Mr. Kipling's Report, which is, as usual, brief and to the point.

- 2. The expenditure amounted to Rs. 7,118 as compared with Rs. 3,319 in 1891-92. The figures for the present year include Rs. 2,634 for the purchase of a magic lantern, &c., in connection with a scheme for the delivery of courses of popular lectures, chiefly on scientific subjects, in the Victoria Jubilee Institute. These lectures were successfully inaugurated during the past spring, but they had no special connection with the Museum, and the cost of the lantern should not have been treated as part of the expenditure of that institution. A special grant of Rs. 1,060 was made for the purchase of iron safes for the custody of the valuable collection of coins purchased from Mr. C. Rodgers in 1891.
- 3. In passing orders on the last report submitted by Mr. Kipling, Sir Dennis Fitzpatrick wishes to express his sense of the valuable services rendered by that officer since he assumed the Curatorship in 1875. The excellent work which he accomplished as Principal of the School of Art will be more suitably acknowledged in dealing with the Educational Report.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of the foregoing remarks be forwarded to the Officiating Curator for information and communication to Mr. Kipling; that the Report with the remarks be forwarded to the Government of India in the Department of Revenue and Agriculture; and that both the Report and remarks be published in the Punjab Government Gazette.

I HAVE the honor to submit a brief report of the working of the Lahore Museum during the year 1892-93.

The total number of visitors to the Museum during the year was 190,851.

The numbers for last year were 227,099. There is therefore a decrease of 36,248. The average daily attendance last year was 622, but during this year it was only 522. The smallest number of visitors was on Sunday, the 25th September 1892, when only 61 visitors passed through the turnstile. The highest was on the 4th August 1892 (the great day of Moharrum), when 2,913 persons came.

The sickness of the year and the fact that no pilgrimages of any importance took place may perhaps account for the decrease.

An attempt was made on the night of the 16th March 1893 to rob the Museum by a thief, who entered the building from the roof and took a gilded plaster cast of an Australian gold nugget from its case. On discovering the nature of the plunder the thief appears to have dropped it and to have gone the way he came.

The conduct of the visitors to the Museum has been orderly as usual.

Additions.

No additions of any great importance were made to the Museum during the year under report.

It was hoped that before the close of the year the collections of the Museum would have been housed in the new building, which was to be inaugurated by a selected exhibition of Punjab arts and manufactures, but a combination of untoward circumstances prevented the realization of this programme.

The new building is now practically complete. Under the direction of Mr. F. H. Andrews the end wall of the Central Gallery has been decorated in colour as an indication of the treatment to be followed in the general decoration of the building. Designs, models, moulds and casts have been prepared for the enrichment in embossed plaster work of the doorways between each of the galleries, but have not hitherto been fixed. The surfaces of the Museum walls afford an excellent field for the practice of the decorative art, and it is hoped that a small annual allotment may be made in order that the students of the School of Art may continue the work. The painted decoration cost for materials the Mayo School of Art.

The Public Works Department has undertaken the erection, in the gallery to be devoted to Buddhist antiquities, of the nearly complete stupa discovered by Captain Deane at Sikri near Hoti Mardán and carefully put together by him. This will be fixed on a drum of brick work, so that the very interesting sculptured reliefs will be on a level with the eye. The coin safes specially made for the Museum by Messrs. Chubb and Son have been built into the walls of the apart-

Mr. C. J. Rodgers, whose services as numismatist to the Museum cannot be too warmly acknowledged, is now cataloguing the collection of coins recently purchased from him for Rs. 12,000.

The item in the accounts here rendered of Rs. 2,633-8-9 for a magic lantern demands a word of explanation. The magic lantern was indented for by Government direct and paid for by Government, and at the request of the Accountant-General it is put down among the Museum accounts. I may mention that the lantern has been successfully used in the Lecture Room of the Science Institute (part of the new Jubilee Museum building) at lectures which were numerously attended. The Lecture Hall was fitted with gallery, seats, rostrum and lantern stand under the direction of Mr. F. H. Andrews.

I was absent on special leave for four months of the year under report, when the duties of the Curator were fulfilled by Mr. F. H. Andrews.

During the year under report the Sale Room has continued to decline, the sales amounting to Rs. 2,193-6-9 only against Rs. 3,928 in the previous year. The causes of the decrease were noticed at length in last year's report.

A detailed statement of accounts and detailed lists of acquisitions to the Museum are appended.
