

I HAVE the honor to submit my report on the working of the Lahore Museum for the year 1897-98.

The total number of visitors to the Museum during the year under report was 232,353 and the average daily attendance.

Attendance.

There is a decrease of 33,840 in the number of visitors and of 93 in the average daily attendance, which may be accounted for partly by famine and partly by the plague in Sind and other places which reduced the number of pilgrims who pass through Lahore and pay a visit to the Museum.

The highest number was on 28th May 1897, the day following the Bhadar Kali Fair, when 2,318 visitors passed through the turnstile, and the smallest was on 2nd September 1897, when only 110 men came.

The conduct of the public was satisfactory, and there were no thefts or damage, wilful or accidental. Two or three cases of shoe-stealing occurred which were duly reported to the Police, and the culprits were punished.

Antiquities.—The Museum is greatly indebted to Major Deane, C. S. I.,
Political Officer, Dir and Swat, who presented it
with 20 small inscribed stones. These have been
deposited in the Museum along with others presented in previous years by the
same donor. The inscriptions on these stones have been deciphered by
Dr. M. A. Stein of the Punjab University. I have also to express my indebtedness
to Mr. J. P. Rawlins, District Superintendent of Police, Abbott-abad, for four
inscribed stones presented to the Museum. Of these, two were found as
follows:—

One found in a spring tank 3 miles from Abbott-abad.

One found at Dal Mohat on the Indus bank beyond Torbela in Abbott-abad.

Nothing has as yet been heard of the inscribed stone found at Shakkardara of which mention was made in the last report, except that in January last the Deputy Commissioner of Ráwalpindi asked the Curator's opinion about the archæological value of the stone, and he was informed that Rs. 10 over and above actual cost of procuring the stone would be a fair value.

Coins.—The Asiatic Societies of Bengal and Bombay very kindly contributed to the Museum a few old silver and mixed metal coins detailed in the accompanying statement. Also the Superintendent of the Madras Museum was good enough to present three Andhara leaden coins with Elephant and Ujjain symbol found in the Kristna District of the Madras Presidency.

Natural History.—There is not much to record under this head, except that Lady Rattigan very kindly presented us with a beautiful stuffed peacock.

Last winter a few prints were made from the negatives of the important stones and sold to Mr. Charles R. Lanman of

I am glad to report that the Public Works Department have repaired the roof of the building with the view to make it water-tight, and I hope it will be able to stand the heaviest shower of rain. The outer walls of the building which had half-burnt bricks in some places have been repaired, and proper cement pointing done to them.

Mr. F. H. Andrews, the Curator, proceeded on furlough for about 14 months on 3rd March 1898, after making over the charge of the Museum to me.

For this purpose a further grant of Rs. 2,000 was made in March last, and as the year was about to close the amount has been spent on the purchase of necessary material for new cases that are being made for the Sculpture gallery.

Institute. a few lectures were kindly delivered on Scientific subjects in this Hall by some of the Members of the Science Institute Committee during the last cold weather.

The sales effected during the year amount to Rs. 2,155, which is smaller by Rs. 611-10-1 than the previous year. The decrease is due to the prevalence of plague at Karáchi and Bombay which prevented travellers from visiting India.
