REPORT

ON THE

WORKING OF THE LAHORE MUSEUM

FOR THE YEAR 1909-10.

I took over charge of the Lahore Museum from Mr. B. Mouat Jones, M.A., on my return from sick leave on the 1st January 1910.

The total number of visitors during the year was 182,015 and the daily average 499 against 152,617 and 418 respectively in the previous year. This shows an increase of 29,398 in the total number and 81 in the daily average which is mainly due to the large gatherings in the months of December and January on account of Exhibition and public Conferences at Lahore.

The number of female visitors during 12 days in the year was 2,171 against 2,302 in the previous year. A comparative table of the last five years is as follows:—

This shows but a slight decrease of 131 in the female attendance from the last year.

The conduct of the public has been as usual good, the only incidents reported being some trifling breakages of panes of glasses which in all cases were accidental.

Additions.

Antiquities.

Sculptures.—The additions to this part of the Museum are not of great importance.

A valuable unique specimen of a carved shiva linga in stone was discovered at Jagatsukh in the Kullu Valley and presented by Mr. A. M. Longhurst, the Officiating Superintendent, Archæological Survey, Northern Circle.

Coins.—The most valuable addition to the Coin Cabinet of the Lahore Museum consisted of 40 rare gold and 77 silver coins of the Moghal Emperors selected by Mr. R. B. Whitehead from the collection of Bahawalpur State, at whose recommendations the Punjab Government sanctioned a special grant for Rs. 1,380-8-0 for their purchase.

Besides there has been considerable increase in the number of coins through the Treasure Trove Act, as shown in the statement given below: -

A note by Mr. R. B. Whitehead, B.A., I.C.S., on the working of the Treasure Trove Act as regards the acquisition of old coins in the Punjab during the year 1909-10 is herewith appended.

The preparation of a Supplementary Catalogue of the Coins added to the collection after they were catalogued by Mr. Rodgers is in the hands of Mr. R. B. Whitehead, which will no doubt prove a useful work in this connection.

The coin safe recently purchased from Messrs. Chubb & Sons has been built into the walls along-side of the other safes.

There has been no very important addition to this gallery during the Art and Manufactures present year. Section.

Dr. J. Ph. Vogel, the Archæological Superintendent, to whom the Museum is largely indebted, presented nine old Kangra pictures.

An old cannon found in the Ludhiana Fort has been mounted on a new

carriage and placed outside the Museum.

The portraits of the three Lieutenant-Governors-Sir Henry Durand, Sir Henry Davies and Sir Robert Egerton-reproduced by Mr. Craddock, and two portraits of Sir Charles Rivaz and Sir Denzil Ibbetson obtained from Messrs. Bourne and Shepherd have been shown in the picture gallery. A reproduction in oil painting of a portrait of Sardar Mohammad Abdullah Khan of Isa Khel has been also made and hung up with a brief history of this celebrity. There being two only good portrait painters in the province the progress of reproducing these portraits has been very slow, especially as these two gentlemen are fully occupied with their official duties.

Raw Product Section.—There has been considerable improvement in this

section of the Museum during the year under report.

Mr. B. Mouat Jones, M.A., who held charge of this institution during my absence has classified scientifically, labelled and re-arranged the collection of minerals. minerals. Numerous specimens have been added to by purchase from England. This collection has thus been made most instructive, specially to students of mineralogy.

The Director of Agriculture, Mr. Renouf, kindly presented to the Museum after the close of the recent Exhibition held at Lahore, a complete collection of 25 types of the Punjab wheats together with their respective plants which have been arranged to the best advantage in a specially made case. This arrangement

should prove of educative value to agriculturists.

Also some herbarium specimens of the Punjab cotton plants with their corresponding cotton seeds together with other specimens such as rices, pulses, fibres, oils and oil seeds, etc., have been made over by the same Department for show in the Museum.

At my request Mr. Harkishen Lall kindly presented specimens of cotton from the initial stage to the finished cloth as it is worked at the Shahdara Cotton Spinning & Weaving Factory.

Mr. Hamilton, the Director of Industries and Land Records, has kindly procured for the Museum a complete collection of the Punjab wools which he himself classified, labelled and arranged in the Museum. He also obtained a few specimens of tea, botanical plants, maizes, etc., and a very good collection of intoxicating drugs with accessories through the Commissioner of Excise, Punjab.

The substances used in dyeing, the mineral drugs, the condiments and spices and the tanning materials have been locally purchased, labelled and

arranged in the new cases specially made for them.

The old specimens of gums and resins, which were considered to be quite good ones, have been arranged in the new cases. However, a few new specimens were obtained from the Reporter on Economic Products to the Government of India and added to this collection.

Specimens of indigo and indigo seeds and plants were also procured by writing to the several Deputy Commissioners in the Punjab and a case containing these specimens has been arranged in the Economic Section.

A very good and exhaustive collection of clays and colours used by potters in the Punjab has been received from the various Deputy Commissioners. have now been labelled and arranged in the show case.

The Conservator of Forests, Punjab, was good enough to depute Mr. Mayes, the Deputy Conservator of Forests, Lahore Division, to give his expert opinion as to the arrangement and classification of the specimens of woods in the Lahore Museum. He approved the method already adopted by Pandit Basant Ram, the Museum Darogha.

Natural History Section.—Mrs. Wathen has helped me in the work of labelling and arranging the specimens of birds in the Museum. Unfortunately the fine collection made forty years ago by the Marshall brothers had got into a poor condition. We have had to discard many specimens, but we have been able to collect many new ones, and now that we have a capable taxidermist, this section of the Museum should soon be one of the most interesting.

In the same section the Museum has been much indebted to Mr. J. J. Mullaly, for his kind presentation of a large collection of eggs he collected in India during his long service.

Sixteen cases of butterflies classified and labelled by Mrs. Robson were

purchased which made the collection more representative.

The work of supplying the Raw Product Section with suitable cases has progressed steadily during the year. Thirty-five new cases New fittings. have been constructed, in which are arranged all the exhibits of mineralogy, economic products and ornithology.

A new wall case has been also made in the end room, formerly occupied by the Art Sale Room, for display of the old Tibetan pictures hitherto lying in the

office cupboards and more are being put in hand for other antiquities.

The work of covering the roofs with corrugated sheet was completed some months ago, but the result has not been so satisfactory as was hoped by the authorities of the Public Works Depart-Building. The roofs and more particularly the gutters leaked very badly during the rains and damaged several delicate objects in the cases.

Their Excellencies Lord and Lady Minto, accompanied by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, honoured the Museum with a visit in Distinguished visitors. April, and in the course of the year many distinguished

travellers have examined different sections with great interest.

Two similar sets of photographs of the Buddhist sculptures in the Lahore Museum as supplied last year to Mr. Macdonell, of the Photographs. Oxford University, were furnished to the Punjab Government.

I have been recently requested to show some representations objects of the archæological interest at the Archæological Exhibition to be held in Arrangements are being made to send a few casts of the best Græco-Bactrian sculptures we have in the Museum collection.

Mr. Vincent Smith and Mr. Coomaraswamy have both asked me for photographs of some of the Kangra pictures for their forthcoming works on Indian Art.

Art Sale Room.

Under the orders of the Punjab Government the Art
Sale Room of the Lahore Museum is to be closed.

Arrangements are now being made to dispose of the articles in hand on reduced prices, but it will be absolutely necessary to sell the unsaleable articles by public auction. The sales effected during the year amount to Rs. 216-8-6 against Rs. 587-11-0 in the last year. This falling off justifies the closure of the Art Sale Room; the space will thus be gained for the accommodation of the valuable sculptures and other antiquities. The room is being already furnished with new glass-cases.

The expenditure amounted to Rs. 14,918-3-8 as compared with Rs. 11,269-5-5 in 1908-09. The figures for the present year include a special grant of Rs. 4,000 for the new fittings and reproduction of portraits of the Punjab celebrities and Rs. 1,380-8-0 for the purchase of Mughal coins from the Bahawalpur State.

The miscellaneous receipts by the sale of Coin Catalogues, Guide Books and surplus coins come to Rs. 134-9-0 plus Rs. 180 as contribution from the Lahore Municipality.

The Museum is fortunate in its staff and is especially indebted to the Darogha, Pandit Basant Ram. His knowledge and his memory are invaluable.

The usual statements of accounts and lists of additions to the Museum are herewith appended. The report of the Government Numismatist referred to under the heading "Coins" is also attached.

REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE TREASURE TROVE ACT AS REGARDS THE ACQUISITION OF OLD COINS IN THE PUNJAB FOR THE YEAR 1909-10.

1. During the year only seven finds were reported. In the Firozpur District an earthen pot was discovered which contained some hundreds of the small billon coins of the Pathán Sultáns of Delhi, but on examination these were found to be of the most ordinary varieties in bad condition, and all were returned. Out of the four finds it was recommended that coins should be acquired and distributed as shown below:—

- 2. Out of the 202 coins acquired, 185 were obtained from a single find of 223 Mughal rupees, mostly in beautiful condition, unearthed in the Lahore District. So apart from this find, the results of the year under report are little better than those of the year 1908-09, which was almost barren of finds, and are disappointing.
- 3. As already explained the only important find was one of 223 Mughal rupees discovered in the Sharakpur Tahsil, Lahore District. They covered the reigns of the emperors from Aurangzeb to Muhammad Shah.
