

I AM directed by the Governor of the Punjab to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 658/I-1, dated the 5th of June, 1939, forwarding therewith the report on the working of the Central Museum, Labore. for the year ending 31st March, 1939, and to convey the following observations thereon :-

During the year 1937-38 the number of visitors to the Museum rose by 4 per cent to 289,457, Visitore but the year under review records a fall of 6 per cent by 17,790 to 271,667. The average daily attendance has also, in consequence, shown a fall of 72 from 827 to 755. The large decrease in attendance is rather disquieting and cannot adequately be explained away by the mere statement that "it might be due to the fact that in the previous year there were a number of conferences and other events of public importance". There is an almost negligible increase of 2 lady visitors on the Purdah Day from 6,516 to 6,518. The student visitors show a rise of 20 per cent from 728 to 877, which is a distinct improvement. The Museum was visited by five distinguished Indian and foreign visitors.

Out of 14 lectures arranged for 5 months, November to

March, 1939, only 9 could be delivered at the appointed time. Four of the lecturers selected were ladies. Only 5 out of the 14 subjects selected for public lectures could be considered suitable for Museum lectures and it would appear that the Lecture Committee ignored the suggestion made in the last two years'

review that it should make arrangements for a much larger number of special lectures on ancient Indian Art, architecture, sculpture, numismatics, etc., and also on archaeological excavations in different parts of India so that larger audiences might be attracted to listen to these special talks. Excursions could also be arranged to places of historical and archæological interest. Thirty-six sets of slides (3 more than last year) were supplied to 20 borrowers (2 less than last year) and eight new sets of slides were added to the existing stock. Here again it seems that this activity of the useum has not yet received adequate publicity among mofussil institutions.

The Sixteenth Annual Exhibition of the Punjab Fine Art

Society was held in the new picture
gallery for a fortnight from the 20th of
February to the 6th of March, the average daily number of
visitors being 43 and the total number of pictures exhibited
being 334.

Only minor repairs were effected to the main Museum building, which otherwise remained in a fairly good state of preservation. A few hooks were added to the Museum library.

The gross expenditure to Government on the maintenance of the Museum fell by Rs. 5,310 from Rs. 30,780 to Rs. 25,470, owing to the fact that the post of the Officer on Special Duty was retained for only 2 months of the year under review. The total income credited to Government decreased by Rs. 767 to Rs. 7,751; the sale-proceeds of admission tickets contributing Rs. 7,274, or almost 94 per cent of the total income under this head.

As in the previous year a large number of valuable antiquities, rare coins, archæological relics, paintings and manuscripts and manufactured objects, such as metal ware, textiles, etc., were acquired for the Museum by purchase or by free gift. The thanks of the Punjab Government are due to the Governments of the Central Provinces and of the United Provinces for presenting 85 silver and 2 billon coins; to Dr. Maclagan Gorrie for 5 embroidered pieces and also to Messrs, Krishna Bahadur and Bhakta Bahadur for 12 valuable antiquities. Three hundred and thirty-one ferns presented by the Church Missionary Society were transferred to the Botany Department

of the University of the Punjab and 16 photographs of the Lieutenant-Governors and Governors of the Punjab and 32 photographs of the Viceroys of India to the Record Office

I was in charge of the Central Museum, Lahore, throughout the year under review.

- 1. A meeting of the Museum Development Committee was held on the 27th March, 1939, at which the following points were discussed:—
 - (1) Fittings for the New Picture Gallery.
- (2) Reorganisation of the Museum and bringing it into contact with the educational activities of the Punjab University.
 - (3) Acquisition of antiquities by Museum officials.
 - (4) Resolutions passed by the Museums Conference held at New Delhi in 1937.

Out of these, it was resolved to appoint a Committee to work out the details of the scheme of furnishing and fitting up the New Picture Gallery. The Committee also asked the Curator to prepare a statement as to how far the resolutions passed at the Museums Conference could be carried out by the Lahore Museum.

2. The number of visitors totalled during the year visitors.

271,667 as compared with 289,457 of last year, the daily average attendance being 755 as against 827 of the previous year. The decrease might be due to the fact that in the previous year there were a number of conferences and other events of public importance at Lahore. The following are the figures for the last five years:—

Previous to August, 1938, the 15th of every month was observed as a Cleaning Day and therefore the Museum remained closed to the public. But since this arrangement has been discontinued by the Punjab Government (endorsement No. 15313-G., dated 20th July, 1938) the cleaning is now done every Wednesday and the public are also admitted on payment of usual entrance fee. Hence the Museum remained closed for the public only for 5 days including the 25th of December, because it was Christmas Day. Sunday, the 15th January, 1939, recorded the highest attendance when 5,084 persons passed through the turnstile.

3. The first Monday of every month was observed as usual as a Zenana Day for the ladies who have not yet discarded Burqa. The total number of lady visitors during the year was practically the same as in the previous year showing an increase of only two extra visitors, i.e., 6,518. Out of fourteen lectures thus arranged, thirteen were delivered though only nine were delivered at the appointed hour and date and one had to be unavoidably cancelled. The dates of the lectures of Prof. A. N. Bali and Dr. Raghuvira had to be shifted, because on the appointed day of the former's lecture, Mahatama Hans

Raj breathed his last to the great sorrow of every one. Since Mrs. Suri was unable to lecture, the Curator took her place and spoke on " Some unique Indian sculptures". illustrating his talk by the unique specimens now exhibited a the Museum. Mr. S. N. Gupta's lecture on "The Lahore Museum" traced the history of this institution from its inception to the present day and his personal reminiscences were very illuminating. Dr. Raghuvira and Mrs. I. Durga Parshad changed the titles of their subjects. The thanks of the Lantern Lecture Committee are due once again to the Punjab Adisory Board for Books for kindly placing at their disposal the services of Mr. Satya Vrata who as usual projected two educational films with a running commentary, as well as for those other lecturers who kindly co-operated to make this scheme a success. The Committee likes to thank specially those lady lecturers whose talks were very popular and attracted a huge andience.

The average attendance per lecture was 171 as compared with 157 of the previous year. Thirty-six sets of slides were loaned to twenty borrowers and eight new sets were added to the stock. The figures for the last three years are as follow:—

The Annual Report of the Numismatist to the Government of the Punjab for Hindu and Budhist coins (the Curator) is as follows:—

"No find was reported to me during the year under review.

The seven gold coins, mention of which was made in the report for the year 193.38, have been acquired for the Museum during the current year." The Annual Report by the Numismatist for Muslim coins to the Punjab Government, Khan Bahadur Maulvi Zafar Hasan, Superintendent, Archæological Survey of India, Northern Circle, Agra, is as follows:—

"No find of Treasure Trove coins in the Province of the Punjab was reported to me during the year under report, and in view of my experience of the last 13 years as Honorary Numismatist to the Punjab Government for Muslim coins this has been very remarkable.

The 30 coins discovered in the village of Jundla, Tahsil and District Karnal, and mentioned in the last year's report, were disposed of during the year under review."

- 11. A number of interesting Nepalese objects were acquired like a Tanka (Temple Banner) depicting the Wheel of Life and a casket. The thanks of the Punjab Government are due to Dr. Maclagan Gorrie for presenting five embroidered pieces and also to Messrs. Krishna Bahadur and Bhakta Bahadur for presenting the Museum with twelve objects detailed in Appendix "B".
- 12. An interesting old palm leaf Nepalese manuscript (Plate I) of 50 leaves illuminated with eight miniatures of Mabayanist deities was scriptspurchased. One modern and six antique paintings were acquired, the former by K. M. Dhar depicting "Charm of the Flute". Among the six antique paintings as very important may be mentioned an "Elephant Fight " (Plate II), "Ladies playing Pachisi to the accompaniment of music " (Plate III) and " A love scene" (Plate IV) all these being Moghal. As an example of the Hindu Qalam particularly so of Guler may be cited a water colour depicting one of the Rajas amusing himself in a swing with a lady companion (Plate V). The thanks of the Museum are due to Khan Bahadur Mian Afzal Hussain, Vice-Chancellor of the Punjab University, for his having kindly persuaded Khan Sahib Ali Abmad Khan of Batala to present us with a painting of Dost Mohammad Khan of hud was reported to one during the Kabul.
- 13. Being requested by the Botany Department of the University of the Punjab, the Museum transferred to the said body the 331 ferns presented to it by the Church Missionary Society in the year 1926, with the permission

of the Local Government (endorsement No. 14680-G., dated the 11th July, 1938). Similarly sixteen photographs of Governors and Lieutenant-Governors of this Province and thirty-two photographs of Viceroys of India were transferred to the Punjab Record Office with the permission of the Local Government (memorandum No. 270-G., dated the 4th January, 1939).

- 15. The building was in a fairly good state of preservation during the year and needed only minor repairs.
- 16. The services of Dr. C. L. Fabri as Officer on the Special Duty were terminated on the 27th of May, 1938. The Curator took Work done in Museum. up the arrangement of the Gandhara Gallery which he had left in confusion and completed the re-arrangement in a strictly chronological order but with a similar background of coloured cloth, Lala Jagdish Narain rendering valuable assistance in the said arrangements and proper display, in addition to his other duties. Descriptive labels have been written not only in English but renderings of the same have been made and put side by side in three other vernaculars, namely, Urdu, Hindi and Gurumukhi. The work of labelling remains to be completed and so also the work of re-arrangement in the few show cases attempted by Dr. Fabri, as the exhibits here are arranged without any raison d'etre. White ants were traced in a few show cases of the Forest and Applied Arts-Crafts Galleries and on examination it was discovered that they were imported and had affected nine show cases. Therefore, these were dismantled and re-erected, after being treated with Ascu and other insecticide wood preservatives so as to prevent future Sale-proceed a of " Catalogue of Coine" a s . egamab

The re-organisation of the Forest Gallery taken in haby that Department last year was completed in 1938 a is now a great centre of popular attraction.

- Photographs, Guides of paintings and four catalogue of coi and Surplus Coins. were sold to the public. Six copies slides list were issued gratis and three sold. Nit copies of the Buddha Story in Stone in English were sold against fifty-five of the previous year, the fall in the sabeing due to the fact that having run out of stock they ha to be reprinted. Twelve copies of the same work in Urd were also sold. Fifty-five surplus and duplicat coins were sold, one being of gold. Forty-four sets o picture postcards were sold and five presented to distinguished visitors.




