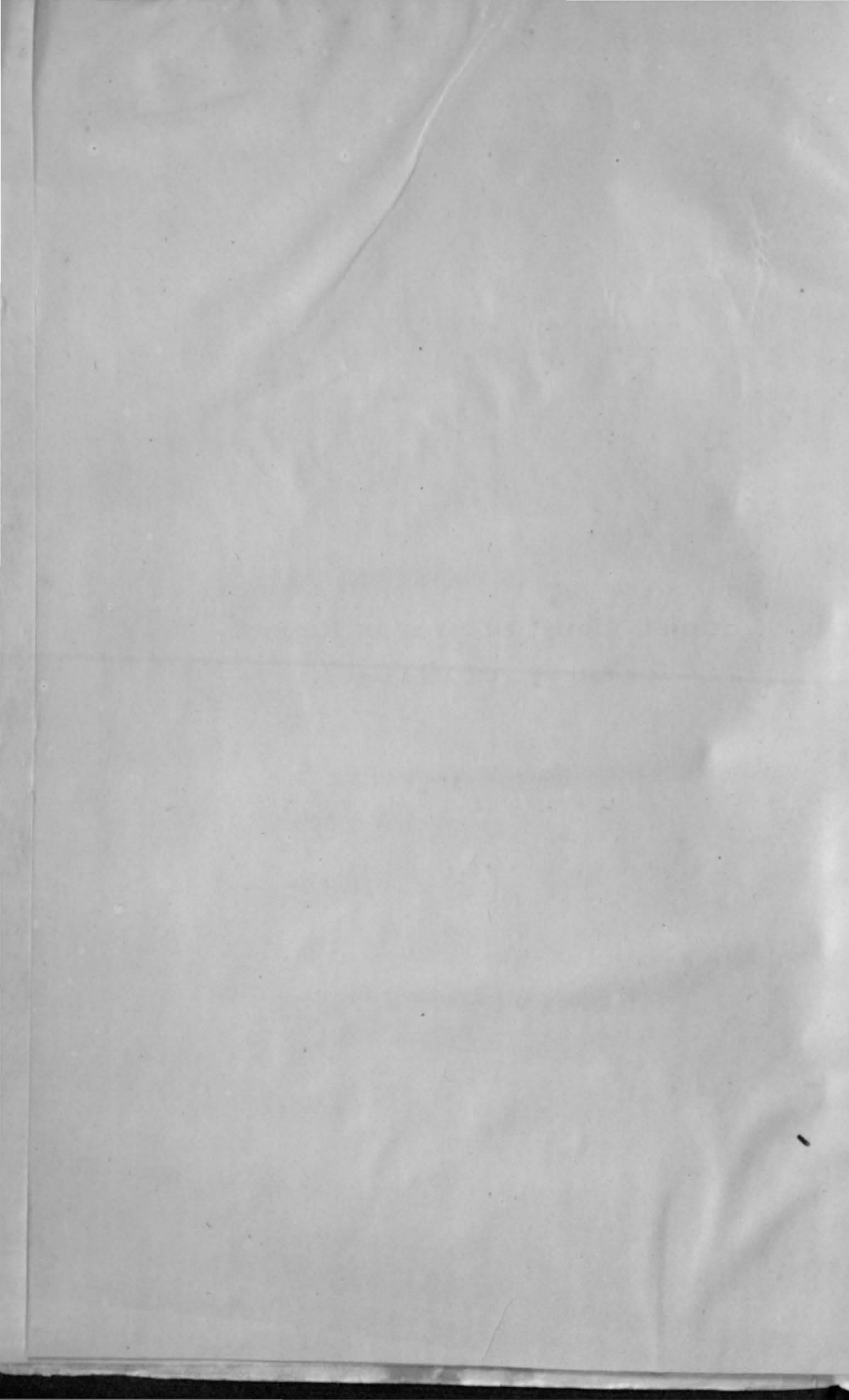

Revenue and Agriculture.

General.

SIR,

I AM directed to submit, for the information of the Government of India, a copy of the report on the administration of the estates under the Court of Wards in the Punjab for the year ending 30th September 1917.

2. The number of estates under the superintendence of the Court of Wards at the end of the year was 41, representing an area of 335,931 acres of land, *jagirs* of the value of Rs. 3,24,445 and gross assets of more than 262 lakhs. The success with which these estates are administered is shown by the fact that though many of them were encumbered by debt when management was assumed, there is now only one, the Atari estate in Amritsar, in which assets do not show a substantial excess over liabilities. It is gratifying to find that during the year a sum of nearly 5½ lakhs of rupees, or more than a quarter of the total annual income, was invested in the Indian war loan. The estate of the Nawab of Mamdot, much the largest under the Court of Wards, led the way with an investment of 2 lakhs, while the Kot estate subscribes one lakh.

3. During the year three estates were released after a successful term of superintendence. The most important of these was the Sidhowal estate in Karnal, which in seven years was freed from a debt of nearly a lakh and placed in a sound financial position. The result is the more gratifying as the owner himself acted as manager throughout, and should therefore be in a position to administer his property independently on sound lines. The Lieutenant-Governor hopes that wherever possible wards will be given a share in the management of their estates, as possible loss of income is more than counterbalanced by the educative value of the experience to the ward and the advantage of bringing him into direct contact with his tenants.

4. In reviewing last year's report His Honour had occasion to comment on the evil practice of leasing land to middlemen, and it is now evident that this system has had most unfortunate results in the case of the Sher Shah estate, where the arrears of rent amount to one-third of the provincial total. It is, however, understood that the practice has now been discontinued almost everywhere, and every effort should be made to reduce the arrears for which it is responsible.

5. Owing to the large investments in the war loan, only a comparatively small sum could be devoted to the purchase of land. Expenditure on what is called "permanent improvements" was also lower than usual, but His Honour is glad to notice that in the case of Mamdot a substantial amount was devoted to improving the amenities of the two towns on the estate. The increasing attention given to the experimental farms on this and other large,

estates is also a matter for satisfaction, as by means of these the Court of Wards can set an example of enterprising and economical management to the large lardowners of the Province generally. The fact that two wards are going through the vernacular course at Lyallpur is a good omen for the future, and the Lieutenant-Governor hopes that the new buildings for the accommodation of youths of this position will attract many more wards to the Agricultural College for a longer period of training. A couple of years at Lyallpur cannot fail to be of immense value to a youth who will ultimately have to manage a large estate.

6. The report by the Principal of the Aitchison Chiefs' College on the progress of the wards who are receiving their education at that institution has been received and read with interest by His Honour. It generally confirms Mr. Maynard's view that there has been a real improvement in boys of this class within the last generation, a view which Sir Michael O'Dwyer, who is personally acquainted with many of the wards, fully shares. He has little doubt that the spirit shown by the young Sardar of Kot Fateh Khan, who has subscribed liberally to war charities and has taken an active interest in recruitment among his tenants, is shared by many of his contemporaries, and that as a class the wards realize their debt to Government. Government in its turn fully recognizes its responsibility for the careful education of these youths, many of whom are destined to be the natural leaders of the Punjab peasantry. The charge of the young wards during their school holidays is a most important matter, as it is then that dependants and unscrupulous relatives endeavour to acquire an undesirable influence over them. The Lieutenant-Governor trusts that the Financial Commissioner will give the matter special attention. At the present time those who are not of immature age should be encouraged to follow the example of the Kot Sirdar by stimulating recruitment in their estates. The recent orders of Government as to the grant of King's Commissions open up a new and honourable career for the landed gentry who show themselves able and willing to fulfil the prescribed conditions, and one of the qualifications for the selection of cadets is active assistance in recruiting during the present war.

For the year ending 30th September 1917.

1. The year opened with 42 estates under the Court of Wards. Three ^{Estates under management and those released and taken over.} of them were released and two new estates (one being released after the close of the year) with a portion of a third were taken over during the year. Thus the total number of estates at the end held by the Court of Wards under its superintendence amounted to 41 which represent 335,061 acres of land held in proprietary-rights, jagir of the value of Rs. 3,24,445 and gross assets of over 262 lakhs. There are four more estates held by the Deputy Commissioners under Act VIII of 1890 (Guardian and Wards Act).

The most important estate released this year was that of Sidhowal in the district of Karnal. The superintendence of this estate was at the owner's own desire assumed in 1911 and it was then encumbered with a debt of Rs. 93,896. In the course of the 7 years not only was the whole of this debt paid off but an expenditure of Rs. 67,830 was also incurred on permanent improvements and there was a rise of over ten thousand in the gross assets. The owner who himself acted as the manager throughout expressed a desire to take back his estate and he having been considered fit to manage it unfettered, the estate was released on 25th May 1917.

The other two estates released this year were small estates of Alawalpur in the Jullundur and Ladhran in the Ludhiana district. The first of them was taken over in 1898 and the second in 1909 and a debt of Rs. 3,315 and Rs. 1,016, respectively, was discharged during their management by the Court.

Of the two new estates the first was the estate of Ram Das of Gujran-wala. It was taken over on 10th November 1916. The assets which consisted of only 3 mortgaged houses and a jagir of Rs. 15,703 a year were less than the total liabilities amounting to nearly one lakh. Its charge was assumed under section 5 (2) (d) of the Act owing to the political importance of the family but was released on 31st March 1918, as the ward had died.

The second estate to be taken over was that of S. Kesri Singh, son of Raja Harbans Singh of Lahore. Its charge was assumed on 11th December 1916, as the Sardar had entered upon a course of wasteful extravagance likely to dissipate his property. The ordinary income is a little less than Rs. 24,000 a year and the total liabilities of Rs. 5,836 admitted up to the close of the year have all been discharged. Three more claims (1) for Rs. 14,735, (2) for Rs. 13,970, and (3) for Rs. 4,900 were notified to the Court of Wards by the creditors. The third was rejected by the Deputy Commissioner and the first two are being dealt with by the Criminal Investigation Department as evidence was forthcoming that the pro-notes supporting those claims were forged documents.

2. The chief form of the investment was naturally the Indian war loans ^{Assets and investments.} in which not less than Rs. 5,22,673 were invested by the several estates of which Rs. 1,24,250, partly paid off since, were borrowed from the Bank of Bengal. Mamdot with an

investment of Rs. 2,00,000 headed the list, Kot Fateh Khan coming next with Rs. 1,10,000. The investment in the purchase of land amounted to Rs. 16,210, the chief purchasers being the rich estates of Kartarpur and Mamdot. The value of house property purchased was Rs. 19,860 of which Rs. 18,000 were spent by the Kot Fateh Khan estate on the acquisition of Oswald House at Murree for the purpose of permanent residence of the ward during the hot weather. On the other side of the account an old and useless house at Amritsar, belonging to the Rani Chhaunian estate, was sold for Rs. 4,500. Some of the estates made contributions to "Our Day" and other charitable war funds but no details are yet available.

3. The statements do not show any loan due to Government. But a loan of Rs. 1,37,000 was, on 19th February 1918, sanctioned by Government on the security of the jagir and landed property for the liquidation of heavy debts of the Atari Estate. The loan payable to other estates and persons amounts to Rs. 2,05,370 and Rs. 5,47,985, respectively, and is larger than in the preceding year. The increase under the first head is due to the correction of a mistake in last year's report when a sum of Rs. 54,500 payable by the estate of Raipur to the estate of Manauli was shown as payable to other persons. The rise under the second head is mainly the result of advances taken from the Bank of Bengal for investment in the war loans. The largest net reduction in debt was effected in the estate of Shah Jiwana (Jhang). The other estates to reduce the debt by significant sums were Guler (Kangra), Kishen Kot (Gurdaspur), Ahmadabad (Jhelum), Sher Shah and Makhdum Hassan Bakhsh (Multan). Kotaha (Ambala) is reported as having paid off a debt of Rs. 22,000, but no account of the debts is kept in this province as the estate is mainly situated in the United Provinces and their total amount is not known.

4. Recoverable rent in arrears amounts to Rs. 1,54,021 and Sher Shah (Multan) with a sum of Rs. 52,634 heads the list. This unfortunate state of affairs is the result of the land being formerly let out to middlemen. Many of the debtors in Sher Shah have applied to be declared insolvent and a good deal of the money in this, as well as in some other estates, is not likely to be recovered at all and will have to be written off. Mostly the dealings are now direct with tenants and middlemen are only employed in a portion of Rani Chhaunian Estate.

5. Altogether a sum of Rs. 1,42,201 was spent on permanent improvements. A good deal of the money spent in Mamdot, however, which heads the list was expended on the improvement of roads, construction of a bridge, pavement of streets and other amenities of the towns of Jalalabad and Mamdot. The expenditure under this head in the case of Sidhowal, Rani Chhaunian and Kot Fateh Khan represents the money spent in providing residential quarters for the wards and was not a productive improvement in the proper sense of the term. In the case of Luddan, however, the greater portion of the expenditure was incurred on the construction of wells and on a useful diversion in the Ghulamwah.

The arboriculture both at Mamdot and Guru Har Sahai showed an improvement and a tube well is under construction in each of these estates.

6. Some of the estates have started agricultural and cattle or sheep farms. The stud at Jalalabad was visited by the Superintendent, Army Remount Department, who recommended the stoppage of mule-breeding altogether and a reduction in the number of horse-breeding mares. In the case of the cow farm the Superintendent, Civil Veterinary Department, suggested the substitution of the Hissar for the Dhani breed. Most of these recommendations have been already carried out and there is a hope of better prospects for the future. The sheep farms at Mamdot, Luddan and Salarwahan are doing well and some Merino rams have been introduced at all these three places.

The agricultural farm at Jalalabad lies in a low place and is liable to flooding. It is proposed to move it, as well as the stud, to a better and more suitable place at Chak Hiraj. The farms at Luddan and Guru Har Sahai are doing well. The Raja and Meston ploughs and the horse hoe are being used in the farm at Luddan and have so far proved successful and the farm has been extended by 10 acres and about 23 acres are at present under wheat cultivation. The Australian bajra grown in the farm at Guru Har Sahai was a novelty for the people who bought it at the rate of annas 4 per ear. The Japan *sarson* was very useful for fodder purposes and was cut three times. The use of Raja and Hero spring ploughs showed an increase in the produce at Guru Har Sahai.

The stud at Kot Fateh Khan continued to be a success. The poultry farm has not yet been successful. Too many breeds were attempted and it is hoped if the enterprise is confined to one species of black hens as advised by the expert opinion, success will result.

Two wards and two employees of the Court of Wards estates are going through the vernacular course at Lyallpur. The Financial Commissioner hopes within a short time to arrange for men with agricultural qualifications to be placed in charge of all the more important agricultural estates and the farms at Jalalabad and Luddan are already supervised by men possessing these qualifications.

7. The leniency of the assessment, as compared with the income from the agricultural land, is indicated by the special statement attached. The proportion of the income from land which is taken in land revenue and cesses after the deductions mentioned in last year's report exceeds one-half only in 2 estates, *viz.*, Lambagraon and Dulla. In the first instance the amount of Government demand was only Rs. 12 and in the second case the proportion was high, as the suspended demand of the last year had to be paid this year and a part of the income was not credited till after the close of the year. In the estate of Kartarpur the proportion this year is 32.6 against 48.7 last year. This is due to a rise in the rent rates to which some of the tenants have amicably consented.

Comparison of income and revenue demand.

8. The importance of the education of the wards and their training in the management of their own estates continued to receive attention.

Education.

At present 21 wards with 7 of their male relatives are under instruction in the Aitchison Chiefs' College and a report by the Principal as to their conduct and progress in education has been received and will be communicated confidentially for the information of Government. One male ward and a relative of one more are reading in the preparatory school for boys attached to the Queen Mary's College, Lahore, and two female relatives of the wards are in that college. Four wards are receiving their education in other institutions. No special arrangements for the supervision of wards during the holidays exist and the majority of the district reports have omitted to discuss this point. In a few cases special tutors were appointed for the holidays but in most cases the wards seem to have been left to themselves. The attention of the Deputy Commissioners concerned will again be drawn to the importance of this matter. Generally speaking, the wards at the Aitchison College have a frank, pleasant manner, confident without being forward, with the brightness and cheerfulness natural to boys who are living a happy and wholesome life. They are generally good at conversational English, but in many cases study is not the strong point. As might be expected, weakness of character shows itself in some instances. Looking back over 30 years, the Financial Commissioner sees an improvement in boys of this class. Muhammad Nawaz Khan of Kot Fateh Khan, Autar Singh of Chahal, Ghulam Qasim Shah of Sher Shah, Gurbakhsh Singh of Sohana, Muhammad Hayat Khan of Sahiwal, Mubarik Ali Shah of Shah Jiwana and Iika Udho Singh of Raipur are all quite promising.

A definite and responsible share in the management of their estates was given to S. Samboo Singh of Manauli, to Sardar Ajmer Singh of Ramgarh, to M. Parkash Chand, the eldest son of the ward of Lambagraon, to Tika Baldeo Singh of Guler, to Bahadar Singh of Butala and to Sultan Khan of Mangwal. It is hoped that they will justify their appointment and some of them are already reported doing well. The Commissioner reports not having received any orders about the proposed appointment of the Nawab of Mamdot in the Army Remount Department and the Financial Commissioner will make enquiries from the Director.

Sardar Muhammad Nawaz Khan of Kot Fateh Khan showed great interest in the war. He subscribes Rs. 100 per mensem to war charities and has been generous with donations. He has personally interested himself in recruiting and some 350 men from the villages of his estate joined the Army up to 30th September 1917. He has shown much eagerness to be permitted to join the Army in person and the time for this will no doubt come; but at present it is desirable that nothing should be done to interfere with the completion of the Sardars' education. The Deputy Commissioner and the Commissioner both acknowledge the good service rendered by Khan Sahib Sher Khan, the Manager of this estate.

The new buildings for the accommodation at the Agricultural College, Lyallpur, of wards and other youths of similar position, are now well advanced; and the Financial Commissioner hopes that it will soon be possible to complete the education of some of them with an agricultural course of a more complete kind than the vernacular course lasting six months only.

9. The accounts of 31 estates were audited during this year. The Commissioner went through the Mamdot accounts personally and prescribed a new system which it is hoped will obviate objections in future.
