**Review of the Annual Report on the Administration of the estates
under the Court of Wards in the Punjab for the year ending
the 30th September, 1940.**

THERE were 60 estates under the superintendence of the Court of Wards during the year under review, with an area of 580,000 acres. Eight estates were released and three new ones taken under superintendence. Of the released estates five were prosperous and the remaining three were released to enable them to secure the advantage of the new debt legislation. From the indebted estates the sum of Rs. 2.92 lakhs was repaid to creditors.

The total cultivated area of the estates which remained under superintendence during the two years (1938-39 and 1939-40) was 170,000 acres. The average income per acre (less land revenue) amounted to Rs. 6-1-5 compared with Rs. 4-10-2 the year before, and the total income of the estates was Rs. 18.35 lakhs compared with 14.86 the year before.

The most important duty of the Court of Wards is education and Government note with pleasure that each year more boys and girls go to school and college from the families of the wards. The next most important duties of the Court of Wards, as of every right-minded landlord, are the development of the estates and the promotion of the welfare of the tenants and dependents who live on them. To achieve these objects good management is required, and Government are pleased to see that this too is receiving increasing attention, and that although the income of the estates and the standard of management have risen, the cost of management has fallen. There is still no room for complacency, however. Too few of the managers have a real knowledge of rural reconstruction, which must be the basis of all estate management and the office of manager is still regarded as a favour to be conferred upon a worthy old servant of Government after superannuation. Estate management and estate development are tasks for men in the prime of life, who have been thoroughly trained in rural work of all kinds, and Government are glad to see that such men are being selected in increasing numbers for the managements of estates of the Court of Wards.

Soil conservation work, the consolidation of holdings and the use of improved seeds and implements are spreading, and the sowing of cotton in lines has been introduced in 24 estates. More attention is being paid to animal husbandry. Stud Bulls are now maintained by 27 estates compared with seven the year before, and ten (against one) estates keep selected stud-rams and he-goats.

The sinking, repairing, cleaning and boring of irrigation wells, the repairing of persian wheels and the construction and repairing of watercourses were also carried out by more estates this year. Wells used for the supply of drinking water were improved in 29 estates. Garden are now maintained by 13 (against 9) estates. Fruit, flower and vegetable growing have increased.

A good deal of money has been spent on the improvement of buildings and roads, and liberal contributions have been made to various local and provincial charities and good causes, particularly to war funds. Nearly five lakhs of rupees have been invested in Defence Bonds. In many estates, however, the budget item of social ceremonies still absorbs more money than those of both development and charities put together.

The commendation given by the Deputy Commissioners to the managers and the officers in charge of estates is well deserved and Government endorse it with the hope that their example will be followed by others.

For the year ending the 30th September, 1940.

Estates under management.—During the year under report 3 estates were taken under superintendence and 8 were released. The total number under management is now 60 (against 65) comprising an area of 580,454 acres (against 616,578 acres).

2. *Estates taken under superintendence.*—The three new estates are :—

(1) Tibbi Lal Beg estate of Pirs Ghulam Ali, Ali Gauhar and Allah Yar, minor sons of Pir Gulab Ali Chishti of Tibbi Lal Beg, tahsil Pakpattan, district Montgomery. It has been taken over, as the wards being minors are unable to manage their affairs. The estate comprises an area of 7,167 acres. Its total assets are valued at Rs. 8,55,252, and the ordinary annual income and expenditure are estimated to be Rs. 54,350 and Rs. 23,976, respectively with debts amounting to Rs. 15,000.

(2) Bedi estate of Baba Kartar Singh Bedi and Bibi Mohindar Kaur Bedi of Montgomery. It has been taken over as the wards are unable to manage their affairs, the former on account of his old age and the latter being a female. The estate comprises an area of 4,431 acres with assets valued at Rs. 11,15,570. The ordinary annual income and expenditure are estimated to be Rs. 53,557 and Rs. 28,146, respectively with debts amounting to Rs. 5,16,300. As it was taken over only about three months before the close of the year the statements have been shown as blank.

(3) Bhagvi estate of the late Sardar Mohammad Akbar Khan Khattar of Bahtar, tahsil Fatehjang, district Attock. It has been taken over as the wards are unable to manage their affairs on account of their infirmity and being females. The estate comprises an area of 3,597 acres with assets valued at Rs. 4,16,839. The annual income and expenditure are estimated to be Rs. 10,090 and Rs. 9,282, respectively, with debts roughly amounting to about Rs. 3,000. As it was taken over only one month before the close of the year the statements have been shown as blank.

3. *Estates released from superintendence.*—The released eight estates are :—

(1) Jalalpur Pirwala estate of S. Ghulam Abbas and Dewan Mohammad Ghauns, sons of the late Dewan Sultan Ahmad, caste Sayyid, in the Multan district. The property of the former was taken over in 1919. Being a minor, he could not manage his affairs. His debt of Rs. 9,983 was liquidated by the year 1922. The property of the latter was taken over in 1927 at his request as he expressed his inability to manage his affairs and control his debts amounting to about Rs. 35,000 which were liquidated by the year 1939. The estate was released as

S. Ghulam Abbas was found to be quite fit for managing his own as well as his brother's property. On release its assets amounted to Rs. 12,71,234. with a small debt of Rs. 500.

- (2) Shah Jiwana estate of S. Mubarik Ali Shah and S. Khizar Hayat Shah in the Jhang district. Taken over in 1928 as the former ward was inexperienced and the latter had entered upon a course of wasteful extravagance likely to dissipate his property. At first the debts amounted to Rs. 64,167 but subsequently rose to Rs. 80,000. The estate was released as the wards (one a Zaildar and the other an M. L. A.) were found to be fit for managing their affairs. On release its assets amounted to Rs. 8,15,668 with a debt of Rs. 12,836 which the wards were expected to liquidate without difficulty.
- (3) Khangarh estate of Khan Nasrullah Khan and Saidullah Khan in the Muzaffargarh district. The wards being minors were unable to manage it. It was, therefore, taken over in 1920 with a debt of about Rs. 4,000 and released with assets amounting to Rs. 2,43,038, and a debt of Rs. 3,28 which the elder ward (who had attained majority and was considered to be fit for managing the estate) was expected to liquidate without difficulty.
- (4) The estate of Khan Dalmir Khan of Jhang-Maghiana in the Jhang district. It was taken over in 1933 as the ward expressed his inability to control his debts and manage his affairs. The debts at that time amounted to Rs. 31,861, but on release it had only a small debt of Rs. 3,950 which the ward, who was considered to be fit for managing his affairs, was expected to liquidate without difficulty. Its assets on release amounted to Rs. 1,77,178.
- (5) Ramgarh estate of Mian Ajmer Singh in the Ambala district. It was taken over in 1928 as the ward had entered upon a course of wasteful extravagance likely to dissipate his property. Its liabilities, which amounted to Rs. 60,396, were compounded at annas 12 in the rupee and were thus reduced to Rs. 46,119. But in spite of every effort to clear them, they again rose to Rs. 50,175 in ten years. Since it was found impossible to clear off its debts the estate was released to let the ward have the benefit of the new debt legislation. On release its assets amounted to Rs. 2,54,322.
- (6) Buria estate of Sardars Rattan Amol Singh and Lal Amol Singh, sons of the late S. B. S. Lachhman Singh, in the Ambala district. It was taken over in 1921, as the wards being minors were unable to manage their affairs. It owed a nominal debt of Rs. 4,009 which was paid in a short time. It was released with assets amounting to Rs. 31,77,273 as the elder ward had attained majority and was fit for managing it.
- (7) Sheikh Umar estate of Mian Khuda Bakhsh Qureshi in the Muzaffargarh district. It was taken over in 1930 as the ward expressed his inability to control his debts and manage his affairs. The debts which in the first instance amounted to Rs. 67,646 subsequently rose to about Rs. 80,784 in nine years. As it was found impossible to liquidate them the estate was released to let the ward have the benefit of the new debt legislation. The assets on release amounted to Rs. 3,49,316.

(8) Mandal estate of Nawabzada Mohammad Ijaz Ali Khan Mandal in the Karnal district. It was taken over in September, 1939, as the ward had entered upon a course of wasteful extravagance likely to dissipate his property. Its debts were estimated to be Rs. 85,493 with an annual interest of Rs. 6,010 thereon. In fact the estate was taken over under a misunderstanding. In the preliminary report its income was wrongly estimated to be Rs. 26,643 but subsequently it was found to be Rs. 5,015 only. Since it was impossible to liquidate its heavy debts with its small income it was released. The liquidation of debts was only possible by the sale of about 2/3rd of its property, but it was not considered to be the duty of the Court of Wards to sell the property of its ward for the benefit of his creditors who could not do that under the new debt legislation.

4. *Income.*—The total ordinary income amounted to Rs. 18.35 lakhs (against 14.86) and taking the 54 estates which remained under Superintendence during the two years (1938-39 and 1939-40) the figures for each year compare as follows :—

6. *Wards rates.*—For the control and superintendence of 63 estates the charge levied was Rs. 46,155 (against Rs. 48,525 for 65 estates).

The decrease is due to—

- (1) decrease in income of—

- (i) Barsi and Hajampur estates on account of acute famine ;
- (ii) Dharek estate on account of destruction of crops in three villages and grant of 300 maunds of wheat as taccavi to tenants ; and
- (iii) Taunsa estate ;

- (2) arrears of previous years having been paid during the last year by the F. S. Najam-ud-Din and Baba Harbans Singh Bedi estates.

7. *Cost of management.*—The cost of management was Rs. 2,38,635 (against Rs. 2,43,199). The decrease is very satisfactory and is due to :—

- (a) Decrease in wards rate.
- (b) Retrenchment of an Ahlmad and a peon in the Sohana estate on the release of the Buria and Ramgarh estates.
- (c) Ramgarh estate had to pay audit fee thrice last year on account of release.
- (d) No audit fees having been paid during the year in the case of Lahaul, Qaisrani and Khosa estates.
- (e) Appointment of a new manager on a lower pay in the Amb estate.
- (f) Abolition of the post of a *karinda* and reduction in the pay of another *karinda* in Baleshwar Singh Surrindar Singh estate.
- (g) Strict economy in the expenditure of Mitha Tiwana, Vahali and Mazari estates ; and reduction in the staff of the Vahali estate.
- (h) Joint management of groups of estates in the Shahpur, Rawalpindi and Attock districts.

- (i) Decrease in the remuneration allowed to the British Cotton Growing Association in the Taunsa estate, on account of the fall of income last year.

8. *Assets.*—Total assets are Rs. 4,87,36,264 (against Rs. 4,90,97,797) The decrease occurred chiefly under the headings :—

- (1) Estimated value of landed property.
- (2) Loans to other estates.
- (3) Loans secured on other immovable property.
- (4) Cash in treasury and hand.
- (5) Recoverable arrears of rent.
- (6) Jewellery stock and other items.

Securities to the market value of Rs. 10,16,450 (against Rs. 7,47,964) were held and Rs. 6,03,800 (against Rs. 6,31,910) were lying in treasuries. Full particulars of the important securities are given in Appendix B. Details of investments in Defence Bonds, etc., will be found in Appendix C.

Balances were high in the case of Buria, Maharaja Lambagaon, Amb, Kartarpur, Ber Khurd, Guru Jaswant Singh, Sodhi Karam Singh, Rai Bahadur Sardar Boota Singh, Kallar, Wan Bhachran, Pakpattan, Dipalpur, Mitru and Mazari estates, and the attention of the Deputy Commissioners concerned is drawn to this.

11. *Arrears of rent.*—The arrears of rent at the end of the year amounted to Rs. 3·69 lakhs (against Rs. 3·88 lakhs). The decrease is due to the release of two estates last year and the reduction of arrears in 24 estates. In 13 of them, viz :—

Buria, Dada Siba, Ber Khurd, Sodhi Karam Singh, Rani Chhaunian, Jahanian Shah, Kallar, Khan Bahadur Adamji Mamooji, Shah Jiwana, Khan Wali Dad Khan, Mukhiana, Khan Dalmir Khan and Jhang Sial,

Increases in the following cases were very large and were due to the reasons given against each :—

The heaviest arrears were in Barsi (Rs. 47,724), Kartarpur (Rs. 48,271), Guruharsahai (Rs. 21,797), Rani Chhaurian (Rs. 47,136), Shah Jiwana (Rs. 21,780) and Jalalpur Pirwala (Rs. 26,216) estates and were due to—

Guruharsahai	(i) The lessee of village Kot Guru (Patiala), who owed Rs. 3,700 was murdered and the kharif crops were damaged by hail-storm. The dependents of the deceased lessee have promised to pay the arrears at an early date. (ii) A lessee owing Rs. 11,888 has died leaving no property. The management is trying to effect a compromise with his heirs.

- Rani Chhaunian (i) A lessee owing Rs. 28,820 has disposed of his property and thus there is no hope of recovery.
 (ii) Some of the arrears are outstanding since 1931-32, when there was general depression.
- Shah Jiwana No reasons have been advanced.
- Jalalpur Pirwala General depression.

- Jharauli Paucity of rains and scarcity conditions prevailing in the district.
- Bhabaur Successive failure of crops and agricultural depression.
- Amb The tenants movement in the Una tahsil and agricultural depression.
- Eminabad (i) General agricultural depression.
 (ii) Most of the defaulters have left the estate and their whereabouts are not known.
- Mohammad Zaman Bad financial position of the tenants.
- Mitha Tiwana.. .. Poor harvests in the *Thal* tract.

The estates of F. S. Najam-ud-Din, Kalaswala, Eminabad, Butala, Mela, S. B. Malik Mohan Singh, Dharek, Bahtar, Pira Fatial, Kot Zendi, Pakattan, Taunsa, Mitru and Khangarh have advanced no reasons for the increase of arrears.

Though the arrears of rent have been reduced to some extent, yet more strenuous efforts are needed to reduce them as far as possible. The attention of the Deputy Commissioners concerned is specially drawn to this.

12. *Cash and Batai rents.*—Excluding the estates taken over and released during the year, the total cultivated area of the remaining 57 estates was 170,029 acres. This yielded a gross income of Rs. 11,76,782, representing an average income of Rs. 6-14-9 (against Rs. 5-7-2) per cultivated acre. The amount of land revenue paid (Rs. 1,41,927) averaged Re. 0-13-4 a cultivated acre, and if this is deducted the remaining income averages Rs. 6-1-5 (against Rs. 4-10-2) per cultivated acre. The increase of Rs. 1-7-3 per acre in the average income this year is satisfactory but does not allow much scope for the reduction of rents, as the return on land given out on rent still continues to be substantially lower than on most other forms of investment.

13. *Expenditure on improvements.*—Rupees 74,148 (against Rs. 84,501) were spent on improvements.

14. *Developments—(A) Agriculture.*—The number of estates in which the improved seeds and improved implements were in use remained the same as last year. Sowing of cotton in lines was, however, introduced in 24 estates this year.

In the Mela estate a campaign of clearing the fields of useless bushes growths and shrubs was carried out.

Anti-erosion work was taken up by the Kot Zendi estate.

Eradication of *pohli* and *piazi* is regularly done by the tenants of the Lawa estate.

Embankments and levelling of fields was carried out in the Dipalpur estate.

Mazari estate spent Rs. 902 on demarcation of lands.

Waibandi system was improved in 27 (against 25) estates. Guruharsahai and Sodhi Karam Singh estates again did consolidation work in *barani* areas this year.

Sinking, repairing, cleaning and boring of wells and repairing of persian wheels was undertaken by 26 (against 20) estates, Pakpattan spending as much as Rs. 7,615 in this respect.

Construction of wells to the satisfaction of the District Medical Officer of Health was carried out by 29 (against 2) estates.

Construction, repairing, cleaning, excavating and otherwise improving of watercourses was carried out in 11 (against 8) estates, Mazari spending as much as Rs. 3,359 in this respect.

Eminabad estate sunk pipes in some wells for increasing the water to facilitate irrigation.

Kalaswala has spent Rs. 30 on plantation of fruit trees in a part of the estate in the Sheikhpura district and fruit plantation is progressing in the garden at Kalaswala.

Baba Harbans Singh Bedi estate planted 500 *shisham* trees and 200 *malta* and 96 *langra* mango plants.

Amb estate has provided accommodation for and is affording every help to the District Board Girls School, to be started shortly.

15. *Rural Reconstruction—(A) Training of Managers.*—Out of the 39 Managers and Assistant Managers 6 have attended short courses in rural reconstruction, 6 have attended agricultural course and 5 have attended both the agricultural and rural reconstruction courses. Ten were considered to have sufficient experience and knowledge of this work to be exempted. With regard to the training of the manager of the Sohana estate no attention has been paid to the remarks of the previous years that it is in reality the poor estates of which the managers need most training. The managers of the following estates have not yet been trained though the necessity of training was duly impressed upon them in the last year's report :—

Farrukhnagar, Kotlehr, Kartarpur, Mohammad Zaman, Rawalpindi estates, Attock estates and Montgomery estates.

The manager of the Eminabad estate has been directed to visit the Ingram Skinner estate in Palwal, district Gurgaon.

In the cases of Kalaswala, S. Baleshwar Singh, Surrindar Singh and Kot Zendi estates it has been suggested that the old managers should be replaced by younger, more energetic and better qualified men who have been trained in rural reconstruction and are more in tune with Government's programme for rural betterment.

The ward of Sodhi Karam Singh estate has been directed to undertake a tour under the auspices of the Rural Reconstruction Department.

The attention of the Deputy Commissioners concerned has been specially drawn to the practical course held at the Punjab Agricultural College, Lyallpur, for the training of estate managers in August every year and they have been requested to endeavour to send as many managers, assistant managers and wards as possible to attend it.

(B)—QUESTIONNAIRE.

The following items from the answers to the questionnaire on rural reconstruction may also be quoted apart from those already mentioned in paragraph 14 *supra* :—

The number of the estates in which manure is pitted and ventilators are provided is the same as last year.

As last year there are estates in which *gur* and sugar-making, weaving, shoe-making, oil pressing and refining and poultry rearing are done.

Basket making is carried out in 12 (against 6) estates.

Bee-keeping is still under contemplation in the Amb estate.

Wool processing is encouraged in Pakpattan estate only.

Utensil making and pottery is done in Pakpattan and Bhabaur estates respectively.

Furniture making and wood work is done in Kartarpur and Kallar estates respectively.

Tanning is in vogue in 5 estates.

Manufacture of household agricultural implements is done in 3 estates.

Resin is tapped in one estate.

Rope and string making are done in 6 estates, Soap-making in one estate and *Durrie* making in two estates.

Drainage and sanitary conditions were improved by 22 (against 14) estates.

Refuse pits have been introduced in 19 estates and latrines in 3 estates.

In 32 estates the estate staff and some tenants use mosquito nets.

Trained *Dais* are available in 27 estates.

Co-operative credit and thrift societies exist in 23 estates.

The tenants of all, and the staff of some, of the following estates attended the Farmers' Week, Agricultural Demonstration Farms, Exhibitions and Shows, Cattle Shows, and Melas, Fruit Shows, and Anti-erosion work of the Forest Department :—
