My dear Marvam. as-salamu alaikum wa rahmatu-llahi wa barakatuh!

This time I feel very guilty indeed because I neither sent you a postcard from my beautiful car excursion to Andalusia nor did I write to you immediately upon my return though I know only too well how anxiously you are waiting for news from my side. Your only consolation may be that I have ordered the book you wanted and the book shop has informed me that I can collect it tomorrow. At first I intended to send my letter and the book together by airmail but then I remembered at least that you wanted me to read the book first so that we can exchange our thoughts on it.

My trouble is that I am very badly mis-organized at moment. I have so many things to do that I simply don't get started doing them... Piles of papers to sort out, uncountable @-mails to read and still lots of other events to attend to: A big family meeting from my mother's side in Mainz near Frankfurt which took me four days yet where I very much enjoyed to see my brother with his son, daughter-in-law and little Cassian - and a very big tommy of his mother since in June a little sister is expected. And last weekend I had a visitor from Berlin from Friday to Sunday who met a brother from Bangladesh here in Hamburg. He is a widower and so much wants to marry her. And Allah knows best what is good for the two of them.

I don't know where the weeks since my return have gone - I only know that I have a terribly bad conscience. Especially also because I could work on several translations which would do my purse very well - the journey was really

wonderful but much more expensive than expected... Andalusia was partly breath-taking, exciting, moving and making one very sad. The worst was the marvellous mosque of Cordoba with the integrated ugly church... Fortunately I learned only afterwards from Muslim brothers and sisters that praying in this mosque is strictly forbidden – if anyone enters in an obviously Muslim dress he or she is immediately informed to that effect. But probably it was noon-break, nobody stopped us and I gratefully remember the short spiritual encounter with our Creator in a comparatively lonely corner.

Granada was a also a very moving experience. As we were there during the socalled santa semana (holy week before Easter) the city was often closed for traffic since for hours long processions with "Christ" being carried around accompanied by strange freemason-like dressed men and boys with huge hoots covering the head with only the eyes looking out took place. There was terrible music played by violins expressing sorrow which only on Easter Sunday became less nerve-straining. We were told that we could only enter Alhambra if we bought tickets beforehand. So I got two tickets for 41 € and we were very glad that we did not have to cue with hundreds of less fortunate visitors. We were also informed that we would have to be very punctual, otherwise we would not be admitted to the Nasseride Palace with the famous lions well. So we were nearly half an hour early. But to our dismay it turned out that during the night (28th to 29th April) the clocks were advanced for one hour, so they simply would not let us in. A young couple whose bus left at 12 am also tried to get entry earlier because their tickets were for 1,30 pm, but they were also refused. When we decided to try and get tickets for the afternoon we met these people and they gave us their tickets - we were so overwhelmed that we gave them 10 €. But when we tried to get in at the exact time we learned that they had probably manipulated their tickets (perhaps wanting to make 1.30 pm into 10.30 am) and so again entry was refused to us ... We could not help nearly laughing out heads off and just took a taxi to the "mesquite" and that was truly a wonderful reward. This very neat and clean and friendly mosque made up for all our misfortune. It was built by the Murabitun (Shaykh Abdul Kadir's people) but is of course open for everyone who wants to pray there. On our way home we went via Sevilla, Cadiz, Gibraltar, Malaga, Bologna and so many other places, then through Italy, Switzerland, Austria back to Munich where I stayed with my son for 3 days while Djamila was with an old friend. And one day we visited a very interesting mosque in Penzberg south of Munich with a Minaret made of very big metal Arab letters with glass in between, and with the most beautiful library where I even found some of my books and was of course very proud...

It is now half an hour past midnight and I must close for now. Hope to write more soon. All my best wishes and regards for now, Yours in Islam

Today I received your happy and content letter of May 25th and enjoyed every single line - it is shining with grateful submission to all our Almighty Creator is sending you way! masha Allah! And indeed, what a blessing that your dear Khan Sahib is well enough to share namaz and Qur'an reading with you as He did now for so many years, alhamdu-li-llah.

I shall insha Allah hand your message of love on to sister Zeba. Just this morning I happened to come across a PC video showing Shaikh Nazim as he embraces the Pope during his visit to Zyprus. It is really amazing what this old man is still able to achieve! He sitting peacefully in a chair and the Pope coming with his entourage to this place and bending down to kiss him. Subhana-llah! Probably you will already have FRAGILE in your hands when this letter reaches you. I have gone through the volume and am of course deeply touched by all the misery and braveness illustrated though the photos by the very enthusiastic and engaged author. Yet I was reluctant to keep the book in my house for too long one feels so utterly helpless in face of all those tribulations by which these poor people are visited... One would continuously go on imploring our Lord for His mercy on those co-inhabitants of mother earth who seem to me in no way guilty of creating their own plight. They are simply carrying the heavy burden for the rest of the world and we are condemned to be nothing but onlookers who have no chance of really lightening their lot. If we could not trust that Almighty Allah will make up for all this in the other, the better World, we should lose our mind. That is at least how I feel.

How wonderful that you were able to show the people from Al-Jazeera your albums, it must be a priceless collection, I am sure! And how Maulana's children will feel when they come to see this, God willing.

Isn't it strange? I am at moment also working with a very good friend and poet on my biography - so to say the story of trying to live Islam during 50 years as a convert / revert in surroundings mostly rather uncongenial to Islam!

Hopefully my companion during the car trip through France, Spain, Italy, Switzerland and Austria will also write her story with this friend - she was born in a NS concentration camp because both her parents were committed communists, and was living in East Germany till she succeeded in fleeing away to the West in 1960. She is now 66, the friend will be 71 this year and published his own biography last year - FROM BASEBEK IM MOOR VIA MOSCOW TO MEKKA. This very well written account presents him as a young Protestant, becoming later on a Catholic, then a "noble" (idealistic) Communist und finally ending up as Muslim - and when he expected his very old mother to be horrified by this last step, she smiled and said: "Most important, you did not turn into a Catholic again!!!"

To round off this letter, I am only too thankful that I can assure you too: I am also feeling so privileged by Almighty Allah to be able to still live at nearly 76 and full-heartedly enjoy every hour granted to me, that I can do my Qur'an readings every morning after fajr and am even planning to keep fast again during Ramadan, insha Allah Ta'ala. Of course I only manage half of what I would want to, but then age is demanding its toll which is quite normal.

Also all my children and grandchildren are most kind to me, I still live in the place where I was so happy with my Abdul Karim and if my health permits I may even undertake some more travelling, provided my financial circumstances permit this.

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Lately I did such a lot of travelling and had so many visitors that I was not able to reply much earlier to your kind and interesting letter - thank you so much for it indeed. First I went so see my son in Munich who was in a rather bad condition spiritually but now thanks to Allah is much better again. What a pity that he does not keep Ramadan which I missed so much due to my Parkinson desease last year. But this year I am feeling much better and therefore really enjoy this fourth day of the Holy Month. In the evening I will join a nice Qur'an lecture, insha Allah, then I will fetch a friend from the railway station and bring her to my dear Amatullah who is still much depend on her wheeling chair. And then I hope to return to the lecture group and hold Iftar with the sisters and brothers, God willing. For this purpose I have to prepare a nice desert dish with raspberries and white cheese (Quark as we say) as my share. On the way home I took the train via Aachen where an important meeting of the Central Council of Muslims in Germany was held, and in the evening of 1st August I returned to Hamburg - at about 2 m.a. on August 2nd I was in bed, alhamdu-lillah. But at 11 o'clock the same day 7 sisters from Hamburg with two children arrived and stayed with me over night, till nearly 3 p.m. the next day. And on Wednesday I had to go to Lützelbach near Frankfurt where a family meeting of the House of Islam took place. Wer also mehr wissen möchte, dem sei angeraten, darin weiterzuschmökern.

Islamische Zeitung: Frau Grimm, könnten Sie ein bisschen über sich selbst erzählen?

Fatima Grimm: Ich bin 1934 - in der Nazizeit - als Helga Wolff in München geboren. Meine Kindheit war recht glücklich; ich wuchs mit drei weiteren Geschwistern auf, und uns ging es gut. Ich machte meine mittlere Reife, ging mit 18 Jahren für ein Jahr nach England, war später Reporterin für verschiedene Zeitungen und auch Sekretärin, wobei mir meine guten Englischkenntnisse sehr zur Hilfe kamen und auch heute noch hilfreich sind, wenn es etwa um die Übersetzung vom Englischen ins Deutsche geht. So habe ich zum Beispiel vor einiger Zeit eine Qur'aninterpretation von der Nurcu-Bewegung, die bis dahin nur auf Türkisch und Englisch verfügbar war, ins Deutsche übersetzt und hatte dadurch die Möglichkeit, der deutschen Gesellschaft neue Gedanken zugänglich zu machen. Doch zurück zu meiner Jugend: Wir wurden atheistisch erzogen, und da mir das nicht genügte, suchte ich schon früh nach Orientierung. Eine Zeit lang fühlte ich mich als Zeugin Jehovas, da unsere Hausangestellte Erna, die ich sehr mochte, eine war und mich dafür begeistern konnte. Als wir von Haus zu Haus gingen und an jede Türe klopften, um von unserem Glauben zu erzählen, hielt mich Erna vor dem Haus des örtlichen Pfarrers mit dem Argument zurück, bei Glaubensträgern könne man dies nicht machen. Da war für mich der Wurm drin, und ich verabschiedete mich und suchte weiter. Ich nahm an verschiedenen Zeltlagern von Protestanten teil, ließ mich aber letztendlich bei einem katholischen Benediktinerpater taufen. Auch dann hatte ich jedoch nicht das Gefühl, meinen Weg gefunden zu haben.

Islamische Zeitung: Wie sind Sie dann zum Islam gekommen?

Fatima Grimm: 1958 lernte ich meinen ersten Mann kennen. Er war Tscheche, hatte in Prag Orientalistik studiert, war später wegen des Kommunismus nach Deutschland gegangen. Ihn hatte vor allem die arabische Schrift und Kalligraphie sowie die Moschee-Architektur fasziniert, weshalb er bereits mit 16 Jahren bei einem tschechischen Muslim sein Glaubensbekenntnis aussprach und sich von da an Omar Abdul Aziz nannte. Wir lernten uns also kennen, und auch ich fühlte mich vom Islam angezogen und konvertierte 1960 bei einem russischen Imam, der in Bayern für die Flüchtlinge aus seiner Heimat zuständig war - in dem Jahr, in dem wir auch heirateten. Wir kannten damals keine Muslime in unserer Umgebung und versuchten, uns die islamische Praxis aus dem Buch anzueignen. Das fühlte manchmal zu komischen Dingen: so wusste ich nicht, dass man beim Beten ein Kopftuch trägt, betete zuweilen also einfach mit Nachthemdchen, und fand es schon optimal, wenn ich es wenigstens ein, zwei Mal täglich schaffte. Und im ersten Ramadan, den ich einhielt, fastete ich alle 30 Tage, weil ich nicht wusste, dass Frauen an bestimmten Tagen von dieser Pflicht ausgenommen sind. Natürlich fragten wir uns auch, ob es nicht unsere Verpflichtung sei, in einem islamischen Land zu leben, um unsere Religion besser praktizieren zu können. Schließlich war unsere Antwort: Ja, und da Pakistan damals gerade gegründet war, gingen wir also 1962 in dieses Land. Dort durchlebte ich dann sozusagen meine muslimische Kinderstube, bekam dann auch mein erstes Kind, Saifuddin, und fühlte mich rundherum wohl. Omar aber, der ja unseren Lebensunterhalt verdienen musste, war enttäuscht darüber, dass alles nicht so rosig war, wie wir es uns erträumt hatten. Nach drei Jahren

Islamische Zeitung: Wie ging es dann in Deutschland weiter? In den 60ern kamen ja auch die ersten Gastarbeiter und muslimischen Studenten.

Fatima Grimm: Genau. Als wir zurückkamen, gab es bereits eine Reihe von Studenten, vor allem aus arabischen Ländern, in Deutschland. Sie sammelten eifrig Spenden für ihre eigene Gebetsstätte. Im Jahre 1967 wurde dann der Grundstein für die heute noch bestehende Moschee in München-Freimann gelegt, und ich war dabei und hörte den ersten Adhan unter "meinem" weißblauen Himmel. Dort war ich dann lange ehrenamtlich aktiv, wir weißblauen Friedhofs, den muslimischen Kindergarten und die Schule



with children, because only two fathers were there. I had a nice time with the children and their mothers. And most important of all: Muhammad Siddiq assured me that the sponsor of Zeba Siddiqi's book "History of the Prophets from the Qur'an" will insha Allah soon give the translation money so that I was able to give sister Sarah, the main translator of the second volume, the fee for her work and now she got visa to visit her husband in Algeria and stay with him for three months, insha Allah. As I may have mentioned, after spending last Ramadan with her husband's family she returned all covered in a dark burqa so that she lost her job and had to earn her bit of money in helping me around the house. It would be so lovely to get some of the money back which I paid in advance for the translations... Well, and the last week we had Abdul Karim's son Daniel from Columbia with his 10 month old daughter with us, while the mother was sent back from Madrid to Columbia because something was not all right wither her passport.

To my great job the IZ (Islamische Zeitung / Islamic Newspaper) in its August edition brought a full page of interview with me because my 76th birthday was also the 50th anniversary of my (re-)entering into Islam... And yesterday our Hamburger Abendblatt (evening paper) sent a reporter and photographer in order to make an article about my "Burkini" - swimming suit covering the complete body. Since I have this (May 2010) I joined the early morning swimming group with water gymnastics on Fridays at the local swimming hall and though some people make horrible remarks or even scold me publicly, this swimming suit is allowed according to public ordinances and I always hope that more sisters will also make use of this opportunity - it gives them the chance to teach their children swimming (which is very costly with official teachers) and actually swimming is so heathly for a great number of bodily ailments. So will you kindly accept my apologies for writing so late after reading all these excuses?

All my love for now and I shall try the print out the interview on the backside of these pages hoping you might find someone who will translate it for you.

für die islamische Gemeinschaft. Ich war begeistert vom Islam und war 100 Prozent bei der Sache. Meinem ersten Mann Omar habe ich dadurch das Leben wohl nicht leicht gemacht, ihm war das alles zu viel. Nach 25 Jahren Ehe trennten wir uns also im Jahr 1983 einvernehmlich, und ich war erst einmal allein.

Islamische Zeitung: Bis dahin waren Sie in München? Wie hat es Sie dann nach Hamburg verschlagen?

Fatima Grimm: Das ist eine wundersame Geschichte. Auf meiner Pilgerfahrt ('Umra) 1982 freundete ich mich sehr mit den Kindern von Abdul Karim Grimm an, die ebenfalls mit ihrem Vater daran teilnahmen und deren Mutter etwa sechs Jahre vorher verstorben war. Als die ältere Tochter Nadija erfuhr, dass ich alleinstehend war, schrieb sie mir kurzerhand einen Brief und fragte: "Fatima, warum kommst du nicht nach Hamburg und heiratest unseren Papa?" Und so schlossen wir tatsächlich am 1. April 1984 den Bund der Ehe, und ich zog ich von München nach Hamburg, wo ich bis heute lebe. Es waren 25 Jahre, die mir viel Glück und viele unvergessliche gemeinsame Erlebnisse beschert haben, alhamdulillah. Am Anfang war es natürlich nicht einfach, sich aneinander zu gewöhnen, da ich ja sozusagen eine ganze Familie heiratete - Abdulkarim hatte ja drei Kinder aus seiner zweiten Ehe, und in Amerika gab es noch seine Tochter Jasmin, von deren Mutter er sich aufgrund der schrecklichen jugoslawischen Bestimmungen schon nach ganz kurzer Ehe wieder trennen musste. Ich lebe heute, nachdem mein Mann, den ich so sehr vermisse, ja im Februar 2009 verstorben ist, mit meiner Stieftochter und ihrer Familie in einem Haus und habe Gott sei Dank ein sehr gutes Verhältnis zur gesamten Familie.

Islamische Zeitung: Wie hat sich das Verhältnis der Gesellschaft zu Islam und Muslimen Ihrer Meinung nach im Laufe der Zeit und vor allem nach dem 11. September verändert?

Fatima Grimm: Ich habe schon Veränderungen erkennen können. Früher war man dem Islam gegenüber nicht so voreingenommen wie heute. Man wusste nicht viel über ihn, aber er war geduldet. Ich selbst wurde damals oft als Exotin betrachtet, da es nicht viele Muslime in Deutschland gab und Konvertiten schon gar nicht. Das hat sich inzwischen geändert; es gibt immer mehr Menschen, die sich für den Islam entscheiden, auch für dessen spirituelle Facetten. Die Moscheen füllen sich, und die nichtmuslimische Gesellschaft wundert sich und reagiert teilweise ängstlich auf diesen regen Zulauf. Man bemerkt schon eine allgemeine Skepsis gegenüber Muslimen. Ich persönlich habe aber recht wenige negative Erfahrungen gemacht; es ist eher das allgemeine Klima, das sich verändert hat.

Islamische Zeitung: Gibt es so etwas wie eine deutsch-muslimische Kultur? Und wie verorten Sie sich da?

Fatima Grimm: Der Islam wird nach außen hin oft noch als Ausländerreligion betrachtet, obwohl wir meiner Meinung nach doch schon längst hier angekommen sind. Deshalb haben Abdul Karim und ich uns auch für die Deutsche Muslim-Liga eingesetzt, die es immerhin schon seit mehr als 50 Jahren im Deutschen Vereinsregister gibt. Wir sind Gott sei Dank immer gut mit allen muslimischen Geschwistern ausgekommen und haben stets gute Beziehungen zu vielen Vereinen und Gemeinden unseres Glaubens in Deutschland gepflegt. Ich denke schon, dass der Islam hierher gehört und sich gerade in den letzten Jahren auch sehr viel getan hat. Es gibt Bücher wie "Deutsch, muslimisch, weiblich" von Lamya Kaddor, die sich ganz klar hier verortet, was ich gut finde. Ich selbst gehe mit meinem so genannten Burkini, dem Ganzkörperbadeanzug, regelmäßig im Hallenbad schwimmen. Natürlich waren die anderen Schwimmer erst einmal skeptisch, ab und an bekomme ich die eine oder andere Bemerkung ab, aber die meisten Besucher haben sich inzwischen an meinen Anblick gewöhnt. So verhält es sich mit vielem. Die Akzeptanz kommt irgendwann einfach, wenn man sich nicht verkriecht, sondern zeigt, wie sehr man seinen Glauben liebt. Eine andere Sache ist der Religionsunterricht für alle. Mein Enkelsohn besucht so einen Unterricht, und ich findet das sehr gut, da man dort über alle Religionen etwas erfährt. Die Hauptsache ist doch, dass wir alle, die wir in diesem Land leben, einander achten.

Islamische Zeitung: Sie sind 76 Jahre alt und haben viel erlebt. Womit beschäftigen Sie sich im Moment?

Fatima Grimm: Vor einem Jahr ist mein Mann gestorben, und das war sehr schwer für mich. Ich habe jedoch sehr viel Unterstützung und Zuspruch bekommen, was mir sehr geholfen hat, mich wieder aufzurappeln. Im Moment bin ich mit Dr. Peter Schütt, dem Verfasser einiger schöner und heiterer Bücher über den Islam, dabei, meine Erlebnisse als Muslima in Deutschland aufzuschreiben, und bin, so Gott will, auch fast fertig damit. Ab und zu gibt es Übersetzungsprojekte, und vor kurzem habe ich ein Buch mit Geschichten rund ums Kopftuch von Musliminnen in aller Welt zusammengestellt, das inscha Allah demnächst beim Verlag des Haus des Islam verfügbar sein wird. Oft werde ich von Leuten aus der muslimischen Community angerufen und um Rat gefragt, auch in Sachen Heirat. Da ist oft guter Rat sehr schwierig! Aber ich bin unendlich dankbar, dass ich noch so aktiv sein kann, ebenso wie für all die schönen und manchmal herausfordernden Jahre, die hinter mir liegen.



Ihn hatte vor allem die arabische Schrift und Kalligraphie sowie die Moschee-Architektur fasziniert, weshalb er bereits mit 16 Jahren bei einem tschechischen Muslim sein Glaubensbekenntnis aussprach und sich von da an Omar Abdul Aziz nannte. Wir lernten uns also kennen, und auch ich fühlte mich vom Islam angezogen und konvertierte 1960 bei einem russischen Imam, der in Bayern für die Flüchtlinge aus seiner Heimat zuständig war - in dem Jahr, in dem wir auch heirateten. Wir kannten damals keine Muslime in unserer Umgebung und versuchten, uns die islamische Praxis aus dem Buch anzueignen. Das fühlte manchmal zu komischen Dingen: so wusste ich nicht, dass man beim Beten ein Kopftuch trägt, betete zuweilen also einfach mit Nachthemdchen, und fand es schon optimal, wenn ich es wenigstens ein, zwei Mal täglich schaffte. Und im ersten Ramadan, den ich einhielt, fastete ich alle 30 Tage, weil ich nicht wusste, dass Frauen an bestimmten Tagen von dieser Pflicht ausgenommen sind. Natürlich fragten wir uns auch, ob es nicht unsere Verpflichtung sei, in einem islamischen Land zu leben, um unsere Religion besser praktizieren zu können. Schließlich war unsere Antwort: Ja, und da Pakistan damals gerade gegründet war, gingen wir also 1962 in dieses Land. Dort durchlebte ich dann sozusagen meine muslimische Kinderstube, bekam dann auch mein erstes Kind, Saifuddin, und fühlte mich rundherum wohl. Omar aber, der ja unseren Lebensunterhalt verdienen musste, war enttäuscht darüber, dass alles nicht so rosig war, wie wir es uns erträumt hatten. Nach drei Jahren kehrten wir also nach München zurück.

Islamische Zeitung: Wie ging es dann in Deutschland weiter? In den 60ern kamen ja auch die ersten Gastarbeiter und muslimischen Studenten.

Fatima Grimm: Genau. Als wir zurückkamen, gab es bereits eine Reihe von Studenten, vor allem aus arabischen Ländern, in Deutschland. Sie sammelten eifrig Spenden für ihre eigene Gebetsstätte. Im Jahre 1967 wurde dann der Grundstein für die heute noch bestehende Moschee in München-Freimann gelegt, und ich war dabei und hörte den ersten Adhan unter "meinem" weißblauen Himmel. Dort war ich dann lange ehrenamtlich aktiv, kümmerte mich um die Einrichtung eines muslimischen Friedhofs, den muslimischen Kindergarten und die Schule für die islamische Gemeinschaft. Ich war begeistert vom Islam und war 100 Prozent bei der Sache. Meinem ersten Mann Omar habe ich dadurch das Leben wohl nicht leicht gemacht, ihm war das alles zu viel. Nach 25 Jahren Ehe trennten wir uns also im Jahr 1983



with children, because only two fathers were there. I had a nice time with the children and their mothers. And most important of all: Muhammad Siddiq assured me that the sponsor of Zeba Siddiqi's book "History of the Prophets from the Qur'an" will insha Allah soon give the translation money so that I was able to give sister Sarah, the main translator of the second volume, the fee for her work and now she got visa to visit her husband in Algeria and stay with him for three months, insha Allah. As I may have mentioned, after spending last Ramadan with her husband's family she returned all covered in a dark burqa so that she lost her job and had to earn her bit of money in helping me around the house. It would be so lovely to get some of the money back which I paid in advance for the translations... Well, and the last week we had Abdul Karim's son Daniel from Columbia with his 10 month old daughter with us, while the mother was sent back from Madrid to Columbia because something was not all right wither her passport.

To my great job the IZ (Islamische Zeitung / Islamic Newspaper) in its August edition brought a full page of interview with me because my 76th birthday was also the 50th anniversary of my (re-)entering into Islam... And yesterday our Hamburger Abendblatt (evening paper) sent a reporter and photographer in order to make an article about my "Burkini" - swimming suit covering the complete body. Since I have this (May 2010) I joined the early morning swimming group with water gymnastics on Fridays at the local swimming hall and though some people make horrible remarks or even scold me publicly, this swimming suit is allowed according to public ordinances and I always hope that more sisters will also make use of this opportunity - it gives them the chance to teach their children swimming (which is very costly with official teachers) and actually swimming is so healthy for a great number of bodily ailments.

So will you kindly accept my apologies for writing so late after reading all these excuses?

All my love for now and I shall try the print out the interview on the backside of these pages hoping you might find someone who will translate it for you.

P.S. Masha Allah, I found this letter on my PC which I dared not hope, so I send it again hopefully proving that I did not forget you! I am well and healthy, thanks Allah, and shall be travelling to Egypt just for one week next Friday—an invitation which does not cost me anything, apart perhaps from some pocket money, alhamdu-li-llah.

I am just preparing the meal for the members of the German Muslim League who are holding their annual meeting in Abdul Karim's little mosque/prayer room. Today, how gratefzul I am to Allah Almighty that He offers me so many chances to do something for the Umma. Since about 4 weeks I am correcting the M.A. thesis of a young sister on Feminism in Egypt - it is so troublesome indeed! Much love - Yours

Islamische Zeitung: Bis dahin waren Sie in München? Wie hat es Sie dann nach Hamburg verschlagen?

Fatima Grimm: Das ist eine wundersame Geschichte. Auf meiner Pilgerfahrt ('Umra) 1982 freundete ich mich sehr mit den Kindern von Abdul Karim Grimm an, die ebenfalls mit ihrem Vater daran teilnahmen und deren Mutter etwa sechs Jahre vorher verstorben war. Als die ältere Tochter Nadija erfuhr, dass ich alleinstehend war, schrieb sie mir kurzerhand einen Brief und fragte: "Fatima, warum kommst du nicht nach Hamburg und heiratest unseren Papa?" Und so schlossen wir tatsächlich am 1. April 1984 den Bund der Ehe, und ich zog ich von München nach Hamburg, wo ich bis heute lebe. Es waren 25 Jahre, die mir viel Glück und viele unvergessliche gemeinsame Erlebnisse beschert haben, alhamdulillah. Am Anfang war es natürlich nicht einfach, sich aneinander zu gewöhnen, da ich ja sozusagen eine ganze Familie heiratete - Abdulkarim hatte ja drei Kinder aus seiner zweiten Ehe, und in Amerika gab es noch seine Tochter Jasmin, von deren Mutter er sich aufgrund der schrecklichen jugoslawischen Bestimmungen schon nach ganz kurzer Ehe wieder trennen musste. Ich lebe heute, nachdem mein Mann, den ich so sehr vermisse, ja im Februar 2009 verstorben ist, mit meiner Stieftochter und ihrer Familie in einem Haus und habe Gott sei Dank ein sehr gutes Verhältnis zur gesamten Familie.

Islamische Zeitung: Wie hat sich das Verhältnis der Gesellschaft zu Islam und Muslimen Ihrer Meinung nach im Laufe der Zeit und vor allem nach dem 11. September verändert?

Fatima Grimm: Ich habe schon Veränderungen erkennen können. Früher war man dem Islam gegenüber nicht so voreingenommen wie heute. Man wusste nicht viel über ihn, aber er war geduldet. Ich selbst wurde damals oft als Exotin betrachtet, da es nicht viele Muslime in Deutschland gab und Konvertiten schon gar nicht. Das hat sich inzwischen geändert; es gibt immer mehr Menschen, die sich für den Islam entscheiden, auch für dessen spirituelle Facetten. Die Moscheen füllen sich, und die nichtmuslimische Gesellschaft wundert sich und reagiert teilweise ängstlich auf diesen regen Zulauf. Man bemerkt schon eine allgemeine Skepsis gegenüber Muslimen. Ich persönlich habe aber recht wenige negative Erfahrungen gemacht; es ist eher das allgemeine Klima, das sich verändert hat.

Islamische Zeitung: Gibt es so etwas wie eine deutsch-muslimische Kultur? Und wie verorten Sie sich da?

Fatima Grimm: Der Islam wird nach außen hin oft noch als Ausländerreligion betrachtet, obwohl wir meiner Meinung nach doch schon längst hier angekommen sind. Deshalb haben Abdul Karim und ich uns auch für die Deutsche Muslim-Liga eingesetzt, die es immerhin schon seit mehr als 50 Jahren im Deutschen Vereinsregister gibt. Wir sind Gott sei Dank immer gut mit allen muslimischen Geschwistern ausgekommen und haben stets gute Beziehungen zu vielen Vereinen und Gemeinden unseres Glaubens in Deutschland gepflegt. Ich denke schon, dass der Islam hierher gehört und sich gerade in den letzten Jahren auch sehr viel getan hat. Es gibt Bücher wie "Deutsch, muslimisch, weiblich" von Lamya Kaddor, die sich ganz klar hier verortet, was ich gut finde. Ich selbst gehe mit meinem so genannten Burkini, dem Ganzkörperbadeanzug, regelmäßig im Hallenbad schwimmen. Natürlich waren die anderen Schwimmer erst einmal skeptisch, ab und an bekomme ich die eine oder andere Bemerkung ab, aber die meisten Besucher haben sich inzwischen an meinen Anblick gewöhnt. So verhält es sich mit vielem: Die seinen Glauben liebt. Eine andere Sache ist der Religionsunterricht für alle. Mein Enkelsohn besucht so einen Unterricht, und ich findet das sehr gut, da man dort über alle Religionen etwas erfährt. Die Hauptsache ist doch, dass wir alle, die wir in diesem Land leben, einander achten.

Islamische Zeitung: Sie sind 76 Jahre alt und haben viel erlebt. Womit beschäftigen Sie sich im Moment?

Fatima Grimm: Vor einem Jahr ist mein Mann gestorben, und das war sehr schwer für mich. Ich habe jedoch sehr viel Unterstützung und Zuspruch bekommen, was mir sehr geholfen hat, mich wieder aufzurappeln. Im Moment bin ich mit Dr. Peter Schütt, dem Verfasser einiger schöner und heiterer Bücher über den Islam, dabei, meine Erlebnisse als Muslima in Deutschland aufzuschreiben, und bin, so Gott will, Geschichten rund ums Kopftuch von Musliminnen in aller Welt zusammengestellt, das inscha Allah muslimischen Community angerufen und um Rat gefragt, auch in Sachen Heirat. Da ist oft guter Rat sehr schönen und manchmal herausfordernden Jahre, die hinter mir liegen.

My dear, dear Maryam,

So glad to hear that after all my letter reached you. Yours also came or was actually awaiting me when I returned from my 8 days trip to Cairo. Enclosed I am sending you an article which appeared on Oct. 8^{th} in the Al-Azhar weekly Newspaper. Even if you have nobody who can translate it to you, you can at least see the pictures.

While in Cairo (1st to 8th October) I was busy reading the book by Nasr Hamid Abu Zaid MY LIFE WITH ISLAM. He actually told Navid Kermani the story of his forced divorce from his wife in 1995 because the court in Egypt found him guilty of apostasy. The book is in my opinion one endless declaration of deep devotion to his faith and the way in which Navid Kermani has written down the story I felt like crying several times. But of course I did not mention the affair during my three visits to Al Azhar, the last of which was a lecture given by the Grand Imam Dr. Ahmad Al-Tayyeb, Sheikh Al-Azhar, on Al-Gazali's thesis that Allah's commands were issued in 14 different ways: e.g. as order, permission, prohibition, exhortation, reminder, warning etc. We were a bit late and when I slipped by the speakers's desk, the Sheikh took out three sweets from his Pocket and handed them to me. One of them I gave to my dear friend Samah, who is a B.A. graduate of Al-Azhar in Germanistic and in the meantime has successfully completed her M.A. in Hamburg. She is married to a very stout German Muslim, they had a 5 year old daughter by the time I came to Al-Azhar, and since have been granted a very sweet little boy by Allah Ta'ala - his name is Ibrahim. Yesterday I visited the family and admired the tiny Muslim, masha Allah.

Hopefully you will put questions in your reply to these lines - I am terribly busy Because I am supposed to write an article on Muslims in Germany for the Al-Azhar Newspaper, an from 1.-5. Nov. I shall insha Allah attend the Islam Week in Stuffgert from 1.-3. Nov.

Again; I pray that you and your family enjoined Ramadan with all its blessings, and again, Eid Mubarak!



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
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These photos show some of what is at the museum.



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

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MESSAGE FROM THE FOUNDER OF DUBAI MEDICAL COLLEGE FOR GIRLS

Praise be to Allah who taught man what he did not know and guided His servants through knowledge to the path of piety and obedience to Him. He Himself says in the Holy Book:

Only those of his servants who are endowed with knowledge truly fear Allah. (35:28)

And may Allah's peace and blessings be upon Prophet Muhammad (P.B.U.H) who taught humanity all good things and guided us towards righteousness and piety.

There can be no doubt that the two most important areas that need development in the life of man are economy and education. We express our gratitude to Allah for having blessed our toil of many years with rich fruit and having granted us valuable experience in both these areas. Our partners in the venture have been some chosen individuals of Allah with faith in the Almighty deeply rooted in their hearts, who are forward-looking in nature and are infused with zeal for development. The outcome of all this is there for anyone to see, especially in the persons of those who have reaped a rich harvest in their dealings with the Islamic banks or of those who have truly understood the ultimate purpose of the Islamic School and sent their children to it.

The impetus to our thinking about effecting changes in the educational system came from the fact that tediously long periods were consumed in the process of learning. The present system makes the pupils spend the most vibrant and potentially productive years of their life in schooling. They only graduate - at the age of 25 generally - when their resolutions have weakened and their zeal and enthusiasm have dwindled.

The fault lies in our system of education. It does not harmonize with the nature on which Allah has created man. Let us look at man's life. In the beginning, as a newborn, he neither knew nor understood anything. The Qur'an portrays this state in the following terms: Allah had brought you forth from the wombs of your mothers when you knew nothing, and He gave you hearing and sight and understanding that you might give thanks to Allah. (16:78)

The second stage, the period for man's learning that begins right from birth, ends with the dawn of puberty. During this period the learner passes through various phases of essential education that should reach its culmination at the age of 15-i.e. the age of his maturity. Now, at this stage, he is a man. He can and should work and produce and play his part in easing some of the stresses in the life of his near and dear ones. At this stage, he begins to think in terms of building a new family and attaining self-sufficiency. He is now working and earning. He no longer depends on his father. He is himself a father now. Let him not, therefore, be a burden on the society. He has past the stage of being a mere passive consumer and has become an active, producing member of it. It is in this respect that the traditional educational system comes into conflict with human nature. It hampers the natural process of human progress by extending the duration of education to as many as twenty years.

Another casualty of the traditional system of education is the grandson's chance to benefit from the experiences of his grandfather. A logical consequence of late



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termination of educational process is late marriage and late fatherhood. Consequently, a grandson is deprived of the benefits from his grandfather's knowledge and wisdom, which would complement the knowledge directly received from his father and in school.

Logic and reason, therefore, demanded that we try to find out a way out of this impasse. It could only be through devising a new system of education that would be in accord with human nature and achieve the intended educational goals with the minimum fuss and in the shortest possible time. This would not have been possible unless we deeply analyzed the old system, did away with its negative aspects, benefited from its positive elements and opened up new windows on knowledge and education before the learner. Only thus would he be able to work and produce at an early age. This takes him towards self-realization and self-discovery, making him a help, not a hindrance to his father, his family, his country, his community, and for the world at large. For this is the period of his life when he is filled with youthful energy, and this is the stage when the time with him is ample, when his mind is unclouded and clear, when his memory is fresh and when the thinking is unadulterated.

After deep, deep pondering we decided to put before every learner the following motto, which sums up the true philosophy of our new educational system: Learn so that you may work and work so that you may learn. Or to phrase it differently: Learning that leads to work which widens the area of knowledge and which in turn multiplies the fields of work.

The above motto or slogan became the starting point of our philosophy on which the Islamic School for education was built. It was the first school founded with the object of reforming the educational system throughout the world. The Dubai Medical College has also been set up with the same purpose and is meant to serve as an elder sister that would support and guide the school in fulfilling the expectations reposed in it and achieving the goals already specified above.

The school was set up keeping in view the clearly visible physiological changes taking place in the life of a person approaching the stage of maturity. This period may well be considered a watershed between childhood and maturity or, to put it differently, between the stage of freedom and irresponsibility on the one hand and obligation and responsibility on the other. A young man reaches the stage of puberty around the age of fifteen. At this juncture he should become a fully responsible person capable of discharging his responsibilities. Foremost of these are the religious duties. Now pilgrimage is a religious obligation fulfilled by him and accepted by Allah. And now the punishment for theft prescribed in the Islamic law is to be enforced upon him should he commit this sin provided that all conditions necessary for the enforcement of the law are satisfied in his case.

As for the Medical College, the initial impulse for it came from my feeling that the women in the present-day world do not get their due right in the society. I do not mean to say that they are being oppressed and denied their rights. On the contrary, I believe that they themselves are oblivious of their true position and have even been a party to this usurpation of their rights. Women have unnecessarily entered into competition with this usurpation of their rights. Women have unnecessarily entered into competition with man without realizing that Allah has seated her in a place where she could be an object of envy for her male counterparts. A poet has done women grievous wrong by saying:

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Teach your maid to love the Homeland;

For the maid is a partner of young men.

The ultimate goal that the poet is visualizing here for the woman is that there must be complete parity between womankind and man. The fact, however, is that she is better than all men –in her own field; for she is the foundation of the populace, governess of generations and producer of the gentry. The most important role for which she was created and in which no man can rival her is that of motherhood. This important social function particular to her surpasses all occupations specific to men. It is a function no man is equal to discharging in all his physical fitness and mental alertness. Another poet was perhaps to the point than the earlier one when he said:

A mother is a seminary, if you prepare it

You prepare a noble breed of mankind.

She is the organizer of the house and the fastener of the beads of family. She is a wife helping her husband in the struggle of life. She is a mother pushing her children ahead to glory. Later, she is the grandmother transferring the heritage of ancestors to the grand children. She does the work of linking the brilliance of today with the experiences and lessons of the past. How can the woman, then, retrieve her lost rights?

In order to know her rights and realize her worth and value as well as regain her right position, the woman must go back and read her history and perceive her proper role in the family —as a mother and wife — as well as her role in the society — as a doctor or a teacher. She must know the true position Islam has placed her in sufficient if she remembers the following saying of the Prophet Muhammad:

"Anyone given the guardianship of three daughters, if he teaches them good manners and treats them well, these daughters will act as a shield for him from hellfire."

A woman then stood up and said: "O Allah's Messenger, if she has two?" The Prophet (pbuh) said: "Even two."

At this another woman said: "O Allah's Messenger, If she has one?" "Even one," answered the Prophet (pbuh).

Another deciding factor in the institution of the College was the fact that I realized that -apart from education- the woman was not getting her due right even in the field of treatment and nursing. The woman does not get female medical help if she falls sick. In all such eventualities she finds herself confronted by male doctors, there being acute paucity of lady doctors. This is a phenomenon, which neither human nature accepts nor Islam allows except under a pressing need. Some of the women would not accept it even under the most pressing circumstances.

It was due to these reasons that I thought of starting a women's wing in the Islamic School. It was meant to be a place where a woman could acquire knowledge that would elevate her to the position she rightly belongs to. For the same reason I thought of



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instituting the Dubai Medical College for Girls. It is intended to be a place where a woman will not only graduate as a physician to provide treatment to women patients only but will also learn to play her role as a dutiful wife and a kind mother capable of bringing up her children on the right lines.

I was, however, keen not to follow the traditional time-consuming system of education. I set two goals before me, namely, shortening the duration of courses and making optimum use of the given time.

I, therefore, pondered over a system that would take care of both the above mentioned points. I met many specialized scholars of medical sciences from various countries, and I found a perfect harmony of ideas or identity of views on the point that medical education really needs a new approach or a system based on the maximum utilization of time and shortening the period of study. All of them were waiting for someone who would implement the plan first. The most prominent among those I met were Dr. Zuhaira Abideen and Dr. Mohammad Abd Al-Monem Abu Al-Fadl. Our meeting was fruitful and constructive. They welcomed the idea. So, as a first step, we jointly started building up this imposing educational structure. The second step followed on the heels of the first. Both of them made commendable effort and played a prominent role at each step. Thanks to their kind cooperation, the College saw the light of the day and received its first batch of female students in 1985. These were the young women who were denied continuation of university education either for their inability to bear the rigors of journey or unavailability of a mahram (unmarriageable male near relation) or inability to leave their hearth and home for any reason whatsoever.

While setting up the Medical College on a system different from the one followed in the Islamic School as far as the age factor is concerned, I was convinced that medical profession needed superior skill, better mental capability and physical maturity. These attributes are impossible to come by before the age of fifteen for both male and female students. It was but natural that students be admitted to the College at an age higher than the one fixed for the school. Thus students of the Islamic School would be admitted to it only after their graduation from the school.

I cherish another ambition and I do hope that it will be realized in the Dubai Medical College. The ambition is that, alongside their medical studies, students of the College should also learn some other useful skill or skills related to their profession or household affairs. I strongly hope that the teaching staff of the College will believe in the rightness of this concept and extend their cooperation in realizing these objectives.

Now that a period of more than fifteen years has passed since the establishment of the College, I do not have any words to thank Allah for the many achievements we have registered during this period. Some of them are as follows:

Our policy of shortening the duration of the course has been proven right. Our graduates during this period have made their presence felt not only in hospitals but also in the international academic and educational forums. Some of them have successfully passed the American Equivalence examination. Others have passed the Fellowship examinations of Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons in England.

Close on the heels of it the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research UAE



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accorded recognition to the college under its decision No.55 of 1994. The British Medical Council was kind enough to recognize the Dubai Medical College Degree in 1995, which opened up the doors for our graduates to work and register themselves for postgraduate studies in the UK. And last but not least the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research UAE, vide its Decision No.65 of 1996, also granted the Degree of Medicine and Surgery of the Dubai Medical College for Girls equivalence to the first degree of Medicine and Surgery (i.e. MBBS).

Such remarkable successes, in a so short period, speak volumes of the stupendous efforts made by the teaching staff on the one hand and of the fruitful cooperation between the academic wing of the College and the Clinical departments of the hospitals on the other. It amply demonstrates the great amount of passion for knowledge and hard work put in by the students of the College who seem to be determined to see that the College not only occupies its due place among its other counterparts but also be in the forefront of them all.

We, however, desire and wish that excellence in morality and religiosity of the students of this College should also match their academic excellence.

By the grace of Allah, it is a common sight in our hospitals now to see the woman patients there meets doctors that faithfully adhere to the tenets of Islam, treat patients kindly, try to alleviate the psychological strains alongside the physical pains of the patients, infuse the surroundings with kindness and motherly care and discharge their duties with a missionary spirit.

I can say it with confidence that the alumnae of the Dubai Medical College could be the models of good Muslim physicians. They would be the role models for those who wish their daughters to acquire knowledge that will provide them with the right faith, good moral conduct and a secure future. It will also ensure them an honorable and independent life in the society that will appreciate their efforts, extend its cooperation and raise its voices of encouragement in chorus.

My joy at the achievements of the College is great. My happiness at its success is beyond measure. It is a plant which has reached its fruition and a sapling that has attained its ripening. It is a sun filling the atmosphere with light and a star brightening the space. For me it is a dream come true. May the College surge further ahead! May its successes endure! May its benefits spread far and wide! May Allah be with it! May Allah protect it, bless it, and right its wrongs! Allah never lets go to waste the recompense of those who do good deeds.

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The Swiss politician Daniel Streich, who rose to fame as a result of his opposition to mosques in his homeland, has now embraced the faith he reviled.

Daniel Streich was a member of then Swiss People's Party (SVP) in Switzerland. A well-known politician, Streich led the calls for a <u>ban on minarets across Switzerland</u>. He was active in building anti-Muslim sentiments throughout Switzerland. This sustained campaign led to him being given a high ranking position in the Swiss Army.

Streich is a military instructor in the Swiss army and was said to be a committed Christian reading the Bible and attending Church regularly.

He was also committed to his party (SVP) and stood as a local politician in the commune of Bulle.

Daniel Streich Conversion to Islam

Streich attempted to understand the *Qur'an* and Islamic teachings in order to argue against Muslims on tenets of their faith. In the course of his efforts the ex-Christian began to agree with and acknowledge the proclamations of the *Qur'an*.

"Islam offers me logical answers to important life questions, which, in the end, I never found in Christianity," says Streich. He is now a committed Muslim, who attends the mosque, recites the *Qur'an* and prays five times a day.

Post-Conversion Life for Daniel Streich

Streich has now focused his intentions on participating in the building of the new Conservative Democratic Party in the canton of Freiburg. Freich's new movement is in contrast to his previous one and he aims to promote religious tolerance and peaceful cooperative living, in spite of the fact that ban on mosques minarets has gained a legal status.

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He is vehemently opposed to the Minaret ban and is hoping to establish Switzerland's fifth mosque and the most beautiful in Europe.

Meanwhile the SUV have raised concerns over Streich's position as Military Commander in the Army in the aftermath of his conversion citing him as a security risk. SVP-National Council member Alfred Heer cited the Fort Hood shooting spree as an example.

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Malcolm X Killer Is Freed on Parole

The only man to admit shooting $\underline{\text{Malcolm X}}$ was freed Tuesday on parole, 45 years after he helped assassinate the civil rights leader, New York State officials said.

The man, Thomas Hagan, the last person still serving time in the 1965 killing, was freed from a Manhattan prison where he spent two days a week under a work-release program, said Linda Foglia, a spokeswoman for the State <u>Department of Correctional Services</u>.

Mr. Hagan, 69, has said he was one of three people who shot Malcolm X as he began a speech at the <u>Audubon Ballroom</u> in Harlem on <u>Feb. 21, 1965</u>. But Mr. Hagan has said the two men convicted with him were not involved. They maintained their innocence and were paroled in the 1980s. No one else has ever been charged.

The assassins killed Malcolm X out of anger at his split with the leadership of the Nation of Islam, the black Muslim movement for which he had once served as chief spokesman, said Mr. Hagan, who was then known as Talmadge X Hayer.

He has repeatedly expressed regret for his role in the assassination, which he described in a 2008 court filing as the deed of a young man who "acted out of rage on impulse and loyalty" to religious leaders.

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Islamic Center in New York:

A Contrived Controversy

Almost everyone except a miniscule minority is born to their religion and adheres to the social traditions of their culture. Religions may preach unity to their flock but give-in to sectarianism. The sects roughly fall into two cerebral groups.

At the upper end a thoughtful and introspective minority that considers humility and service to humanity as the essence of their being and the calling of their religion. At the other end the narrow-minded who consider their creed to have been chosen by God for domination and use selected passages from their scripture in zealous pursuit of political power.

In the middle lives a large majority of usually kind and decent people too busy in the chores of living to think critically the morality of their social setting. They follow religious rituals and usually admire the first group, but succumb to the propaganda of the second in traumatic times.

In dictatorial or feudal regimes the first group is persecuted and the second latches on to power and thrives. In democracies, the first group may draw people to a higher vision, but suffers the onslaught of unethical propaganda by the second, especially during elections in stressful times.

After eight long years of mismanagement, two wars of hubris and a complete economic collapse, the US electorate in the elections of 2006 and 08 threw the Republicans out of power. In the last year and a half the economy has been stabilized, but the jobless rate is still very high, the electorate is not happy. With this backdrop and the trauma of 9/11, the drummed up controversy and misinformation about the Islamic community center two blocks from ground zero in New York follows this pattern.

In the last two months opposition politicians with the help of pundits on the anything, but "fair and balanced" FOX news and talk radio have kept up the drum beat of misinformation and half truths about the Islamic Center. Unsurprisingly, there has been a gradual rise in anti Islamic Center opinion along with anti Muslim feeling in the ephemeral public opinion polls. Many local right wing groups have latched on in opposing Islamic centers many smaller communities as well.

The fear mongers have found a more potent propaganda, better than the perennial illegal immigration that simmers on the back burner to be resurrected in elections. Even better than the invented new twist of a few months ago, "the Anchor Babies", implying that people come to US to deliver babies to cash in years later, the eventual

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right of citizenship under the US constitution.

Muslims should not be disheartened at this turn of events. Immigrants in the past have been subjected to much worse. It is part of the endemic struggle between the idea of the great democracy that the founding fathers envisioned and the drag of the baser human tendencies.

The United States of America came into being as a democracy drawing on the high ideals of enlightenment. Yet the full implementation of the ideals in the constitution took another two centuries to unfold. The genius of the US constitution is that it guides and allows progress, evolving with the needs of times.

The drag of the baser part of our history is well known, the massacre of Natives, the horrible legacy of slavery, the ethno-religious persecution of Jewish, Catholic - Irish and Italian immigrants, and the indigenous Mormon. The exploitation and persecution of imported Chinese and Japanese laborers in the 19th century is also a part of the same exploitative fabric.

The nation gradually evolved to reject these, once accepted practices. In hard economic times and in times of war it often regresses, but eventually it re-discovers its moorings. It takes time, often a long time. Blacks were forced to immigrate in chains and were kept in political chains up to the 1960s, until the passage of the Civil Rights legislations. During the hysterical fear of the "new age religions" of 1970s and 80s, charlatan "deprogrammers" made a lot of money preying on the fears of the parents whose children opted to experiment with new trends in thoughts. The current anti Muslim propaganda too shall pass.

So the present anti Muslim propaganda is not surprising. What should be celebrated is that in the wake of 9/11 the administration arrested about 1,200 innocent Muslims; justice prevailed and none of them were found guilty. However in the last three years some Muslims have indulged in reprehensible acts and are legitimately being brought to justice. There have been many attacks on Islamic centers and Mosques by the cowardly religious miscreants, but the law has brought them to justice.

Though right wing propagandists have succeeded in corrupting the public mind to gain about sixty percent support, it is a great tribute to the US democracy that about thirty to forty percent have not succumbed to the knee jerk reaction. Many Pastors, Rabbis and most editorials in the newspapers and commentary sections have decried this assault on the first amendment. It is a very high index of sanity in difficult times in any country. The founding fathers took special care to check the tyranny of the insidious emotional gullible majority by requiring two thirds majority and ratification by three-fourths of the states to change the constitution.

It is important to realize that bigots on all sides are equally reprehensible. Each side considers the nameless, faceless bigots on the other side to be despicable propaganda figures. While the bigots on their side to be human beings who love their children and are good neighbors, therefore are more easily swayed by their rhetoric. In wars of supremacy each side succumbs to those who misuse religion and yields leadership to the most despicable charlatans among them.



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The soul of the US resides in its strong and just constitution. Those with baser attitudes are a blight that infects all societies. Unlike many other countries, the US democracy has weathered them for more than two centuries, and has consistently been on an upward humane trajectory, respecting and celebrating the diversity and aspirations of all its citizens. Muslims in the United States know it and they have a lot to learn and contribute to this great nation of immigrants. When things are going well it is easy to be good, the real test of character is to be just and balanced when one's own ox is being gored.

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Burning the Holy Quran Crisis

The ninth anniversary of September 11 attacks coincided with the offensive insults of the Americans to the holiest book of 1.5 billion Muslims around the globe. According to reports by the Reuters, near Nashville, Tennessee, evangelical Pastor Bob Old and another preacher used lighter fluid and a lighter to burn at least two copies of the Quran. Old called Islam "a false religion."

It was also reported that the American protesters objecting to the construction of an Islamic center and a mosque adjacent to the Ground Zero site tore pages from the Holy Quran and set them alight. Reuters also dispatched reports from the similar abuses to the Holy Quran in Lower Manhattan.

The terrifying plan of burning the holy book of Muslims was initially proposed by the pastor of an obscure, small, non-denominational church in Gainesville who had announced that he would be burning copies of the Holy Quran on the anniversary of 9/11 attacks. The plan was described by the global media as a publicity stunt by someone whose desire for gaining some reputation and attention by the international media propelled him towards thinking of such an evil action.

Although a global wave of protests which erupted immediately after Pastor Jones announced his plan for burning the Holy Quran on September 11 dissuaded the attention-seeking preacher from realizing his mischievous intention, he inspired other people to go ahead with the plan and abuse a Holy Book which is venerated and adored by millions of people in the four corners of the world.

Insulting the holy book of Muslims in the United States put an emphasis on the fact that those who consider themselves the harbingers of mutual understanding, religious toleration, peaceful coexistence and freedom of expression are merely making unfounded and baseless claims which they perpetually fail to adhere to in practice. These are only claims which are designed to portray an idealistic image of the United States and its culture. Burning a holy book is the clear manifestation of an uncivilized and barbaric action for which there can't be any justification or explanation.

Muslims around the world are subject to the most unfair convictions and unjustifiable discriminations. They're usually labeled as extremists, fundamentalists and radicals. They're always judged with pessimism and negativity. Every terrorist operation is attributed to them and the most offensive charges are leveled against them as unjustly as possible. So, what's the reality of Islam? Is it a religion of violence and barbarism, as the Americans claim? Does it further and spread terrorism and extremism? Is Islam a "false religion", as the evangelical pastor has claimed? A general investigation of the Islamic scriptures and Quran can provide the response to all of these questions. There are numerous indications that Muslims are among the

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most pacifist and peace-lover people in the world. Islam has categorically rebuffed violence and aggression towards the people and condemned those who use force against others and undermine their esteem.

The most fundamental pillar of Islam is based on sociability, interaction with the other people and respecting their prestige and stature. The Holy Quran on several occasions has underlined the importance of revering the humankind as the most prestigious and valuable creature of the Almighty God. In the verse 70 of the chapter Al-Isra', the Almighty God introduces the man as His most admirable and brilliant creature, saying that he is superior than all of the other beings on the Earth: "It is a favor that We have honored the sons of Adam and blessed them with conveyances on land and sea and provided them with good and pure things and exalted them above many of Our other creatures."

As a vanguard ideology, Islam has always emphasized the essentiality of behaving with the followers of other religions with respect and admiration. It was once asked from Imam Reza, the eighth Twelver Shiite Imam and the seventh descendant of Prophet Muhammad that how should one pay tribute to the Jews and Christians who don't follow the religion of Islam? He answered: "tell them may the Almighty God bless the world for you."

Those who claim to be the guardians of human rights have so far killed more than 1 million innocent civilians in Iraq since they launched their so-called War on Terror. One may wonder whether these 1 million people have been human or not. Islam has never claimed to be a charter of human rights, but in actuality, it is the most comprehensive and all-inclusive declaration of human rights. It pays attention to each and every aspect of human's dignity and disallows the destabilization of man's decorum. In the verse 12 of the chapter Al-Hujuraat, the Almighty God prevents the believers from backbiting, being suspicious about the others and spying: "Believers, avoid being excessively suspicious, for some suspicion is a sin. Do not spy, nor backbite one another. Would any of you like to eat the flesh of his dead brother? (by backbiting) You would surely detest it. Have fear of Allah. Surely Allah is much prone to accept repentance, is Most Compassionate."

In the verse 13 of the same chapter, the Almighty God has highlighted the fact that the most venerable and esteemed people are the ones who fear Him the most and do good deeds as a result of this fear. This shows that people, regardless of their religion, ethnicity, gender and language, are equal in Islam and their decency is the basis of judging their actions: "Verily the noblest of you in the sight of Allah is the most God-fearing of you."

Islam has also stressed the importance of respecting the followers of other religions and called the holy books of Jews and Christians divine revelations which should be treated with esteem and respect. In the verse 46 of the chapter Al-Ma'idah, we read: "And We sent Jesus, the son of Mary, after those Prophets, confirming the truth of whatever there still remained of the Torah. And We gave him the Gospel, wherein is guidance and light, and which confirms the truth of whatever there still remained of the Torah, and a guidance and admonition for the God-fearing."

With these descriptions, it will become clear that Islam is a religion of toleration,



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peace and friendship. It pays tribute to all of the religions which had preceded it and obliges the Muslims to live along with the followers of other religions peacefully. Islam confirms and verifies the authenticity of previous holy books and asks the Muslims to be benevolent and compassionate with the "people of faith".

Burning a holy book which is full of instructions for a peaceful, serene, pure and happy life indicates nothing but ignorance and animosity. More than 1.5 billion people around the world read the Holy Quran to learn from its insights and teachings. Burning such a book simply indicates the lack of tolerance and freedom in a country which considers itself a beacon of freedom.

Thank God, Muslims have always treated with the followers of other religions respectfully. They never drew insulting cartoons of Prophet Jesus nor did they desecrate the Bible and Torah. The mainstream media in the West portray the Muslims as terrorists and extremists, but the Muslims around the world have righteously demonstrated that they are worthy of praise and admiration for their excellent demeanor and their peaceful disposition.

Does Burning the Holy Quran Solve Any Problems?

Non-Muslims might be unfamiliar with the concept of "Wudu". It's an Islamic practice involving the washing of some parts of the body such as the hands, arms and face in order to get prepared for saying prayers or reciting the Holy Quran. It's is of high value in the Islamic tradition, because it's a preface to inner purity and satisfies the Almighty Creator who wants its creatures to be pure and clean once they want to talk to Him. Wudu is translated into English as "ablution". One who is in the state of Wudu, that is has washed his face, hands, arms and feet, is obliged to adhere to some certain codes of morality, including devotion to honesty, justice and sincerity. One who is in the state of Wudu is supposed not to tell lie, not to judge with prejudice and partiality and not to state or claim what is unrighteous and unfair.

Prior to setting off for writing this article, I conducted "Wudu" and promised myself not to get out of the borders of honesty and objectivity. I promised myself to propose what is my concern in a manner that is justifiable and virtuous, and pose a few questions as someone who has been entitled to ask freely, without being disrupted by projection or disturbance.

It was on the news headlines that the Florida-based Dove World Outreach Center church pastor, Terry Jones, decided to burn copies of the Holy Quran on the advent of September 11 in an action which is deemed to be a remonstration against what is

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Regrettably, Wayne Sapp who is an associate pastor of the Dove World Outreach Center has proclaimed that burning the Holy Quran is a direction God wants them to go. "We are convinced this is the direction God wants us to go. That's the only reason we're doing it in the first place," he told the reporters.

First and foremost, it should be noted that the announcement of such a plan, regardless of its being done or not, is an immoral, condemnable and blameworthy action. The immorality and unacceptability of such an action would be underscored by the fact that an evangelical church which considers itself a propagator of Christian religious values has decided to burn a holy book which some 1.5 billion people around the world revere and venerate.

In this point, one may unavoidably come across to a vital question which puts one into an inevitable and inescapable stalemate: what happens if the Muslims announce a plan to burn the Torah? Won't they be accused of extremism, anti-Semitism, fanaticism, fundamentalism and radicalism? Won't they become the subject of unending attacks by the mainstream, corporate media of the United States, United Kingdom, Israel and their European allies? Won't the international organizations collectively condemn the Muslim society and won't an all-out wave of Islamophobic actions set out to emerge around the world? Won't the high-ranking politicians and statesmen of countries, who don't have anything to do with Judaism, condemn this action simply because of their connection and affinity with Israel? Won't any conscious, cognizant and decent citizen rebuff such an outrageous and disgraceful action? Won't the international community categorically react to the Muslims community?

The answer to all of the questions posed above is clear. The extent of international punishments for insulting the holy book of Jews will be so wide-ranging and across-the-board that the Muslims will profoundly regret their action and instantaneously apologize; however, the question which I posed contains a possibility that never takes place. Muslims have always paid tribute to other Abrahamic religions and treated their pillars, prophets and holy books with great reverence and respect. Essentially, Islam has put a crucial responsibility on the shoulders of Muslims to respect the other religions, treat with the followers of Abrahamic religions in a brotherly manner and never make a distinction between them.

To be just and fair, Islam has comprehensively advised its followers to pay homage and respect to the beliefs of those who follow other religions and avoid behaving in a way which degrades and subdues them. In Verse 285 of Chapter 2 (Al-Baqara, The Heifer) of the Holy Quran, we read: "The Apostle believeth in what hath been revealed to him from his Lord, as do the men of faith. Each one (of them) believeth In God, His angels, His books, and His apostles. We make no distinction (they say) between one and another of His apostles. And they say: we hear, and we obey: (we seek) Thy forgiveness, our Lord, and to Thee Is the end of all journeys."

This is a clear evidence for the fact that Quran orders the Muslims to treat all of the prophets equally without making any distinction between them.

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In Verse 44 of Chapter 5 (Al-Maida, The Table Spread), the Almighty God stresses the necessity and essentiality of respecting and esteeming the holy book of Torah: "It was We who revealed The Torah (to Moses): therein was guidance and light. By its standard have been judged the Jews, by the Prophets Who bowed (as in Islam) to God's Will, by the Rabbis and the Doctors of Law: For to them was entrusted the protection of God's Book, and they were witnesses thereto: Therefore fear not men, but fear Me, and sell not My Signs for a miserable price. If any do fail to judge by (the light of) what God hath revealed, they are (no better than) unbelievers"

The more substantial evidence which demonstrates that Islam is strictly committed to the veneration of other prophets and their holy books can be found in the Verse 136 of Chapter 2 (Al-Baqara). "Say ye: we believe In God, and the revelation given to us, and to Abraham, Ismā'īl, Isaac, Jacob, and the Tribes, and that given to Moses and Jesus, and that given to (all) Prophets from their Lord: we make no difference between one and another of them: And we bow to God (in Islam)."

The Holy Quran highlights that its teachings and values verify and complement the teachings of previous holy books, including Torah and Bible, and this clear statement can be found in Verse 92 of Chapter 6 (Al-Ana'am, The Cattle): "And this is a Book which We have sent down, bringing blessings, and confirming the revelations which came before it: that thou Mayest warn the Mother of Cities and all around her. Those who believe In the Hereafter believe in this Book, and they are constant In guarding their Prayers."

Islam has never hesitated to verify the authenticity and legitimacy of its predecessors and the nations which adhered to the holy books. In Verse 62 of Chapter 2 (Al-Baqara), it's expressively stated that those who believe in the Almighty God and do decent acts, regardless of their religion, will be blessed and exalted rightfully: "Those who believe in the Quran, and those who follow the Jewish (scriptures), and the Christians and the Sabians, - any who believe in God and the Last Day, and work righteousness, shall have their reward with their Lord: on them shall be no fear, nor shall they grieve."

How Should Muslims React to Anti-Islamic Stunts, Such as Attempts to Burn the Holy Quran?

Muslims are once again placed in the difficult position of deciding how best to respond to an act designed to cause as much offense as possible to them and their faith.

Previously, it was a series of cartoons mocking the Prophet Muhammad. Then it was the bigoted response to the call for "Everybody Draw Muhammad Day."

Now, Pastor Terry Jones of the Dove World Outreach Center in Gainesville, Fla., who said that he would burn copies of the Quran, Islam's holy text, outside his church on the anniversary of the 9/11 terror attacks (But he did not, due to pressures). He told a local television station that he decided to burn copies of the Quran, which he calls an "evil book," because Islam "teaches against the Bible. . .The Quran teaches against Jesus being God."

Perhaps Pastor Jones has not opened the Quran to verse 45 of chapter 3, which states: "Behold! The angels said: 'O Mary! God giveth thee glad tidings of a Word from Him. His name will be Jesus Christ, the son of Mary, held in honor in this world and the Hereafter and in (the company of) those nearest to God.""

So, how should Muslims in America and around the world react to this latest attempt by hate-mongers to smear Islam and cause intentional offense?

They must look to the Quran itself and to the example of the Prophet Muhammad, who faced many such insults during his lifetime.

God states in the Quran: "(But whatever they may say or do,) repel the evil (that they commit) with something that is better: We are fully aware of what they attribute (to Us)." (The Holy Quran, 23:96)

And also: "(Since) good and evil cannot be equal, repel (the evil deed) with one that is better. Then you will see that he with whom you had enmity, will become your close friend." (The Holy Quran, 41:34)

In other verses, God states: "When (the righteous) hear vain talk, they withdraw from it saying: 'Our deeds are for us and yours for you; peace be on to you. We do not desire the way of the ignorant'. . . O Prophet (Muhammad), you cannot give guidance to whom you wish, it is God Who gives guidance to whom He pleases, and He is quite aware of those who are guided." (The Holy Quran, 28:55-56)



The Quran also says: "Invite (all) to the way of thy Lord with wisdom and beautiful preaching, and argue with them in ways that are best and most gracious: for thy Lord knows best who have strayed from His Path and who receive guidance." (16:125)

Another verse tells the Prophet Muhammad to "show forgiveness, speak for justice and avoid the ignorant." (7:199)

Islamic traditions include a number of instances in which the Prophet did just that -- clearly demonstrating that forgiveness is an act of liberation and that it shows strength, not weakness. Most importantly, God commands us to show forgiveness.

The Prophet often had the opportunity to retaliate against those who abused him, but refrained from doing so.

All Muslims know the tradition (hadith) of the woman who would regularly throw trash on the prophet as he walked down a particular path. The prophet never responded in kind to the woman's abuse. Instead, when she one day failed to attack him, he went to her home to inquire about her condition.

In another hadith, the Prophet was offered the opportunity to have God punish the people of a town near Mecca who refused the message of Islam and attacked him with stones. Again, the prophet did not choose to respond in kind to the abuse. Instead, he asked God to save the abusers.

Even when the Prophet was in a position of power, he chose the path of kindness and reconciliation.

When he returned to Mecca after years of exile and personal attacks, he did not take revenge on the people of the city, but instead offered a general amnesty.

These are the examples that Muslims should follow as they express deep concern about an intentional insult that is in reality just a cheap publicity stunt by a tiny extremist group seeking attention and donations.

Instead of protesting the Quran burnings -- and playing into the hands of extremist publicity-seekers like Pastor Jones -- American Muslims and Muslims around the world should spend September 11 reaching out to people of other faiths and beliefs to build bridges of respect and understanding.

For Americans who are not Muslim, the principle should be "learn, don't burn." Request a copy of the Quran at www.explorethequran.com and read all the references to Biblical figures such as Moses, Jesus and Abraham (peace be upon them all).

Research has shown that anti-Islam prejudice goes down when people interact with ordinary Muslims and have greater knowledge of Islam.

It might also be a good idea for Americans of other faiths to borrow a Quran from a Muslim friend, neighbor or co-worker. In that way, knowledge may be increased as bonds of friendship are formed.

Burning the Quran and the Satanic Verses:

Is there a difference?

Whilst some Muslims around the world demonstrate with rage, others find this cheap media stunt by the US Pastor, Terry Jones, rather amusing; he appears like the typical ignorant rugged hillbilly with a tiny band of followers. The obliging media selectively pushes the arguments of incitement to hate and violence to the back, and the argument of the right of free speech for Terry Jones is brought to the front. It works in reverse for the Muslim action and reaction, as it is always measured against the principle of incitement to hate and violence, rather than a right to express their viewpoint.

Both, the Satanic Verses and the actions of Terry Jones are provocation, and not a reaction; one can also include the Danish Cartoon in this category. Rather, the Muslims will point out, if the media opposed the book burning of Satanic Verses, why did they not demonstrate the same level of opposition to the burning of the Quran. Moreover, the 'Satanic Verses' is not a sacred scripture with millions of followers around the world. Thus, if anything, the response to curtail free speech of Terry Jones should have been greater. This merely confirms that media consistency is the exception, and media-hypocrisy is the norm.

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My Burqa Is None of Your Business

"The burqa is not welcome in France," President Nicolas Sarkozy solemnly pronounced in his state of the union message last month. In this he went legally, philosophically and morally astray, although his politics may be sound.

An educated guess is that there are no more than a few thousand women in France who wear the burqa or niqab, a loose gown running from head to foot that covers the face with either an opening for the eyes or a veil to hide the face. One can go for months in France without seeing a woman in a burqa.

Covering one's face from the view of others is a way of protecting one's anonymity. The right to anonymity, if there is such a right, is closely linked to the right of privacy that is guaranteed by the French civil code and by the European Convention on Human Rights. On public streets or in an outdoor market, one's anonymity enjoys legal protection from photographers. Other than permitting identification, there would appear to be no legitimate public interest in compelling people to expose their faces.

Dress codes do exist in France as elsewhere, but their enforcement is through social custom rather than law. There are no obligatory vestimentary rules in France outside of prisons and, to a limited extent, schools.

What is odd is the sudden French zeal for conformity, for no country has shown more respect than France for the uninhibited expression of individuality. It runs like a musical theme from François Villon in the 15th century to Georges Brassens in the 20th.

Yet on nothing more than the quicksand of intuition President Sarkozy concluded that the burqa symbolizes women's submission. France's highest court in administrative matters, the Council of State, reached the same conclusion just a year ago when it denied citizenship to a woman who has lived in France for eight years, speaks perfect French, has a French husband and four children born in France, on the sole ground

that she wears a burqa. The court, like the president, felt that wearing a burqa conflicts with the principle of the equality of the sexes.

Yet there exists no legal inferiority. A woman wearing a burqa enjoys the same legal rights as any other person in France, including the right to divorce. If there is no legal inferiority, perhaps the submission invoked by the president and the court is a psychological submission.

If so, they have rushed in where angels fear to tread. An adolescent girl who starts to smoke submits to psychological peer pressure. So too those who sport baggy trousers or skin tight jeans, wear tattoos or go in for piercing, face-lifting, breast enhancement and a myriad of other practices just as offensive to some as the burqa is to others.

Is the working wife who does the laundry submitting psychologically to a feminine stereotype incompatible with the French principle of gender equality invoked by Mr. Sarkozy and the French supreme court? Can government intrude that deeply into how men and women interact and organize their lives?

The analogy that the president seemed to have in mind is that of a sect whose members are so brainwashed that they have lost all power to free themselves from exploitation. But there is no evidence that women in France who wear burqas are victims of a sect or are exploited.

Many wish to see the burqa as a badge of feminine oppression. They seem to feel that by removing the dress the purported oppression will vanish and the person's true voice will be found. Yet no evidence shows that women in France who wear burqas are forced to wear them, or have low self-esteem, or are unable to exercise their legal rights.

The political clamor to ban the burqa is not an evidence-based policy. It is a misguided effort to enhance the status of women grounded in speculation about what a woman hidden in a burqa must feel. Yet whatever she feels will certainly not be changed by a law telling her what not to wear. And were there a law, how would it be enforced? Would there be a fine for wearing a burqa? Would there be clothes police? The whole notion is reminiscent of the prohibitions applied to women in Afghanistan before the Taliban lost power.



While the burqa has become a useful political distraction, it could be turned into a symbol of a state that welcomes diversity. It could exemplify a state that knows that its role is to promote equality, protect diversity and forbid discrimination.

Mr. Sarkozy has done more to enhance that role than any of his predecessors, but on the issue of the burqa he has gone seriously astray.

A state that proclaims democratic values cannot justify telling its residents what to wear or not to wear any more than it can justify telling them what to think or what to say or to which god to pray when no harm comes from the behavior, save the shock felt by those whose views and customs differ.

Until evidence is forthcoming that wearing a burqa poses a clear and present danger, President Sarkozy is tilting a lance not at the devil but at an old windmill. The devil does not wear burqa.
